

Preparing for Boating Emergencies

A safe boater knows how to prevent and respond to boating emergencies.

To prevent from falling overboard:

- Don't sit on the gunwale, bow, seatbacks, motor cover or any other area not designed for seating.
- Don't sit on pedestal seats when underway at greater
 - Don't stand up in or lean out from a boat.
 - Don't move about the boat when underway.

If someone on your boat falls overboard:

- Reduce speed and toss the victim a throwable personal floatation device (PFD).
- · Have other passengers watch the victim.
- Turn your boat around and slowly pull alongside the victim, approaching the victim from downwind or into the current, whichever is stronger.
- Turn off the engine. Pull the victim on board over the stern, keeping the weight in the boat balanced.

Know the Rules: Learn to identify "Navi-Aids"



Arizona law enforcement agencies write many citations for "failure to obey navigation laws." You can help en-

sure the safety of all on the water by learning to identify these common navigational aids.



Information

Squares indicate where to find food, supplies, repairs, etc. and give directions and other information

Controlled

Circles indicate a controlled area such as speed limit, no fishing or anchoraing, ski only or no skiing, or "slow, no wake.



Exclusion

Crossed diamonds indicate areas off-limits to all vessels such as swimming areas, dams, and spillways.



Danger

Diamonds warn of dangers such as rocks, shoals, construction, dams, or stumps, Always proceed with caution.

Other Non-Lateral Markers

Safe Water Markers are white with red vertical stripes and mark mid-channels or fairways. They may be passed on either



Inland Water Obstruction Markers are white with black vertical stripes and indicate an obstruction to navigation. You should not pass between these buoys and nearest shore.

Mooring Buoy

Mooring Buoys are round and white with a blue horizontal band and are found in marinas and other areas where vessels are allowed to anchor. Note, the following actions are il-

◆ Willfully damaging, removing, interfering with, or tying up to a nava-gation buoy not intended for mooring

◆ Mooring, anchoring, or fastening to shore for more than 14 consecutive days any vessel on public waters.

AT LAUNCH OF BOATING SEASON BoatUS, NMMA Caution About Fuel Choice, Misfueling Risks

Federal ethanol fuel mandates and changing fuel supply demand boater vigilance.

As the summer boating season is underway, Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) and National Marine Manufacturers Association (NMMA) urge boaters to be mindful when selecting fuel for their boats, especially as the federal government's Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) is increasing the risk of consumer misfueling. Even one mistake at

the pump can be the source of expensive, warranty voiding repairs and dangerous engine failure.

Boaters can't assume that every fuel sold at gas stations will work in marine engines," said BoatUS President Margaret Podlich, "Boats can only run on 10% or less ethanol content (E10) fuel - and we know many boaters prefer to use etha-



the fuel pump this summer could be costly for boaters who misfuel and inadvertently dispense unapproved, high-ethanol blends into the boat's gas tank.

nol-free (E0) when possible.

'Unfortunately, as a result of the federal ethanol fuel mandates (RFS), boaters more E15 (gasoline with 15% ethanol) forced into the fuel supply by the RFS, the threat of accidental misfueling—especially at gas stations with blender pumpsgrowing.

NMMA President Thom Dammrich said, "Our priority is always to keep boaters safe. By increasing the share of fuels in the marketplace that are unsafe for ma-rine engines, the federal government's

RFS is putting boaters at risk.

"Research shows the costly price of accidentally misfueling a boat with E15 can include stalling, corrosion, fuel leaks, damaged valves and complete engine failure - each of which could put boaters and their safety in jeopardy. Now more than ever, with E15 on the rise, the threat of misfueling is real."

Boating Safety Made Easy All Summer Long

During May's National Safe Boating Week, many boaters made extra effort to improve their on-water safety. But, after the annual event was over, will they continue to stay vigilant?

2016 Is A 'Wonderfully Successful' Fishing Year

The inflow to Lake Powell over the past days has exceeded 100,000 acre feet each day. The lake is still rising and will end up at the highest level recorded since

Fish are excited because the lake is now flooding into green brush and trees. Bass and crappie really like brush habi-Shad love brush because it helps them avoid the constant barrage of predators that have their eye on them. 2016 has been a wonderfully successful fishing year, so far, and it will continue through the summer into fall.

Go Early!

I have one fishing tip this week that will be the most helpful suggestion to all that use it. Are you ready? The best time to go fishing is at dawn! Okay, that is usually the case but it is really important now.

Our fish are early risers and most ac-

tive during the first hour of daylight. They stay energized each morning until about 9 a.m. (MST) after which they tend

to dose off until dusk when another surge in fishing excitement occurs. Go early for best results.

Stripers All Day

Stripers can be caught all day long on bait. The standard locations in the main channel are still providing some action but the time between active schools coming under each boat is increasing. Fish are caught more quickly by actively searching for a school in the backs of canyons and coves. Newly reported hot spots include the back of Rock Creek and the cove just north of the floating restroom at the mouth of Rock Creek.
My standard method of locating strip-

er schools is working well right now. Troll a medium diving crankbait and graph the bottom contour from 25 – 50 feet. When a fish is hooked or a school seen on bottom, throw a floating marker (or hit a waypoint on the graph) so the school can be relocated quickly. Return to hover over the school, chum with anchovies and get ready to catch a bunch of fish.

Small stripers are slurping on the surface in the midlake areas from Last

stream from Good Hope Bay. Slurpers are catchable when casting to the leading fish that change direction and leave the main group. Fish size is usually small but the eating quality of small stripers is superb. Bigger stripers will be working near the smaller fish as the summer progresses.

The other group of stripers which have been ostracized and left the schools are found in shallow water while bass fishing. These fish are long, but thin. These fish should be harvested and disposed of in deep water to reduce competition among the massive striper population that exists right now.

Smallmouth Bass

Smallmouth bass are still biting like crazy with small fish making up the majority of the bites. You can find bigger bass in 20-25 feet of water about the same distance out from the shoreline. Both singletail and doubletail plastic grubs are working well. Green watermelon, pump-kin, smoked and chartreuse colored grubs

- · All guns are always loaded. Treat them that way.
- Never point the gun at anything you are not willing to destroy.

- til your sights are on target (and you have made the decision to shoot).
- · Be sure of your target and what is be-

Sometimes the slide on a semi-automatic pistol can be difficult to work. Many small pistols have a slide that is harder to pull back because there is less surface to grab as well as heavier springs necessary for the shorter slide and recoil distance. This is even more of a problem if you're older, very young, have arthritis, etc.

Enter the Handi-Racker. This little block-like device makes racking pistols almost effortless. Just put the Handi-Racker on the top of the slide, put the front of the Handi-Racker against a wall or a solid surface, and push the pistol forward. Voila! The gun is racked and ready.

The Handi-Racker is also great for

clearing a really stuck jam or for helping you disassemble the gun for cleaning. It's made of extruded polyethylene that won't mar your gun, and comes in two sizes to fit almost any pistol on the market. It retails for about \$30 and you can check it out at www.handiracker.com.

A Good Idea: A Lock Box

If you like to carry a gun with you on your hikes but don't want to keep it on you in the car, you should really consider buy-ing a lock box for the vehicle. You can get one online or at almost any outdoor store. They are metal, lined with foam so they don't damage your guy, and they have secure locks that keep your gun out of the wrong hands.

Airline cable attaches the box to an immovable fixture of some sort in your vehicle so it can't be removed without unlocking the box first. We have two of them

and I recommend them to anyone who transports a weapon. Here's an example of one: http://www.center-of-mass.com/ Store_InCarGunSafe.htm

And Another: Shooting Gloves

Margie has arthritis in her right hand mostly in the trigger finger and thumb It has made her trigger finger sort of corkscrew around and has had the effect of making it difficult for her to pull the trigger over and over on her smaller pistols. Something about the small size of the trigger makes her finger hurt. She's been put-ting a Bandaid on her finger, but I decided to buy her some shooting gloves instead.

These are helpful even if you don't have arthritis, and especially if you are out hunting in cold weather. You can buy good shooting gloves at any gun or outdoor store. Try them on and get the ones that allow you the most dexterity.

Margie only wears them with her smaller guns, and only because she is shooting hundreds of rounds at a time. In an emergency she wouldn't have to stop and pull the gloves on. You may not need them all the time, but they have a place for



A Laser Place To Shoot

Going to the range is great, but it's lim-- you can't move while shooting, you can't draw from a holster, and you can't engage multiple targets in most cases. You can do all these things at matches and classes, but what if you just want to practice on your own, in private? Finding a place to shoot in the desert is getting harder and harder.

One way you can get a lot of practice is with a laser system that lets you practice shooting at home or wherever you want. One of the coolest I've seen is Laser Ammo (laser-ammo.com). The laser is actually in a cartridge that fits in your gun like a bullet. When you pull the trigger, the firing pin causes the cartridge to emit a laser pulse that you can see on regular paper targets or on anything else. You can also buy electronic targets that light up when the laser hits the mark, and you can get multiple targets packs. A cartridge for a 9mm is around \$100, and interactive target packages range from \$100 - \$350.

But think of the money you'll save on ammo and on gas because you don't have to drive to the range!

The Life And Influence Of My **Brother Bud**

His full name is Orlan Ross Ginter; his nickname his entire life has been "Bud"

Bud was born May 1, 1939 in Appleton City, Missouri. (That is the same general area that, back in the day, Frank and Jessie James started their career.) He passed over the bar on June 5, 2016 of un-known natural causes; he was 77 years young.

Bud was an avid hunter; he hunted Rooselvelt elk in the valleys of Mount Saint Helens here in Washington for many years, as well as white tail and black tail deer, Rocky Mountain goat in the high Cascades. He bagged a moose in Alaska, antelope in Wyoming, and was also a master taxidermist (so you can image what his living room looks like).

My brother was also an avid sports fisherman and commercial salmon/halibut fisherman - and I must not leave out a very successful bow hunter.

Later on, Bud moved into helping the crab fishermen in Alaska move their boats down to Seattle for repair and back again for their next season. After awhile, he became shore based and went on to becoming a custom yacht builder, building yachts from 80 to 100 feet Not only did he build the yachts, but also he made the molds from

Gov. Ducey Signs HB 2324 As A **Boost To Arizona Military Families**

military personnel stationed in Arizona to qualify for Arizona resident hunting and fishing licenses has been signed into law Governor Doug Ducey signed House Bill 2324: G&F; military spouses; resident licenses, sponsored by Representative Frank Pratt (LD-8, Casa Grande).

The Arizona Game and Fish Commission voted unanimously at their January 2016 meeting to support this expression of gratitude for the families whose service and sacrifice protect our liberties. Under current law, an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States stationed in Arizona either permanently or temporarily may purchase a resident license permitting the taking of wildlife. HB2324 now extends that privilege to



"In partnership with Rep. Pratt, the Arizona Game and Fish Department and Commission are proud to honor our active duty military and their spouses We thank them, and all our

veterans, for their sacrifice and service to this country." said Commission Chairman Kurt Davis.

A valid license is required for taking wildlife, including fish, in Arizona. resident of Arizona can enjoy the benefits of a combination Hunting and Fishing license, valid for 365 days from the date of purchase, for only \$57. In general, an Arizona resident is a

person who is domiciled (claims the state

principal residence) in this state for six months immediately preceding the date of application for a license, permit, tag, or stamp and does not claim residency for any purpose in another state or jurisdiction.

Through the years, the department has consistently implemented programs that provide hunting tags and opportunities for veterans, wounded warriors, and military personnel to hunt on military installations throughout AZ.

The Department also has partnered with non-profit organizations serving veterans so that unused hunting permits or tags may be donated to veterans with service-connected disabilities



Retired Fire Chief Brings New Life To Old Guns

It sat quietly in the corner of the shop, behind a group of other rifles. This was the corner where trade-in rifles that were not in the best shape were placed. This particular rifle had begun its life back in 1906, at the Savage Arms factory. It was a Model 1899, with a 24-inch-long barrel in 30-30.

This was a very popular combination for a deer rifle in its day.

I don't know why it attracted attention that day, yet it came out of its corner for examination. The condition could best be described as neglected, and I don't mean short term. The stock had sections missing on both sides from the top tang, back over an inch. The finish was almost nonexistent on the receiver, and very poor on the barrel, and yet still, there was something there

I am sure that there are similar rifles in the corners of any gunsmith's shop. Trade-ins, broken-parts guns, guns too expensive to repair, and thus unwanted. Every now and then comes a time when a project seems like the thing to do. So it was destined to be with the Savage.

So, what to do? How to resurrect this old hunting companion of a time long ago? Its original iteration did not seem

like the way to go. As we talked about the project, some pieces seemed to come together. Criteria included compact, fast handling medium big bore, powerful and a mix of old and new seemed to blend

Caliber was the first component we explored. What would work in that action without a large amount of work (this idea would later present challenges). The medium large bores contained a mix of old and new, and during the perusal of the loading manuals, Gunsmith Pat Knight found a very interesting anomaly.

The dimensions of the old (1876) .38-55 Winchester were amazingly close to those of the much more recent (1978) and more powerful .375 Winchester. Power levels precluded mixing them in old Winchesters as the design would not handle the pressure (except for the heavily reinforced "Big Bore 94" which was introduced with the .375 Winchester car-

And so it was that the project began. Editor's Note: I first knew Mike Berger through my late daughter Lisa Brookes-Haws, a retired firefighter/EMT/911 dispatcher and trainer. She was so pleased that her own daughter Kelsee Haws was beginning her fire-science program at Central Valley Institute of Technology (CAVIT) under the excellent guidance of Chief Mike Berger.

Fast forward to 2016 — Sadly, although her mother Lisa died before she could see her daughter's graduation, Kelsee did graduate from CAVIT in May of this year. And, Capt. Mike Berger, who had been an inspiration to her and many other students, fulfilled his promise to himself to retire from teaching and the fire service to concentrate on the hobby ("project") he mentions above.

Our family knows that his guidance through some difficult times were a huge help to Kelsee as she completed her program. We are forever grateful to him and look forward to many more articles that will take us further into his project.

What The Public Does Not Know

Each year, Arizona's conservation groups help raise close to \$2,000,000.00 through the auction and raffle tags for all of the big game species in Arizona. There are two tags that are auctioned and one tag that is raffled for each of the big game species. Those lucky tag winners / bidders are entitled to hunt one animal for an entire year. When they harvest that animal, their hunt is over. What the public does not know, however, is where all that money goes.

Habitat Partnership Committees

Through a process known as the HPC (Habitat Partnership Committees), small communities across the state gather together and identify projects that can better habitat for all wildlife. The location of the projects is determined by the main species that the project is attempting to help. Those projects typically involve either water or habitat improvements.

The photos in this article take you from the beginnings of a project to completion. These projects are funded by those auction / raffle tag monies. The project in these photos was completed last month just south of Superior, Ariz. The Arizona Deer Association sponsored the work project, which meant that we helped the Habitat Development crew from the Arizona Game & Fish Department during the construction process

Priceless Water

The cost for this project was estimated to be roughly \$45,000.00. Not cheap by any standard, but the water that this catchment will hold is priceless in an area that simply does not have a running water supply for wildlife. The construction typically takes a week to complete but is years in the planning and approval process.

For those who are not familiar with what a "Catchment" is, if you look at the photos, it is a fairly sophisticated construction that captures rainwater on the metal apron. The apron is slightly pitched so that it flows off the apron into a series of pipes that go into the below ground

water tanks. The tanks hold the rainwater and based on a leveling system, the "walk -in-trough" allows wildlife to come in for water to drink. The water never overflows and as each rainstorm or monsoon brings in new water it replenishes the supply.

Ingenious Application
It seems fairly simple sounding but rather ingenious in application. This catchment had a total of four tanks that each hold 2500 gallons of water below ground. The water held in these tanks will feed the run into the trough and keep water available for wildlife year round.

You Are Invited To Help

There are many conservation groups in the state that participate in these work projects and all actively invite non-members to come on out and help if you want to get a feel for how we attempt to help wildlife. I will be more than happy to direct anyone interested to a group that does these on the ground projects if someone is interested in giving a hand. JK

Summertime Is Outdoor Time

Every summer we pack up the grandkids and head for the hills for a week or so of hiking and outdoor fun. I've been going camping, hunting, and fishing since I was a kid so I have a lot of experience with various kinds of camping gear.

When my dad and my brother and I went camping way back in the day, all our gear was U.S. Army surplus. This meant everything for cooking was metal and weighed a ton, our tents were olive drab canvas and weighed a ton, our packs were olive drab canvas and

weighed a ton — you get the picture.

These days, campers, RV'ers, hunters, and hikers and preppers have a lot of great stuff to choose from. Here are a few I really like.



BioLite Kettle

My latest big purchase is a BioLite stove, kettle, and grill. This sweet setup not only burns wood as cleanly as gas, it will also run on twigs, pine cones, wood pellets — pretty much anything combustible. Not only that, it generates power while it cooks. On the side is a usb port so you can charge your phone or power the little light you can buy with the stove. I got mine free in a special package deal they are running.

What's even better about BioLite is that the company is on a mission to bring energy to the world. They say that home in underdeveloped countries account for more greenhouse gases than all the cars in the world. Also, the women in these countries spend over ten hours a week looking for fuel.

Their BioLite HomeStove reduces

particulates and carbon emissions by up to 90 percent, and requires 50 percent less fuel than a regular open fire. Their combustion technology cuts CO2e emissions by 2.5 tons a year. BioLite Home Stoves are changing people's lives all over the world, and when you buy a campstove, part of the price goes back into their mission. It's an awesome deal

NanoGrid

In Arizona we have monsoon storms that sometimes knock out the power for hours or even days. With the BioLite I'll be able to cook, charge my phone, and light up the night no matter how long the power stays off. Too bad they don't have a mini fan or AC unit! They do have systems to light up a room — the NanoGrid is a basically a small lantern that also stores and shares energy. You can string over-head lights onto it to light up your camp or your room, or you can charge your Go-Pro or your phone several times. When it runs out of juice, you can recharge it at home in an outlet, or in your car, or off your BioLite Stove.

The NanoGrid costs just under \$100. The CampStove bundle that I bought was just under \$200. They also have 5-watt solar panels, one with a battery that stores energy until you need it, and one that charges your electronics without storing power. You really should check out their Web site and see all the great gear they have and read about what they are doing for the planet. Go to bioliteenergy.com.

Travel, Camp Light

We went to Israel for a 12-day tour a couple of years ago, and I packed re-ally light. For instance, did you know that there is such a thing as disposable underwear? Socks, too — they are cotton and feel great, but at the end of the day, you just toss them in the trash instead of packing them in your suitcase. No more carry-ing around dirty shorts and socks for two

Also, I bought small packets of Tide laundry detergent designed for use in a sink. Our fishing clothing is lightweight and designed to dry very quickly, so at night I'd wash our lightweight pants and shirts in the sink and hang them in the shower. They were dry by morning. This method works well for hotel travels, but

what about camping? Well, I just found a Scrubba on Groupon and bought one.

Scrubba

The Scrubba a laundrywashing bag that has interwashboards little knobby bumps that mas-sage and scrub your laundry. All you uc clothes, water, detergent you do is put the deflate the bag, then rub from the outside for up to three minutes. Voila! Your clothes are clean. Just rinse and

Ju. dry. The Scrubba is \$55. They also offer a lightweight microfiber towel that helps

you pre-dry the clean laundry (roll and squeeze), and they even have a Scrubba that is also a backpack. Also available: portable clothesline and inflatable hang-

sack. Put your stuff inside the Scrubba, seal it shut, and rain and water can't get to your gear. This thing would have really come in handy on the Colorado River rafting trip we took a few years back. No - we'll put it to good use when we kayak the Gila Box. Check this stuff out at thescrubba.com.



My granddaughters and I all have Apple iPhones and we love them. I have apps on mine that show me trail maps and GPS info, and that makes hiking so much more fun. It's always good to know where you are, right?

My granddaughters are practically physically connected to their phones, and when we are traveling, they are constantly texting, Snapchatting, Instagramming, and Facebooking, all of which use power. Oh, the angst of a low battery warning when the day is still young!

Usually we can charge them up via the car usb port, but that requires a lot of time and a long cord. Plus - there are two granddaughters back there. I think I have finally solved that problem.

I recently purchased a Crave Travel Pro 13000mAh Dual USB Ultra-High Density Power Bank on Amazon for less than \$26. This thing will charge two devices at the same time and will charge your phone four times before needing a recharge. This is wonderful. It's also compact and light enough that I won't mind having to put it in my backpack (because Grandma carries everything when we're hiking).

I'm looking forward to having this in the back seat on our trip to Southern Arizona this summer. Another plus will come in very handy if the power goes out this summer.


Intex Two-Way Pump

We have a couple of Coleman inflat-able mattresses that we use when we are tent camping, and also at home when we have guests in numbers that overflow the guest room. We used to use a rechargeable electric pump to fill them, but invariably when we pulled it out of the closet it was dead.

We had a battery powered one, but it took 4 D batteries, weighed too much, and constantly ran out of power. To solve that problem, we bought an inexpensive Intex two-way pump. This means it blows air when you depress and then also when you pull the handle back out. I have













The package I bought is the CampStove Bundle. With this I can grill, cook, boil, and charge. Got the light free with it. The little

stove creates smokeless wood flames and the grill is a really good size and attaches super easily.

The KettlePot comes with a bowl that fits inside, and insulated handles that fold against the sides for storage and fold out for use. There is also quite a bit of spare room inside for whatever you want — ground coffee maybe, or compact cups and bowls. You can cook and pour out of this - the design is great.

Campers Need To Be Bear Aware

As many people celebrate the summer weekends by going camping, the Arizona Game and Fish Department reminds campers and all outdoor recreationists to be bear aware. A few simple precautions can go a long way towards protecting both people and bears.

"Humans are usually to blame for bears that become habituated and lose their fear of people. Bears quickly learn to associate campgrounds with food sources, placing both people and bears at risk," says April Howard, a department large carnivore biologist.

"We say 'a fed bear is a dead bear' because once a bear is habituated through human actions, it may be euthanized due to the threat it poses to people."

Campsite food sources can include uncleaned BBQs, used plates, discarded wrappers, food stores and pet food. The food odors attract bears that have a very keen sense of smell — approximately seven times better than a bloodhound and 100 times better than a human.

Take these immediate steps to minimize bear encounters:

- Keep a clean camp. Store food items and trash away from your tent or sleeping area. Even an empty food wrapper can attract a bear from a long distance
- Wash up before going to bed to eliminate odors
- Put food waste and garbage in a secure location such as a bear-proof dumpster.
 - Carry bear spray.
- Encourage others to take these precautions. Discouraging bears from a campground requires everyone do their part.

If you do encounter a bear, try to scare the bear away by making yourself look as large as possible, making loud noises and throwing objects towards it. Do not run. In the rare event of a black bear attack, fight back aggressively and use bear spray.

Alizona has had one fatal bear attack, which occurred in Pinetop in 2011. However, there are numerous reports each year of bears in close proximity to humans that could lead to serious injury or even death.

Tonto National Forest Releases Travel Management Draft Decision

The Tonto National Forest released a draft decision on the Travel Management Proiect today, which designates a system of roads, trails, and areas for motorized use, as well as prohibits general crosscountry travel.

Not Everyone Will Be Happy

'I realize not everyone will be happy with the decision. It is the Tonto National Forest's best effort to strike a reasonable balance that is responsive to the vast majority of public input the Forest received,' said Neil Bosworth, Forest Supervisor.

While Bosworth recognizes some users' favorite routes may no longer be open for motor vehicle use, the Forest tried to provide a range of opportunities across the Tonto National Forest. "I know motor vehicle users like to ride loops and visit a variety of scenery. We tried to provide for those opportunities while simultaneously protecting natural resources and providing for those who seek a more quiet recreational experience on the Forest.'


Seven Years Of Planning

This draft decision comes after a seven-year planning process that included extensive public participation and review of more than 5,000 miles of roads and trails. During this time, the Tonto National Forest has provided a number of proposals for a designated road and trail system to the public for review and comment

These public comments were used to develop a comprehensive analysis called the Final Environmental Impact Statement, on which the recent Travel Management draft decision was based.

This decision provides a starting point for management of motor vehicle use on the Tonto National Forest in compliance with the Final Travel Management Rule.

The Final Rule, established in 2005, directs each forest to provide for appropriate motorized access and motorized recreation opportunities while protecting important forest resources and non-motorized recreation opportunities.

Provision For Objections

Today's release of the draft decision is subject to the pre-decisional objection process described in 36 CFR Part 218. Subparts A and B. Objections must be filed within 45 days of the publication of the legal notice announcing the draft decision in the Arizona Capitol Times. Those that previously commented on the project have the opportunity to submit an objection based on their previous comment. A decision will not be made until the objection process is complete.

An estimated 95 percent of boats are filled at retail gas stations, but a 2016 Harris Poll commissioned by the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute found a startling 60 percent of consumers believe any gas sold at retail stations is suitable for all engines and products. Further, only 36 percent know E15 is harmful to some engines - with just 5 percent aware that its use in those engines is also ille-

The federal ethanol mandates, known as the RFS, require increasing amounts of biofuels — including corn ethanol — to be blended into the US fuel supply every year. This growing mandate forces higher quantities of fuels such as E15 into the marketplace, often at the expense of E0 ethanol-free fuel, and even though fuels with more than 10 percent ethanol are illegal to use in marine engines, motorcycles, outdoor power equipment and cars model year 2000 and older.

Though the government is aware that the RFS is changing the makeup of the fuel supply, it has undertaken no serious education campaign—beyond requiring small warning labels on fuel pumps to inform boaters and other consumers about the problems they may face from improper or accidental fueling. The boating industry and others have sought to fill the gap and inform the public about the need to be vigilant when fueling and not assume that just because a gas station sells several fuel types from the same pump that each is suitable for marine engines.

working boys really glad to help out even though it's a hot day," Stafford said. "I think they understand now how hard it is, how much work it takes, and how many people it takes, to remove deeply entrenched graffiti."

Graffiti Illegal

Graffiti in national parks is any carving or painting on a surface in the park, whether it is man-made or natural, and it is illegal. In Glen Canyon graffiti tends to be carvings on the rocks. The problem is so bad, in some areas whole canyons are covered in graffiti. Park officials are currently surveying Glen Canyon National Recreation Area for graffiti and estimate there are tens of thousands of square feet in the park that have been vandalized by graffiti.

'We appreciate the educational nature of this project and the things we learned about the park," Tom Tipton, troop leader said. "It was wonderful to work with

Park Service to help preserve the natural resources that belong to all of us."

Glen Canyon National Recreation Area recently received a grant to bolster its Graffiti Removal Intervention Team, or G.R.I.T., which will seek to remove more than 16,000 square feet of graffiti in the next three years. The GRIT program is part of a community and partner collaboration to beautify and protect resources at Glen Canyon National Recreation Area during the National Park Service Centennial. 





Walleye are becoming more consistent now and can be found in 12-20 feet of MURKY water. Look for the mud lines along shore in otherwise clear water to select walleye habitat. Then use your favorite technique to catch them. Walleye numbers are large in the mid to

northern lake.

Techniques include worm harness that are cast or towed behind slow trolled bottom bouncer rigs; single or double tail grubs with or without a piece of live night crawler attached, that are inched along the bottom; or mid-range crankbaits trolled in murky water along the 12-20 feet bench.

A tagged walleye contest began on July 1. You must sign up to be eligible to win a prize when a tagged fish is caught.


