
Katie Hobbs Nominates James E. Goughnour To Arizona Game And Fish Commission

Wear a life jacket. Every trip. Every time.

Under state law, life jackets are required to be worn by children 12 years old and younger, but it's strongly urged that everyone wear one while on the water. Life jackets save lives.

Before heading out on the water, it's important that boaters check to ensure that their life jackets are in good condition and that they are the right size and fit for passengers. Look for:

- Any rips or tears
- Missing straps
- Broken fasteners
- Ensure that the flotation hasn't shifted.

Life jackets should be inspected each boating season due to the environment's impact on their materials and replaced if neccessary.

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BoatUS: Be Vigilant When Renewing Your Boat's USCG Vessel Documentation

Official-looking vessel documentation renewal notices can lead to confusion and higher costs.

Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) is advising boaters with vessels that have a U.S. Coast Guard Certificate of Documentation to be wary of any letter arriving by U.S. mail offering renewal.

BoatUS advises that while the Coast Guard does send official annual renewal notices by U.S. mail, other notices being received by BoatUS members are not from the Coast Guard but rather third-party companies whose name or return addresses may appear similar to that of the official U.S. Coast Guard National Vessel Documentation Center (NVDC).

Members have complained that these letters direct them to websites that may be mistaken for the actual Coast Guard NVDC located in Falling Waters, West Virginia, and appear to show a significant increase in the annual fee to renew Coast Guard documentation.

A 2017 Coast Guard bulletin says in part:

"The NVDC is aware that there are commercial entities that offer to manage the certification/renewal process on behalf of vessel owners for a fee. The Coast Guard does not endorse any of these companies, and the companies do not operate on behalf of the Coast Guard in any



way. Any fees charged or agreements offered by such companies are in no way associated with the NVDC certification process. In addition, these companies are not authorized to issue any form of documentation, including travel letters and/or permits that authorize operation of ANY vessel. Customer complaints can be made through the Federal Trade Commission>s (FTC) website at https://www.ftc.gov/."

While third-party companies may legitimately provide services to assist with vessel documentation renewals, the Coast Guard's own renewal process is simple for most vessels and the price, \$26 annually, is often much lower than what thirdparty services may charge.

To renew, go to the U.S. Coast Guard National Documentation Center website and click on "instructions and forms," then "Certificate of Documentation Application for Renewal." The Coast Guard NVDC also offers renewal options up to five years for recreational vessels.

To be documented, a vessel must measure at least 5 net tons (10,000 lbs.) and,

What 222,000 Boaters Got Wrong

Test your knowledge: Take a BoatUS Foundation online boating course this winter.

The BoatUS Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water offers a range of online boating safety training courses — including 36 free state boating safety courses — that make boating safety education affordable and accessible.

More than 220,000 boaters took one of these boating certification courses last year, which require students to correctly answer some questions at the conclusion of each course. Which questions did course takers get wrong most often? While we can't outright give you the answers, here are some topics that course takers – or any boater – would be wise to study.

1. Do you know which way air moves? If you had said "from the prevailing direction," you'd be incorrect. Air ultimately moves from high-pressure areas to low-pressure areas, caused by the uneven heating of the earth's surface. Weather for Boaters has more.

2. You're in Mexico on the hook and you see a yellow (Q) flag flying on the boat next to you. Being a friendly type, you welcome the neighboring crew to port with coffee and muffins, but they politely decline. What's up? Did you just happen to have bad luck to find yourself next to the only cranky boat crew in Baja? While the flag indicates the vessel is healthy, it also means it is requesting approval – under quarantine – to enter port. Therefore, it's best to hold off on the kaffeeklatsch until they've cleared

in. Whether you're headed near or afar, Planning Your Cruise will help you stay on the right side of the law.

3. There's a lot of new technology on boats today, and one of them growing in popularity is AIS, or Automatic Identification System, which can help you steer clear of ship traffic. How does it work? AIS uses VHF radio frequencies to broadcast the AIS information, including a vessel's unique identification, position, course and speed. AIS is also likely one of the last few remaining things that your smartphone cannot do by itself ... yet.

4. Can you explain compass variation and deviation? Variation is caused by the misalignment of the magnetic lines of force with the meridians of longitude (those imaginary lines from North Pole to South Pole), while deviation is caused by the effects of the magnetic properties of the vessel. What this also means is due to deviation, you might want to remove the wrench you left in the storage drawer located just under the helm compass to ensure accurate functioning. Modern Marine Navigation has more.

5. What is the length of a mile? When you're setting up your GPS, it's a big deal whether you choose statute miles or nautical miles. A statute mile, at 5,280 feet, is about 12% shorter than a nautical mile, or **6,076** feet. The BoatUS Foundation's How to Use GPS course shows how that whopping 796 feet of difference is more than enough room to get into trouble.

6. You're in your powerboat heading down the lake and another powerboat

less than a half-mile ahead appears to be meeting or crossing with you and makes two short horn blasts. What does this mean? If you said that the boats intend to pass you starboard side to starboard side, congratulate yourself for this correct answer! You can learn all the signals you need to operate a boat safely by taking a free, state-specific Basic Boating Course.

Boating Infrastructure Grants Offer Funding For Docks, Visiting Boater Amenities

States and U.S. territories that shared \$19.8 million in total BIG funding in the 2023 grant cycle included Arizona.

Does your town or region make it easy for boaters to visit and spend locally? Having safe, protected dockage and offering amenities to these tourists by water can bring boaters in, but how do you pay for it? The Boating Infrastructure Grant (BIG) program, first championed by Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS), has proven effective in attracting boaters and their spending dollars by providing safe transient dockage as well as a range of important boater amenities.

Since its inception in 1998, BIG has

BIG gives traveling boaters parking spots to safely tie up for the night and facilitates access and tourism spending in waterfront communities, such as this recently completed Tier 1 BIG project in New Iberia, Louisiana. and small engines. BIG project costs are shared through matching funds, typically provided by a state, county or town. The application deadline for public municipalities, marinas or boat clubs varies in each state, as do program requirements. To get started, the State's Organization for Boating Access offers BIG Applicant's Guide as well as a list of state boating agency contacts. State application deadlines are typically each Fall.

Here's a look at the BIG program by the numbers:

\$20 million: The amount of BIG funds available to local municipalities and marinas in the 2024 grant cycle for the construction, renovation and maintenance of safe harborage for transient vessels.

2: The number or type of BIG funding "tiers" accepting applications. Tier 1 provides funds for smaller projects up to \$200,000 and is noncompetitive. Tier 2 provides a maximum of \$1.5 million per application and is competitive. Both tiers require a minimum additional 25% matching share funds. **6,800+**: The number of transient berths across the U.S. that the BIG program has created since its inception. Each


provided \$283 million for safe harbor facilities including infrastructure such as piers, breakwaters, floating docks, bulkheads, mooring buoys, day docks, dinghy docks, slips, bathrooms, showers, laundries, recycling stations, fuel docks, utilities, navigation aids, limited dredging and other services. A key BIG requirement is that grant funds must be designed for use

by for visiting transient boats greater than 26 feet in length for stays of up to 15 days. Managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service but administered locally through state boating agencies, BIG funding comes from taxes that boaters and anglers pay on motorboat fuel, fishing tackle and equipment, imported boats,

Catching Cold Front Crappie: Fish Slowly, Methodically

A lot of old-timers will tell you that the best way for a crappie fisherman to deal with a cold front is to stay home. Unfortunately, most of us don't have the luxury of choosing which days to go fishing. Why does it always seem like the dreaded cold fronts pass through just before the weekend, or right in the middle of the tournament?

Crappie Recover Faster

The effects of a cold front are particularly devastating in the spring. A five degree drop in surface temperature can drive the fish off the beds in a flash, and stop a great bite in its tracks. Crappie may react to a cold front much faster than largemouth bass, but the upside to that is that they also recover faster.

There are a couple of ways you can react to cold front conditions and put some fish in the boat, and you can also prepare for a cold front so you'll spend less time looking for fish and more time catching them. Kelly Matthews guides for crappie on Weiss Lake in Alabama. When he has a trip scheduled, he can't just postpone it because of weather. Over the years, he's found ways to continue to put slabs in the boat and keep his clients happy.

Getting Crappie To Bite

"You can be loading the boat every trip with slab crappie up on the spawning flats," says Kelly, "and then it happens: a cold front brings a nasty north wind and shuts down the spawn just like that." The surface temperature on Weiss Lake can drop from 52 to 47 degrees and shut the trolling bite down in a heartbeat, and the effects can last three to four days. Kelly says that on Weiss Lake, a lot of anglers just call it quits and decide to park in front of the television for a few days. Not having that option, he has learned that by changing his tactics and slowing his presentation, he can get the crappie to bite.

Normally, spring will find Matthews trolling jigs through the shallows, but once a front moves through that bite seems to disappear. "You have to keep in mind that the more severe the cold front is, the further back to the main lake the crappie will retreat," he says. At other times, he finds that although there are fish in the same areas he's been fishing, they simply won't bite.

Same Place, Different Method

One of Kelly's cold front techniques is to fish the same area he found crappie in before the front passed, but using a different presentation. "A lot of times those same fish can be caught by slowing way down using a fly and cork rig," he explains. A fly and cork rig is not only a great way to fish for reluctant biters, it's also easy to use on windy days.

Matthews prefers a pear-shaped "cork" with just the bottom of the bobber secured to the line. This allows the cork to float

on its side in the water, then stand straight up when a fish takes the fly. This built-in strike indicator makes it easy for even a beginner to know when to set the hook.

Jigs Are Crucial Part

The jigs are a crucial part of Kelly's cork and fly presentation. He uses two 1/32-ounce Southern Pro jig heads tied about fourteen inches apart on 6-pound-test Sufix line. The two 1/32-ounce jigs are light enough to allow the cork to rest on its side – anything heavier will tend to stand the cork upright. He ties the jigs on with loop knots to allow them as much action as possible.

"I put a Southern Pro two-inch Hot Grub on the bottom hook and a two-inch Stinger on the top hook so I get different styles at different depths," Kelly says. "Another thing that will help you get the fish in the boat is to keep an EGO Reach crappie net close by – those inactive fish are sometimes just barely hooked and they will get off if you try to lift them into the boat."

Tempting The Fish

The best way to work this rig is to make the longest casts you can, then work the rig very slowly by twitching the rod tip to move it back toward the boat. Matthews fishes his cork and fly rig on an 8-foot B'n'M pole so he can really sling it out there. What he's trying to do is give the jigs a good chance to come in contact with the isolated stumps that are scattered over the flats. He's going after the same fish that he was catching aday earlier with a trolling rig.

Often, those fish will remain in the same area after a cold front, but hunker in tighter to cover. Twitching this rig ever so slowly across the flat will let the lures stay in the strike zone long enough to tempt the fish into biting.

Success With Technique

in the surface temperature," says Kelly. This presentation requires confidence and a knowledge of the area you are fishing.

Most of the time you'll be fan-casting to open water with no visible structure. If you were just catching fish there a few days before, you know what kind of structure is beneath the surface. Keep the jigs just barely moving, and be patient. The fly and cork can be a real day-saver, especially in early spring.

Finesse For Severe Fronts

Since not all the crappie in the lake move up to spawn at the same time, there are always some located on channel ledges adjacent to the spawning flats this time of year, says Matthews. When a bad front blows through, he moves out to those channel ledges and targets those deeper fish. "The major factor for this kind of fishing is the north winds that usually accompany the front," he explains. "I try to plan ahead by knowing a few spots that are protected from a hard north wind."

Launch In Protected Areas

A good lake map and a little pre-trip studying will help you locate areas that are out of the wind to some degree. If the wind is really bad it can be difficult to navigate from place to place, so you may want to plan your launch site so you're close to protected areas.


Bottom bumping is a finesse technique for crappie that requires a lot of patience as well as excellent boat control skills. This can make it difficult, so it's usually Kelly's second choice – made after the fly and cork technique has failed to produce. "At this point we're dealing with a sudden deep freeze that has sent most of the crappie back out to the comforts of deeper water," says Kelly.

Live Minnows

These fish are fairly inactive, so Matthews uses live minnows to get them to bite. It's a vertical presentation on a dropper rig, very similar to fishing a drop-shot rig for bass. He spools up with 12-poundtest Sufix. The heavier line means that most of the time he can pull a snagged jig loose. "There's nothing worse than having to retie your rig every time you hang a stump," he says.

The hook he uses is an Eagle Claw #2 Aberdeen, tied on about eighteen to twenty inches above a half-ounce bell sinker. He fishes this rig on an eight-foot B'n'M pole. This rod gives him plenty of length so he can get the presentation away from

one is an economic engine for the local community that benefits traveling boaters.

26: The minimum length in feet of a recreational boat that the BIG program is designed to attract. This is about the size of a vessel with three key onboard amenities critical for overnight stays or

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Jump In The 'Pool' For Population Management Hunts

AZGFD aims to meet elk objectives.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) is seeking to bolster its pool of hunters who apply to be randomly selected throughout the year for specific population management hunts.

Population management hunts enhance the department's ability to meet population and habitat management objectives when traditional harvest strategies are not meeting these objectives. At this time, a population management hunt for any elk is planned for February in portions of Game Management Unit 28, near Safford, Ariz. The date for this hunt is pending at press time.

Only those hunters who have submitted a Hunter Pool Application for population management hunts will have a chance to be drawn. Applicants should note that if they choose to participate in a population management hunt, and fill their annual bag limit for that species, they cannot take part in a general season for that species even



if selected through the standard draw process. A successful hunter is still eligible to purchase a bonus point for elk in the upcoming general draw, however.

AZGFD encourages all interested hunters to complete a "Hunter Pool Application, which can be found — along with detailed information about population management hunts — on Page 51 of the "2023-2024 Arizona Hunting Regulations."

Applicants should mail their completed application and nonrefundable application fee of \$13 for residents, or \$15 for nonresidents (do not send cash), to Arizona Game and Fish Department, Attn.: Drawer FAB, 5000 W. Carefree Highway, Phoenix,


the boat, and makes landing the fish easier than with a longer pole.

Important: How You Hook Your Minnows

"I think it's very important how you hook your minnows," emphasizes Kelly. "You want to hook them so they stay alive longer and look natural to the crappie, so I hook mine straight through the eyes."

Weiss Lake is a man-made lake of about 30,000 acres. The deepest channels, says Matthews, are twenty-five to thirty feet deep. These creek and river channels are where the crappie head when a severe cold front hits. When you begin to fish these deeper areas you are looking for one thing – structure. There is no point wasting time fishing barren sections of the ledges, insists Kelly.

This is where pre-study of a lake map pays off. First of all, Matthews finds the channels. Then he moves over them slowly, looking for structure. A depthfinder is a vital tool for this search. He keeps the boat moving slowly by heading into the wind.

The heavy weight helps keep the line vertical as you bump it gently up and down, keeping the weight in contact with the bottom. Once he sees structure, Kelly stops and takes the time to work the structure from all sides, letting the rig rest for a few seconds each time he moves it. On Weiss Lake, he can usually manage to pick up six to eight nice slabs off each piece of structure using this technique.

On Roosevelt Lake, a cold front will send crappie to deeper water immediately. "It's the worse thing that can happen in the spring," Curt Ramboused to tell me. "Five degrees difference is all it takes, and they're gone. They can go from being two feet deep to being twelve or fourteen feet deep just like that."

When this happens, Rambo heads out to the secondary dips or ditches. Roosevelt is a typical Arizona reservoir, which means it can be well over a hundred feet deep in places. There is very little structure besides rocks and a few old mesquites. Most

of what the fish use in Roosevelt is rock piles. But savvy anglers like Curt will put out brush just like crappie fishermen everywhere.

"Go out to your deeper stuff and slow way down," Curt recommends. His specialty is vertical jigging, and when the bite has been shut down by a cold front he slows down to half as fast as he was fishing before. He often goes to a smaller bait and a lighter jig. The lighter jig falls slowly and gives you more time in the strike zone.

"You'll have to put your jig right in the brush and wiggle it two or three times," says Curt, "and when they bite all you get is a little slack in your line." This kind of fishing requires an extraordinary amount of concentration and finesse, and can be difficult to do in the wind. If wind is a problem you can move to another area or try a heavier jig. The fish are lethargic, so you have to tease them into biting.

A cold front, even a severe one, doesn't have to mean calling off that fishing trip. Pack a jacket, do a little map searching beforehand, and be prepared to fish slowly and methodically. With a little patience, you can put fish in the boat despite the weather. ■







Hassayampa River Preserve

This place changes with the seasons, and cool rainy seasons are the best! The ground is carpeted with grass so green it looks fake, and there are little streams to cross on wooden planks, which the kids absolutely love. There are plenty of trails here, and the visitor center is a beautiful old building that is fun to explore as well. A few years back the Nature Conservancy took care of this place, but now the Maricopa County Parks runs the Preserve.

You might see any of 280 species of birds that live or migrate through this amazing place, and the trails are beautiful with lots of trees, a lovely pond called Palm Lake, benches to sit on, and a picnic area. Last time we were there a fox was in the picnic area! They have guided bird walks (registration required), a discovery station called Cactus Curiosity, and a guided riparian walk that also requires

This is one of our favorite desert hikes and the girls still love to go there. After the hike it's our tradition to have breakfast at the Grotto in Cave Creek – it makes for a great day. We've taken many of their friends to Dragonfly as well, and everyone loves it. It's a pretty easy hike, only about a mile and a half long, and not too much elevation gain. Pretty smooth going most of the way, but not set up for strollers or wheelchairs at all.

When Cave Creek is flowing this trail is really hard to beat. The lower part of the trail follows the creek for quite a ways, then crosses the creek right before a big open area that turns into a nice little pond when the creek is running. There are plank bridges for the crossings. There used to be a little cave the kids liked to go in (only about 4 feet deep) but last time we were there it was closed off.

You'll see a lot of gorgeous Arizona scenery here in the riparian area by the Montezuma Castle, but of course if it's your first time, definitely do both. The well is about an 11 mile trip north from the castle. Park, walk up a small hill, and boom! There's Montezuma Well, a circular depression with an almost perfectly round lake at the bottom. There is a paved path down to the water, and there are cliff dwellings along the sides of the sinkhole.

Kids absolutely love walking that little trail and exploring some of the ruins, and there are interpretive signs to help you understand the importance and uniqueness of this spot. Whatever you do, don't miss the trail to the outlet. Water comes out of the rocks there and goes into a little channel and the area right around it is lush and shady, so different from the desert around it. This place is definitely magical and the kids absolutely love it. Pets on leashes are allowed (leashes 6' and under).

PLEASE DO NOT DISTURB **Bald Eagles Prepare For Next Generation**

Arizona's bald eagles are back, and they are now preparing for the next generation of eagles at breeding sites statewide.

To assist with the state's continued bald eagle population growth, the Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) encourages outdoor recreationists, aircraft pilots, drone operators and motorized paragliders to do their part by not disturbing the state's 97 eagle breeding areas.

To protect breeding attempts, some portions of public land and water areas will be temporarily closed to help these majestic animals and ensure even more young eagles take to the skies this spring.

"Arizona's bald eagles are hard at work preparing their nest for what we hope will be a productive breeding season,' said Kenneth "Tuk" Jacobson, bald eagle management coordinator. "The birds nest, forage and roost at rivers and lakes that are also popular recreation spots. That's why we must be vigilant to help protect



the birds and ensure their populations statewide continue to flourish. That success wouldn't be possible without the cooperation of outdoor recreationists who respect the closures during the breeding season."

During the 2023 breeding season, 76 young hatched, and 65 reached the important milestone of their first flight, known as fledging.

Pilots are reminded to maintain the FAA-recommended 2,000-foot above

ground level advisory when flying over bald eagle habitat, while drones and paragliders are asked to avoid the areas completely. Bald eagles are sensitive to even short durations of low-flying aircraft activity near their nests, and just a few minutes of disturbance can lead to a nesting failure.

Help conserve and protect bald eagles, and conservation research and recovery efforts, by reporting any harassment or shooting of bald eagles. Call the Arizona Game and Fish Operation Game Thief Hotline at 800-352-0700 or U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Law Enforcement at 480-967-7900.

AZGFD's bald eagle management efforts are supported by the Heritage Fund, an initiative passed more than 30 years ago to provide for wildlife education and conservation through Arizona lottery ticket sales.

Walk On The Wild Side: Yuma Wetlands Wildlife Area

Located in western Arizona, the Yuma Wetlands Wildlife Area offers outdoor recreational opportunities such as wildlife viewing, angling and hiking. There is a 2.5-mile walking trail that takes visitors through areas of restored cottonwood, willow and mesquite habitat along the Colorado River and restored back channel.

Common mammals in the wildlife area include beavers, bobcats, Botta's pocket gophers, cactus mouse, desert cottontails, round-tailed ground squirrels, and gray foxes. Common birds include brown pelicans, white-faced ibis, great egrets, least bitterns, snowy egrets, killdeer, Yuma clapper rails, and Gila woodpeckers.

Yuma Wetlands is located at Gateway Park in downtown Yuma. A walking trail begins at the eastern edge of Gateway Park, at Gila and 1st streets.

New Data Warehouse **Tracks Wildlife, Including Those Pesky Javelina**

Kudos to StateScoop and reporter Keely Quinlan for a recent news story about how the Arizona Game and Fish Department is consolidating all of its wildlife tracking data into a new, cloudbased management system known as the wildlife data warehouse.

With the data available in one place, Arizona's wildlife researchers can help conservationists, policymakers and land developers make better-informed decisions about how to coexist with wildlife, including those pesky javelina.

A few points about population management hunts:

• AZGFD will purge the Hunter Pool Application list Dec. 31 each year. An application may be submitted at any time during the year (do not include the Hunter Pool Application with a hunt permit-tag application. Each application must be sent

• If selected during a random drawing for a population management hunt, the department will attempt to contact the applicant within a 24-hour period. If that applicant cannot be contacted, their application will be returned to the pool for inclusion in future population management hunts that year.

 If a successful applicant agrees to participate in a population management hunt, it is likely that person will be asked to arrive in the field to hunt within a few days of being contacted. The purchase of a restricted non-permit-tag and applicable hunting license prior to hunting is required.
An applicant will not gain or lose bonus points when applying for, or participating in, a population management hunt.

fish. Buy a general fishing license, or combination hunt and fish license, online at www.azgfd.com/license/ (youth under age 10 do not need a license).

• **Support wildlife.** Wildlife lovers can put their money where their heart is by joining our Conservation Membership program. Your annual dues provide much-needed funding to sustain important wildlife and habitat conservation projects. Help to ensure a wildlife legacy for the future.

• Take a youngster outdoors. Look for animal tracks together and identify the critter that made them. Armed with only a bird identification guide, embark on a "hunting" expedition and see how many species you can find. A day in the field will create memories that last a lifetime — for both of you.

• Pick it up. Vow to clean up not only after yourself, but those who aren't as considerate. Take an extra trash bag along on your next outing, and spend a few minutes picking up those empty cans, cigarette butts or campsite trash. After all, respected access is open access.

• Be a wildlife viewer. Arizona provides some of the best wildlife-viewing opportunities in the nation, with more than 800 species of native wildlife. It's a fun, inexpensive activity that the entire family can enjoy.

• Invest in good optics. Most hunters know that success in the field begins with a quality pair of binoculars or spotting scope. Don't skimp. Better to buy the best you can afford that fits your needs than settle for a middle-of-theroad piece of equipment and be forced to upgrade later.

• Be a conservationist. It's difficult to imagine what our wildlife populations might be like today without the North American Model of Wildlife






