The strategy includes stocking as many trout as possible before water-quality issues force the department to pause its stocking schedule, as was the case every summer from 2020 to 2023 when these lakes experienced warmer water temperatures and high pH levels from mid-July to mid- September. As a result, these factors can create stress on the trout, which can lead to poor angling opportunities and possible mortality.

Trout To Be Stocked Soon In **Some Mogollon Rim Waters**

Stockings will mark earliest Canyon, Haigler and Tonto creeks have received fish.

PAYSON, Ariz. — As warmer springtime weather approaches, the Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) will begin its annual trout stockings a bit earlier in some waters near Payson on the Mogollon Rim.

Canyon, Haigler, and Tonto creeks began receiving catchable-size rainbow trout in March. This will mark the first time these waters have been stocked this early in the traditional spring and summer stocking season. All other area streams will be stocked according to the standard schedule that begins in April.

AZGFD Adjusts Trout Stocking Schedule In Show Low, **Pinetop-Lakeside Areas**

Lakes to receive fish until July; stocking numbers to remain similar to 2023.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) has announced waters in the Show Low and Pinetop-Lakeside areas will be stocked with catchable-size trout from March to July, a change from the traditional stocking schedule of April to September.

Those waters include Fool Hollow, Rainbow, Show Low, and Woodland lakes, as well as Scott Reservoir. AZGFD is expected to maintain the schedule change until at least 2026 to provide department staff with sufficient time to determine its effects on angling opportunities.

The rationale behind the schedule change is that previously stocked trout already have adapted to warmer water temperatures and survived, while those fish being transported for stocking are accustomed to cooler water temperatures coming from the hatchery and could become stressed or even die when released into warmer waters.



Its That Time of Year!

Have you completed your National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA) approved state boater education course yet? If you're a California resident, effective January 1st, 2024 a NASBLA approved California course is required for any California resident age 60 and under. The course is available online, in a classroom or through home study. More information regarding the California approved courses can be found at https://californiaboatercard.com/



Your State Required

Arizona doesn't require a course for residents. But if you're visiting from another state or boating on the Colorado River and reside outside of Arizona you will be expected to have a NASBLA approved boating education card from your home state or meet whatever requirement your home state requires. So even though Arizona still has no boater education requirement for residents, those from out of state will be required to meet the requirements of their home state. So if you're from California and you're on your watercraft on the Arizona side of the River should officer friendly board you for whatever reason and you haven't complied with California's education requirement get ready to press hard on the citation you'll receive!

So why are these courses necessary in almost every state and territory besides Arizona? Boaters are exposed to, and learn the very basics of recreational boating laws and other valuable information in a short, six to eight hour classroom or online course.

Course Includes

Details regarding the direction boaters should be operating their craft on the lake, what all those different buoys and other informational markers mean, when navigation lights should be energized and under what conditions, the basic rules of the road (Navigation Rules) among many other topics.

How to avoid common mistakes and how to handle varying weather conditions are also key to keeping a good day on the water good. And one of the single most important safety information subjects is learning about different kinds of life jackets and which design you should wear when, depending on the type of boating you do. For example, if you paddle most of the time you'll likely find an inherently buoyant life jacket for appropriate that an inflatable as you're likely to get wet because of falling out of your canoe, kayak or off of your paddle board. If you'll be out in the sun all day on a relatively protected lake fishing on your open bass-boat you're likely to find an inflatable waist pack more comfortable.



More Intense Course

If you're up to date on all the state required education and are looking for something more informational, intense and hands-on you may want to consider taking a US Sailing / World Sailing certified International Safety at Sea Course. But be ready to spend one of the two days of this course in the water for a while. You'll be learning how to use personal safety gear, stay warm in the water, how to be more easily seen from a rescue aircraft and how to enter a life raft in this course designed especially for off-shore cruisers and racers. Learning about topics including how to use flares and smoke signals, putting out fires, basic first-aid, sea sickness treatments, damage repair, crew overboard, emergency communications, providing assistance to others to how to meet the Coast Guard or other rescue services half way as well as more.

Robust Training

Described by many as the most robust training they've had the opportunity to participate in, you will have reduced your statistical probability of being the victim of an accident or other maritime casualty by at least some 70-80 percent. And your insurance agent will likely give you a break on your boat premium when you provide them a copy of your completion



certificate. With the course is not NASB-LA approved, it is a requirement for 70% of the crew on board any sailboat competing in a US Sailing or World Sailing sanctioned race. And the cruisers, both power and sail, find it rewarding as well.



44-Mile Stretch Of Wild, Remote Colorado River Now Has 24/7 Coverage

TowBoatUS Fisher's Landing, Ariz., helps boaters and anglersget home after running aground.

It's a shallow, sandy-bottomed, blue ribbon of Colorado River that stretches 44 miles across the low desert of the remote Arizona Southwest. Now, recreational boaters and anglers navigating here from the Interstate 10 bridge down steam to the Imperial Dam have professional, 24/7 on-water towing and assistance available with the opening of TowBoatUS Fisher's Landing, Arizona. The company, located at Fisher's Landing Resort, is part of a

nationwide network of more than 600 red TowBoatUS towing response vessels, offers soft ungrounding, on-water towing, battery jump and fuel drop off services.

Capt. Kayla Fulcer, with extensive knowledge of the river and its backwaters, is lead captain at the newest TowBoatUS port. General Manager Charles Stankovich says, "I've been on the river 12 years, and we understand how boaters can have unexpected trouble. Getting fuel can be a

challenge, but what snags boats the most are the shallows. There are few markers and fluctuating water levels greatly affect navigability, even for smaller vessels," he adds. "We provide routine assistance to boaters, and help make their day get much better after a breakdown or running aground."

Stankovich offers that the resort's two tour boats and the 23- foot, red TowBoatUS response vessel are the only commercial vessels that ply these waters, which are a prime bass fishery. He highly recommends that boaters in this rugged and hot Arizona desert have a VHF radio aboard. "Cell coverage can be spotty, and a VHF radio is important for safety as well as to

SELLING A BOAT THIS YEAR?

Don't Forget These Four Critical Paperwork Tasks

The spring boat-buying season is upon us, much to the delight of boat sellers, some of whom may be eager to unload their boats after racking up off-season storage bills. However, when a boat is sold, sellers need to understand – sometimes for safety reasons – that they aren't in the free and clear until critical paperwork is done right. Here is a seller's paperwork to-do list from Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS).

- 1. Cancel the boat insurance policy. This is the first thing most boat sellers do right. It's super important to cancel a vessel's insurance policy once the sale goes through. Not doing so potentially adds unnecessary risk and potential liability to the seller. Also don't forget to cancel any automatic bank payments that were set up to pay policy premiums.
- 2. Release the 1DSC-VHF radio's Maritime Mobile Service Identity (MMSI) number. If you're selling your boat, remember a key fact about MMSI's: Once issued, the MMSI number stays assigned to the boat (installed VHF radios). The emergency contact information, among other data, requires updating. If a seller forgets to release the MMSI number to the buyer, a future mayday distress aboard the vessel could delay first responders. BoatUS members can release or update an MMSI for no cost at BoatUS. com/MMSI.
- **3. Have an EPIRB aboard?** A seller will need to ensure an Emergency Position-Indicating Rescue Beacon (EPIRB) attached to the boat is updated with new owner contact information. To update an EPIRB go to NOAA's Beacon Registration site and change the status to "Sold/Transferred." Once this happens, the new owner can register the beacon in their





Both Fishing And Hunting Have Special Days

Fishing is a beloved pastime for many, and many states offer "free fishing days' where residents and visitors can fish without a license. These days are a great opportunity for people to try out fishing for the first time, or for experienced anglers to introduce a friend or family member to the sport.

Free Fishing Day: June 1, 2024

The Arizona Game and Fish Department invites anglers to fish Arizona waters for free Saturday, June 3. It's an ideal time to take the family out for some fun and relaxing outdoor recreation. Arizona's Free Fishing Day is celebrated as part of National Fishing and Boating Week. As an incentive, a fishing license is not required Saturday for persons fishing any public



waters in Arizona.

While a fishing license is not needed Saturday, bag limits and other fishing regulations still apply and must be observed on Free Fishing Day. Children under 10 can fish for free all year long in Arizona, so this special fishing license exemption means that older kids and parents get a free pass for the day, as well.

Then, once you're hooked on fishing, purchase a valid Arizona online for only \$37 (for Arizona residents 18 and older). A combination fish/hunt license is only \$5 for youths 10 to 17.

Anglers also can share their fishing success stories and photos to AZGFD's FishAZ Facebook group, as well as connect with other anglers around the state.

National Hunting & Fishing Day is on September 28, 2024.

What is NHF Day? On May 2, 1972,

President Nixon signed the first-ever proclamation of National Hunting & Fishing Day, writing "I urge all citizens to join with outdoor sportsmen in the wise use of our natural resources and in insuring their proper management for the benefit of future generations."

Now in its 52nd year, NHF Day is the largest, most effective grassroots movement ever undertaken to promote outdoor sports and conservation. Celebrated on the fourth Saturday of every September, the federally recognized holiday brings together sportsmen and women from across America to celebrate the rich tradition of hunting, sport shooting and fishing through organized local, state and national events aimed at introducing new audiences to the outdoors.

Allow 10 to 15 business days to receive a hunt permit-tag by mail.



request routine on-water assistance."

Much like an auto club for recreational boat owners, Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) offers annual on-water Unlimited Towing Memberships for freshwater boaters and anglers for just \$109 per year. Towing, soft ungrounding, battery jumps and fuel drop-offs are all included along with more than 25 BoatUS benefits. Also offered with membership is a subscription to BoatUS Magazine, free DSC-VHF radio registration and more.

Like Fulcer, all of the company's cap-

tains are U.S. Coast Guard-licensed. Separate from BoatUS on-water towing services, the company offers vessel salvage and environmental remediation services.

This is the fifth and most southern TowBoatUS port on the lower Colorado River, which stretch north to Lake Mead, Nevada.



A National Icon

Photographers Emery and Ellsworth Kolb helped turn the Grand Canyon into a national icon. They built Kolb Studio, one of the earliest tourist destinations on the South Rim. The brothers began to take photographs of the mule riders from a small toll shack on the Bright Angel Trail. The toll shack would later become today's five story home, theater and photo studio built right on the edge of the canyon! The studio was used to document the trips of visitors and create imagery of Grand Canyon for 75 years.



'It's A Miracle': Yakima, Wash., Man Killed In Pearl Harbor Attack Is Home

Eighty-one years (2022) after he joined the U.S. Navy, Patrick Lloyd Chess is back home in Yakima.

Chess, who was killed in the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, was laid to rest Saturday in the veterans section of Tahoma Cemetery, Yakima, Wash. About 100 people attended the service, in which Chess was buried with full military honors by the U.S. Navy.

For Chess' family members, the service was the fulfillment of a hope spanning generations.

He Is Now Home

"It's a miracle," said his niece, Crystal Chess. "It is amazing that he is now home."

Chess' return was made possible through DNA samples provided by family members seven years ago to the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, which works to identify the remains of U.S. service members

Chess was born Nov. 28, 1917, in Yakima, the youngest of eight children of James and Josephine Chess. He worked on farms, said his great-niece, Darrilyn Cranney, and joined the Navy on Oct. 11, 1940

Assigned To USS Oklahoma

On Dec. 13, 1940, he was assigned to



USS Oklahoma

the crew of *USS Oklahoma*, one of the Navy's battleships, as a shipfitter.

Oklahoma was moored off Ford Island at Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, when it was hit by nine torpedoes from Japanese bombers. The ship capsized, trapping hundreds of sailors and marines in its hull.

429 Died

While some of the trapped sailors made it out, some through holes cut in the overturned hull by rescuers, 429 — including Chess — died on the ship, with their remains eventually recovered after *Oklahoma* was righted.

By 1947, only 35 of the remains were identified, and Chess and the rest of his shipmates were declared "nonrecoverable" by the Navy and buried at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific in Honolulu.

Awarded The Purple Heart

Chess, a third-class petty officer, was posthumously awarded the Purple

But Chess' family never gave up hope that one day he would be brought back to Yakima.

"His mother always wanted him to come home," Crystal Chess said.

Cranney said family members visited Hawaii several times, seeing his name on a plaque near the *USS Arizona* memorial, inscribed in the Courts of the Missing at the national cemetery in Honolulu and at the *USS Oklahoma* Memorial on Ford Island, where 429 white pillars are arranged to represent the dead shipmates as if they were "manning the rails."

Enter DNA Technology

In 2015, the POW/MIA Accounting Agency re-opened the case of the Oklahoma's crew. Armed with DNA technology, the government had the Oklahoma crew exhumed and brought to the laboratory at Offutt Air Force Base in Nebraska for testing.

Several Chess family members supplied DNA samples that could compared with the remains.

Chess Identified

In 2020, the Chess family received the news they were waiting for: Chess had been identified. While they learned that Chess was found, his nephews who spearheaded the effort to bring him back to Yakima, David Chess and Willis Raltz, died as funeral plans were delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

But Crystal Chess and other family members took over Chess' homecoming,

which began Monday when his remains were flown to Seattle and brought back to Yakima in a procession escorted by the Patriot Guard Riders and various police agencies.

Memorabilia At Viewing

More than 70 people attended a viewing for Chess at Shaw & Sons in Yakima Friday, where memorabilia, including the telegram telling the family that Chess had been lost, were displayed alongside his flag-draped casket.

Saturday, the funeral procession, with the Patriot Guard Riders providing motorcycle escort, entered the cemetery's east entrance, under an American flag strung between two Yakima Fire Department ladder trucks, and past his parents' graves to the veterans section of the cemetery. There, a Navy honor guard in dress white uniforms placed Chess' casket atop his grave and folded the flag.


"Amazing Grace"

U.S. Navy Rear Adm. Theodore LeClair, deputy director for operations for the Indo-Pacific Command, presented the flag to Crystal Chess. U.S. Army soldiers fired a 21-gun salute and a bagpiper played "Amazing Grace".

Chess' family members were grateful for the support and his return to Yakima.

"Something that wasn't right has been made right," said Lance Chess, a secondgreat-nephew of Chess.

EDITOR'S NOTE: I have reprinted this story from the Yakima Herald-Republic because it holds such special interest for me. Yakima, Wash., is my home town, and my brother (Don Lemon, Army, WWII) is also buried there in Tahoma Cemetery. This reprint is to honor them both and all who have served. ■



Mexican Wolf Population Grows For Eighth Consecutive Year

Joint announcement from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Arizona Game and Fish Department, New Mexico Department of Game and Fish

The wild population of Mexican wolves saw another year of growth in 2023, according to the results of the annual survey.

The 2023 population census revealed a minimum of 257 Mexican wolves distributed across Arizona and New Mexico. This increase marks the eighth consecutive year of population growth, the longest continuous streak since recovery efforts began.

Six Percent Increase

The 2023 population minimum count represents a six percent increase from the minimum of 242 wolves counted in 2022. Survey results show the population is distributed with a minimum of 144 wolves in New Mexico and 113 in Arizona.

"In the aggregate, the 2023 data points out that Mexican wolf recovery has come a long way since the first release," said Jim deVos, the Mexican wolf coordinator for the Arizona Game and Fish Depart-

Pups Selected For Genetic Value

'Each year, the free-roaming Mexican wolf population numbers increase and the areas they occupy expands. Genetic management using pups from captivity is also showing results. In total, 99 pups carefully selected for their genetic value have been placed in 40 wild dens since 2016,

and some of these fosters have produced litters of their own. While recovery is in the future, examining the last decade of data certainly provides optimism that recovery will be achieved."

Mexican wolf population information is gathered from November through February by the Interagency Field Team. During this time, the field team conducts ground and aerial surveys, using a variety of methods, including remote cameras, scat collection, and visual observation. Counting the population at the same time each winter allows for comparable yearto-year trends at a time of year when the Mexican wolf population is most stable.

Among The 2023 Findings

- · A minimum of 60 packs were documented at the end of 2023: 37 in New Mexico and 23 in Arizona. A wolf pack is defined as two or more wolves that maintain an established home range.
- A minimum of 138 pups were born in 2023, with at least 86 surviving until the end of the year (a 62 percent survival rate). In general, wild wolf populations have an average survival rate of 50 percent for pup survival in the first year.
- A minimum of 26 breeding pairs (15 in New Mexico, 11 in Arizona) was re-

Arizona Is Free Of CWD Disease

Chronic Wasting Disease Not Detected In Arizona's Deer, Elk Populations

No cases found in more than 1,200 samples tested from latest hunting seasons

The Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) has announced that Arizona continues to be clear of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), a fatal wildlife disease that affects the nervous system of deer and elk.

Department officials did not find any cases of CWD in the 1,235 deer (mule and white-tailed) and elk that were sampled in 2023. AZGFD collected 431 samples from animals that were harvested and voluntarily submitted by hunters, and another 732 samples through partnerships with game processors and taxidermists. An additional 72 samples were obtained from animals that were involved in vehicle collisions or subject to other fatalities.

AZGFD has been testing for the presence of the disease in Arizona since 1998.

Golden Algae-Caused Fish Kills Confirmed At Saguaro, Canyon Lakes

The Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) has confirmed golden algae toxin blooms as the cause of recent fish kills at both Saguaro and Canyon lakes.

When golden algae is the cause of a fish kill at one of the Salt River chain lakes (Saguaro, Canyon and Apache), varying degrees of fish kills are typically observed at all three of the lakes. AZGFD staff recently collected water-quality samples at both Saguaro and Canyon, which confirmed golden algae as the cause of the fish kills.

At Saguaro Lake

At Saguaro Lake, AZGFD staff observed small numbers of dead and dying threadfin shad (less than 500), along with a handful of other species including largemouth bass, bluegill and catfish. At Canyon Lake, about 1,000 dead threadfin shad were observed; no other species were affected at that time.

Golden algae can produce toxins harmful to gill-breathing animals, such as fish. Similar golden algae-related fish



kills have occurred at Saguaro, Canyon and Apache lakes since 2003. To date, no adverse health impacts have been noted for humans or non-gill-breathing wildlife that have come in contact with waters experiencing a golden algae toxin bloom.

Water Samples Confirm

In addition, select coves at Saguaro Lake appeared bright green in color, an indication of another type of algae present in high concentrations. Water samples confirmed a filamentous cyanobacteria Dolichospermum (formerly Anabaena) was also present in high concentrations.

Dolichospermum can release toxins that have been associated with health impacts on humans and pets. For more information on human health impacts, please refer to Arizona Department of Environmental Quality's website (https://azdeq.gov/AZHAB)

It is likely fish kills will continue at Saguaro, Canyon and Apache lakes over the next two months and range in severity. Occasionally, select coves at Roosevelt Lake are affected with minor fish kills, as well as the Salt River near the inflow to Roosevelt Lake. Salt River Project (SRP) will be doing its annual springtime swap to the Salt River, which is usually completed by late April.

AZGFD Will Closely Monitor

With the influx of water, there is a chance the algae bloom will be flushed through the system and decrease the severity of the fish kill. Keep in mind several factors can determine the severity and duration of fish kills in all three lakes. AZGFD will closely monitor the situation and provide updates as needed.

corded in 2023.

There were 113 collared wolves in the wild at the end of the year, which is 44 percent of the minimum population of Mexican wolves.

The field team documented additional success with fostering efforts in 2023. To date, a minimum of 15 fostered Mexican

wolf pups have survived to breeding age, and at least 10 fostered wolves have successfully bred and produced litters in the wild. Fostered Mexican wolves have produced more than 20 litters, and several of those offspring have gone on to produce pups of their own.

It's Encouraging

"It's encouraging to see success across the board with our recovery efforts," said Brady McGee, the Mexican wolf recovery coordinator for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "Having fostered Mexican wolves survive, disperse, pair up, breed, and start packs of their own tells us that fostering is working.

"These genetically diverse wolves, which came from captivity as pups and were placed into wild dens, play a vital role in boosting the genetic diversity of the wild population."

Listed Separately From Gray Wolves

The Mexican wolf is listed separately from the gray wolf as an endangered subspecies under the federal Endangered Species Act. In 1977, the Service and its partners initiated efforts to conserve the subspecies by developing a bi-national captive breeding program stemming from just seven Mexican wolves. Mexican wolves were first reintroduced to the wild in 1908

In addition to the minimum wild population, there are approximately 350 Mexican wolves currently maintained in more than 60 facilities throughout the United States and Mexico under the Mexican Wolf Saving Animals From Extinction program.

Partners In Recovery

Partners in Mexican wolf recovery in the United States include the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Arizona Game and Fish Department, New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, U.S. Department of Agriculture USDA) Forest Service, USDA APHIS Wildlife Services, White Mountain Apache Tribe, Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, and the Saving Animals From Extinction program. ■



While CWD has been found in the neighboring states of Utah, New Mexico and Colorado, the disease has not been detected in Arizona. CWD has not been documented to cause disease in people.

Pack your shorts, flip flops and sunscreen, and come see why Lake Havasu City is a lake boating paradise! ■




