Filing A Float Plan

Before going out on a vessel, it is always a good idea to leave a float plan with a relative or friend, or at least with a local marina.

• A float plan should:
• Describe the vessel, including its

ATTENTION BOATERS Don't Pick Up Hitchhikers!


You can PREVENT destruction of fish habitat and loss of boating opportunities by helping to eliminate the spread of nuisance aquatic weeds, quagga mussels, and other unwanted aquatic pests.

What can you do? Inspect your boat!

Inspecting — Thoroughly inspect your boat's hull, outdrives, trim plates, trolling plates, prop guards, transducers, and trailer. If you see any "hitchhikers," remove them. Remove aquatic plants and

plant fragments clinging to the trailer frame, axles, wheels, hitch, moter's lower unit, and interior boat spaces. Spray down your boat and trailer before leaving any lake or stream or at home before setting out for a new boating location.

Draining — Drain all bilge water, live wells, and bait buckets before leaving any waterway. Leftover bait should not released or transported.



Remove and dispose of plants on dry land

Stop the spread of aquatic pests!

Giant salvinia, quagga mussels, crayfish, and mud snails most often spread be tween waterways by hitching a ride on vessels and trailers. When transplanted

into new waters, these organisms proliferate, displacing native species and damaging the water

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Safety Is Paramount When You're Out On A Boat

Be "situationally aware," advises Kevin Bergersen, state boating-law administrätor with AZGFD.

Temperatures are warming up, and that means more people will be taking to Arizona's waterways for boating fun in the

While a day on the water offers relaxation and recreation, safe-boating practices are key to enjoying your outing.

The most important thing to do when on the water is to be "situationally aware," said Kevin Bergersen, state boating law administrator with the Arizona Game and Fish Department. That means know what is going on around you, and that conditions on the water can change quickly.

"In high winds, rough conditions, stormy weather and at night, break out the life jackets and put them on," Bergersen said. "When things start to look bad, it could be bad."

Already this year a 21-year-old man drowned on March 24 after he fell off an inner tube while being towed by a boat near Windsor Beach on Lake Havasu. Preliminary indications are that the man, whose body was found Monday was not wearing a life jacket, according to the Mo-



have County Sheriff's Office. The accident is still under investigation.

Bergersen said to remember to Boat Safe, Boat Smart and Boat Sober.

Boat Safe

Boat safe by avoiding waterskiing in congested areas, steering clear of nearby boaters, avoiding excessive speeds while towing skiers, knowing your limits, and re-

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A REMINDER TO BOATERS

Don't Try To 'Mussel' In

From Glen Canyon Recreation Area

PAGE, Ariz. — A vessel with adult mussels attached was intercepted Wednesday at the Bullfrog Marina inspection station at Glen Canyon National Recreation Area. The vessel was thoroughly decontaminated by National Park Service staff and will be held in quarantine until the boat no longer poses a threat to Lake Powell or any other water body.

The vessel had been moored on Lake Mead — where mussels are known to exist — before being hauled to Bullfrog. This is the first vessel with mussels intercepted prior to launching on Lake Powell this year

Invasive quagga and zebra mussels are a major threat to our quality of life. They are small, clam-like creatures that reproduce rapidly and deplete food in the water. As such, they jeopardize fish populations, damage power and water infrastructures, and decrease the health of ecosystems.

As the boating season begins, visitors are reminded to prevent the spread of mussels and other aquatic invasive species by always cleaning, draining, and drying their vessels, anchors, and other equipment each time they are used.



Sixteen boats harboring mussels were intercepted prior to launching on Lake Powell last year. Coming to Lake Powell with vessels and equipment properly prepared to launch will ensure every boater's ability to get on the water more quickly.

While a typical decontamination takes less than ten minutes and is offered at no cost to Glen Canyon visitors, when mussels are found, the vessel will be decontaminated and held in quarantine for up to



a 30-day drying period to make sure any hidden mussels have not survived. For more information, visit

trieving skiers rapidly from busy waters. Boaters should always travel in a counterclockwise direction while on the water.

"Boaters should keep the closest shore over their right shoulder, and they shouldn't cut blind corners where oncoming boaters can't see them," Bergersen said.

In addition, he said, all people on board must have a readily available, properly sized U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket. Children 12 and younger must wear them anytime a boat is under way; there is no mandatory wear law for those older than 12. If you don't want to wear a life jacket all the time, Bergersen said, it is critical that you put one on at night, in storms and when the water is cold.

Boat Smart

Boat smart by taking a boating safety education class and learning the navigation rules of the waterways. Educated boaters are safer boaters. Boating accident statistics show that more than 70 percent of all boat operators involved in accidents have not attended any formal boating safety ed-

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ucation classes. An online course may be found at boat-ed.com/Arizona.

Boat Sober

Boat sober by having a designated boat operator. Consuming alcohol is allowed on a boat, but the operator cannot be under the influence of alcohol (known as Operating Under the Influence, or OUI). Just like driving a motor vehicle under the influence, the legal limit for blood alcohol while operating a boat is .08. OUI is a Class One misdemeanor. You can be arrested.

"Booze and boats don't mix," Bergersen said, noting that alcohol is a contributing factor in 40 percent of all fatal recreational boating accidents in Arizona.

LAKE POWELL FISH REPORT

Between Spring Storms, Fishing Will Be Excellent

Fishing is fantastic as long as you are fishing for bass in the afternoon. Bass spawning is imminent. It may take a little while longer due to unsettled weather, but fishing will remain very good for bass for the rest of the month.

Water temperature still declines into the mid 50s overnight, but by afternoon, water in the backs of the canyons and coves warms to the mid 60s. This warming and cooling cycle produces the best bass fishing of the year.

Sight Fishing

Sight fishing for very big bass makes fishing very exciting. Bass are cruising the shallow shoreline looking for nest sites. Water is often crystal clear, making bass very visible as they leisurely swim

from one clump of brush to the next.

The secret to actually catching bass is to put the lure in front of them before you see each other. Bass can see you as well as you can see them.

One approach is to mark the spot where a large bass or nest is seen. Return a few hours later. Throw a long cast to the bush where the bass lives. Let the bait rest on bottom for at least a minute or two and then twitch it once. That should result in a hook up if the bass is still there.

The best lure this week was a 5 or 6 inch Yamamoto Senko fished on an offset

AZGFD Launches New Interactive Online Fishing Map

Can a mouse help you catch fish? It can if it's a computer mouse.

Finding out where to fish and lots of other great information is just a mouse click away thanks to a new interactive online fishing map just launched by the Arizona Game and Fish Department.

Just visit gis.azgfd.gov/fishandboat or www.azgfd.gov and you will find 150 of Arizona's best fishing lakes, streams and

Besides showing how to get there, the interactive fishing map also provides lots of other useful information, including the type



of fish species, the available facilities and concessions, and even special regulations that might apply.

This is an interactive Google map, which is very user friendly, so finding information about a fishery is just a click away, or maybe a touch away if you have a touch screen," says Eric Swanson, the fisheries biologist who spearheaded creating the new site.

Swanson added that the map navigation is also keyed to other things, such as fish species. "For instance, if you want to know where to catch native Apache trout, then just click on the box and on the map it will

Arizona Has Two New High School State Champion Anglers

Christian Borucki and Brandon Koon of the Bad Bass Fishing Club in Phoenix won the second-ever Arizona High School Fishing State Championship at Lake Pleasant on Saturday, April 6 by weighingin five bass totaling 12.08 pounds.

These two talented high school anglers targeted mostly post-spawn bass on what started out as a windy day at Lake Pleasant. Their coach and mentor for the event was Mike McFarland, a veteran tournament angler and guide.

Borucki and Koon will advance to the FLW Outdoors/Bass Federation High School Fishing Conference Championship that will be held in conjunction with the National Guard FLW College Fishing Conference Championship.

Cactus Shadows, **Mountain Shadows**

Ironically, these two champion team-mates attend rival schools, at least when it comes to traditional sports. Borucki goes to Cactus Shadows High School in Cave Creek and Koon goes to Mountain Shadows High School in Phoenix.

Koon is rapidly making a name for himself — he and his former teammate, Thomas Chambers, won the 2011 National High School Fishing Championship.

For the Arizona championship last weekend, there were 16 two-person high school teams (grades 9-12) from throughout Arizona participating in this major state championship, which was conducted by the Bass Federation in partnership with FLW Outdoors and the Arizona Bass Federation.

All state championship participants qualify for the largest event in high school fishing, the 2012 High School Fishing World Finals where they can compete for thousands of dollars in college scholarship and prizes.

Ultimately, A \$5,000 Scholarship

Each team that qualifies for a conference and/or national championship will re-ceive a travel allowance to help offset expenses. Ultimately, the national champions will each receive a \$5,000 scholarship to use at whatever university they

Spring Has Arrived; Fish Are Waiting

After more than two decades we decided it was time to upgrade our Web site, leesferry.com. Our new site is live and I invite you visit us

You will find this new site to be loaded with information about our river and fishing. The site will continue to grow and change so check back often

The weather in late March has been

clear and warm ('70s). Spring has arrived at Lees Ferry and the trees are budding out and the birds are migrating.

A spring cold front is expected, which

will bring moisture and cooler temperatures for a few days. However, the fishing has been so good that the fish have even been happy in crummy weather!

Fly Fishing Up-River

New water flows began well over a

month ago, and the river is running 7,000cfs to 13,000cfs; the water is slowly and steadily rising throughout the day and not dropping until late in the evening.

This flow is very different from the flows in February, which were rising and then dropping at noon and then rising again after 5 p.m. The current flows are better for fishing as fish are much happier with rising water than falling water.

show all the waters with these wonderful native trout. It's simple, easy and very intuitive to use."

The map also contains lots of information for recreational boaters as well. "By May we will be posting more detailed boating information, so from that standpoint, it's a work in progress. The fishing information, however, is very robust," Swanson says

worm hook. Fish it very patiently.

The good news about early warming and small runoff is that sight fishing for cruising and nesting bass may be prolonged into May. Bass nests made this week may still be visible and only a foot or two deeper during May.

Bass fishing will be good enough that all anglers will be successful. So, remember to release largemouth bass and male smallmouth bass that are guarding nests. It is fine to keep smallmouth bass 12 inches and smaller.

Crappie Ready To Nest

Crappie are hanging in the submerged trees and are visible in clear water. They too will be on nests by the third week of April if not earlier.

Crappie limit is 10 fish as we try to protect the population for future years when brush inevitably declines and survival of young crappie will be more difficult.

Keep 10 crappie and release the rest for another day

Striped Bass: A Mystery

Striped bass are a bit of a mystery. Yearling stripers up to 15 inches are eating plankton in the back of the canyons in treetops where bottom depth is 15-25 feet. Trees stick up to 5-10 feet under the sur-

Trolling and casting very shallow-running crankbaits is most effective during morning and evening hours. stripers make occasional appearances in the treetops but most of the time they are missing in action.

Finding big stripers is a random event. The most successful pattern is to troll or fish deep-running spoons and jigs along drop-offs where depth changes rapidly from 40 to 25 feet. Isolated schools are cooperative when found but very difficult to locate

Adult stripers are not often seen on the graph in deep water, and are more likely to be found toward the back of the canyon or along the edge of the main channel. They have not moved toward the channel

Do not expect to find large numbers of stripers in the deep water channel this spring. They are fat and lazy, living off stored fat from the many shad that were eaten last fall. They will stay in the backs of canyons until water warms into the 70s.

Fishing will be excellent during the rest of April in between the cold storm fronts of springtime.

At press time, lake elevation was 3,635, and water temperature was 52-60F.

Draw results site for elk, pronghorn antelope hunts is now accessible.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department's online hunt draw system Web site. hosted by an outside vendor, became unavailable from Monday afternoon through early Tuesday morning as thou-sands of hopeful hunters tried to log on and learn whether their applications had been drawn for the upcoming elk and pronghorn antelope season.

Officials have attributed the problem to extraordinary demand on the system to view draw results, and not a failure of the hunt draw or application processes

Draw results were posted early Mon-day afternoon, and the draw results system initially worked as planned. But, as large numbers of people tried to access the system simultaneously, it slowed dra-matically and ultimately shut down, which impacted the ability of the public to access it. The vendor temporarily disabled the site to work on the problem.

Higher Demand

Than Any Other Site
The high demand not only temporarily disabled the draw results Web site, but also temporarily affected other Arizona state agency Web sites served by the vendor. Neither the vendor nor the Arizona Strategic Enterprise Technology Office (ASET -Arizona's IT agency), had seen that magnitude of load, as no other state Web site

Department officials stated the vendor and ASET worked on the problem through the night to implement measures enabling hunters to access their draw results, and the draw results site is now available.

The department worked extensively with its vendor to prepare for this draw. Officials emphasize that the online application process went smoothly and the draw itself worked exactly as it was intended.

The problem occurred with the system for accessing results. The vendor was advised of the potential demand to which the system would be subjected once draw re-

sults became available. But, despite estimates of heavy demand and the vendor's assurances that the system had been adequately load-tested, the actual demand far exceeded those estimates.

Review To Be Conducted

"Hunters are passionate about their sport, and they were so eager to discover the draw results that the power of numbers was simply overwhelming," said Larry Voyles, director of the Arizona Game and Fish Department. "But this situation is unacceptable and our customers deserved

We'll be conducting a detailed review of the process and procedures internally and with the vendor to fix problems to ensure they don't occur in the future."

On another front, department officials

also addressed an inaccurate rumor circulating on some online chat boards that there was a security breach of the depart-ment's customer information database. This did NOT happen. Arizona Game and Fish customer information remains secure

Some large credit card processors and bank-issued debit and cre 1 dit card holders across the nation were affected by a data breach discovered in late March. Shortly thereafter, the department was contacted by a small number of people (fewer than 10 at this point) who used credit cards for the draw that were denied by their banks as a result of the breach. Those people contacted us to advise that the credit card they used for the draw had been compromised and they had to cancel their cards.

For those individuals, this occurred after the cut-off date for changing/updating their method of payment for the draw. The department is researching options for the commission and department to deal with the loss of bonus points that could result from a denied credit card and will work on the rules necessary to enable us to deal with identity-theft-driven bonus point issues in the future.

While we believe the number of our customers affected by the credit card data breach is small, we will continue to monitor this situation.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department apologizes for any inconvenience customers experienced as a result of the problems with the draw results Web site.

Important Information For Sportsmen, Other Wildlife Enthusiasts – Part 1

A great deal of discussion has occurred over the past few months on important issues related to hunting, fishing and wildlife management. As part of its promotion of the partial privatization or diversion of Arizona's wildlife resources, one constituent group recently circulated an "open letter" regarding problems, or challenges, facing sportsmen.

One of the topics the open letter listed was loss of wildlife. To illustrate their point, the circulators of the letter included some

datat that compared the number of permits and harvest of six big game species in the years 1994 and 2010.

While the numbers for each year are accurate, the comparison is still artificial. Quite simply, if this were 1994 Arizona, it would still look like 1994 Arizona. The same could be said of 1964. Or 1934. Or ...?

Healthy Wildlife Populations Are Important Challenge

Having healthy, viable wildlife populations is an important and enduring chal-lenge for all who enjoy our wildlife resources, and that challenge is not something new.

For example, if data were plucked from the year 1929, an examination of the minutes of the Arizona Game and Fish Commission meeting on Nov. 29-30, 1929, would show that the Commission voted to close the area south of the Gila River to the hunting of deer for an indefinite period of

The choice of 1994 as a comparison point (as opposed to any other year) is interesting, and only the circulators of the data can explain their rationale for choosing that year. While their figures may be accurate for each of the two chosen years, their use in a two-point comparison alone neglects information that might provide context and give people a better understanding of the situation.

A Very Different Place

Our state was a very different place in 1994 than in 2010. Arizona had about 2 million fewer residents; the average price of gas nationally was around \$1.11 per gallon: the Dow Jones industrial average had a high of about 3,900, and the state was still in the midst of a notable "wet period," with above-average precipitation from the post-1976 period until approximately 1998.

The two-point comparison of 1994 and 2010 suggests a strictly linear decline in permits during the 1994-2010 time period, which is not accurate. Here are some additional facts sportsmen/women and other wildlife enthusiasts should know

Deer

Although deer permits have declined since achieving a high-water milestone in 1986, the number of permits since 2003 has been increasing annually (from 61,432 to 68,078, at about 900 permits per year).

Pronghorn

Pronghorn permits have been highly variable through time, but a recent high point was in 1994 with 1,483 permits. and a recent low point was in 2004 with 861 permits. In 2010, 949 permits were authorized, which reflects a growing trend in permits for pronghorn.

Bighorn Sheep

In 1994, bighorn sheep permits reached a milestone at the second greatest number of permits issued. Permit numbers declined to 82 in 2005, but have since increased to 99 in 2011.

Elk permit numbers increased over time, peaking at 24,195 in 2002. Permit numbers have been reduced since, largely in re-sponse to hunter desires after that date. Still, the permit numbers continue to increase

Standardized Survey Protocols

It should be noted that with regard to deer surveys, the department established standardized survey protocols beginning in the mid-2000s. Surveyed animals per hour (Catch per Unit Effort) provide a standardized index as to population trajectory, similar to permit numbers. Survey data suggests that the population of deer in Arizona is growing.

Drought

Drought is a factor that has contributed to declines in wildlife populations:

Decadal-scale Pacific Ocean circulation persistence can result in long-term drought in the Southwest, including Arizona, and may be reflected in wildlife productivity.

These patterns resulted in extremely dry

conditions between 1999 and 2005. During the past two decades, several La Niña episodes (1989-90, 1995-96, and 1998-2001) have initiated Arizona droughts. The La Niña of 2005-06 resulted in virtually no snowpack in Arizona until mid-March, with 29 of the 34 snow-measuring sites monitored by the NRCS reporting no snow as of March 1, 2006, the least amount recorded since measurements began in the late 1930s


While drought of the last decade may have similar precipitation conditions to the drought of the late 1940s and 1950s, temperatures during the last decade are almost two degrees higher. This warming trend may have affected the severity of drought conditions and productivity.

The last notable 'wet period' with above-average precipitation was the post-1976 period which lasted until approximately 1998, which may have affected productivity during the period 1999 through 2006.

Desired Population Structure

Permit numbers are influenced by desired population structure. The Arizona Game and Fish Commission currently manages for 20-30 bucks per 100 does. There is a range in which the decision does not influence the biological capability of a popu-

Vestern The Ghost And The Guardian

Wander the worlds suspended between

this one and the next long enough and you are bound to see ghosts. One second they are standing right in front of you and the next they are gone.

Cloaking themselves with unearthly shades of light and merging themselves into dark, elongated shadows, they sud-denly become mysterious and obscure shapes in a mystical, panoramic landscape And you are only left to wonder if they were ever really there at all.

And so it goes with ghosts being full of them. Real nature - not the semi-vacant lot of trees or small patch of grass and weeds left over by the suburban landslide that continually steamrolls over society's almost depleted sense of rustic aesthetics

But real nature in the form of an untamable rush of water that rampages forever at the base of a river valley or canyon wall, a tapestry of green hills and rugged forests draped across an entire mountain side, or the eternal expanse of sky mirroring the wide open plains that run endlessly be-

Real nature. Where heaven meets earth d man — if he is lucky enough and man touches the ethereal plane.

I Reached Out To It In Arizona

I reached out to it in Arizona. After a six-hour flight from Pennsylvania and a five-hour drive from the hotel with my friend and his family, I found myself in a whole different world — the Grand Canyon to be more precise. The place

where my own almost-depleted sense of aesthetics was elevated to new heights

Staring like a child into a large window filled with amazing natural creations, face and hands pressed firmly up against invisible glass, will do that to you, I suppose. So will an apparition staring back at you.

Of course, a place such as the Canyon with its immense and unearthly configurations must surely have a spirit or two lurking somewhere within its majestic confines. And it does.

A Covote Emerges

The outline and shape of the coyote first emerged a few hundred feet ahead of us, slowly crossing the nearby road that would eventually take us out of the Canyon's gravitational pull — the coyote itself now being drawn in.

My friend Joe, who was driving, pulled

the car over to the side and came quickly to a stop, allowing me to get out with my camera in tow. Having taken pictures all day of the Canyon from every conceivable angle, I suppose it was only natural to have it handy should nature turn suddenly on its side again and show off another startling

The coyote was still a distance away when I began to take pictures — perhaps out of fear that the animal would bolt at any time, leaving me absolutely no trace that it ever existed. Remarkably, the coy-ote kept coming closer, occasionally disappearing behind trees, re-emerging and slowly trotting over small patches of snow splashed intermittently over a canvas of green grass

Hope For One Perfect Shot

I continued to take pictures, doing my best to keep the animal in focus. I am by no means a wildlife photographer; I also didn't do myself any favors by having nothing more than a no-frills, point-andshoot camera. For whatever reason, I was hesitant to jump headlong into the digital

age.

If I could just get one shot perfectly

showcasing the animal as a lone, solitary figure frozen in a landscape that itself would never change over time, I would be pleased. What I needed was the coyote to idle itself and remain completely still, suspending itself above the laws of nature.

Miraculously, the animal halted at a distance where we could look into each other's eyes. Face to face, we each cautiously studied the strange shape that was displacing a small piece of the world in front of us.

What it thought of me. I can't say for sure, of course. If I had to venture a guess, I was barely something inconsequential to its existence. For me, the coyote was an aberration of my suburban-honed senses, long since dulled by my limited exposure to real and rugged nature.

A Thin Veneer Of Nature
How limited? How about the menagerie of squirrels, rabbits and groundhogs running up and down trees, bustling in and out of bushes in parks and playgrounds, with hawks circling above; or the occasional run-in with a rogue fox or small group of roving deer bullied and bulldozed out of their own personal terrain by the vast expansion of apartments, townhouses and condos, and reduced from their natural state to nothing more than a living, breathing attraction on someone's freshly mowed lawn. That's not nature, but a thin

The coyote was real nature mal embedded in a landscape where it could navigate by impulse and instinct, the currents of which reverberated endlessly through forests and woods and ran ceaselessly alongside rivers and streams, and they were not to be interfered with by the overbearing hum created by the continuing expansion of the human hive.

The Canyon, besides being a geological phenomenon was, I figured out, a symbolic oasis whose vast edge and rim and deep abyss prevented man from "progressing" any farther. The line in the rock had been drawn, and, this time, I was the in-

truder. I could sense it immediately. The animal stood erect on all fours, posturing itself as a stern guardian of the land, never to be removed from its post.

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Tips For Living With Wildlife, Avoiding Conflict

Mild winter and low rainfall may bring wildlife into urban fringe areas this spring.

Arizona's mild winter and exceptionally low rainfall have wildlife on the move, especially in urban areas that are on the fringe of natural habitat. Greenbelts, yards and golf courses are particularly attractive as they provide an easier meal and shelter areas

'Green areas bring in the small mammals like rabbits, which, in turn, attract coyotes and javelina when the desert is dry and lacks adequate food resources," said Darren Julian, an urban wildlife specialist for the Arizona Game and Fish Department's regional office in Mesa.

"Negative encounters with wildlife are almost always associated with a food source, so it's important to work with your neighbors to discourage wildlife from coming into close proximity to people.'

Covotes, Javelina Most Often Seen

Coyotes and javelina are the large animals most frequently seen in populated areas. They are usually timid and run away if challenged, but they can pose a risk to people once they become comfortable around humans, usually as a result of feeding or indifference.

It is also important to use precaution in

the spring when many wildlife species breed. Animals with young can be very territorial and defensive, and may bite or otherwise attack humans when they feel their young are threatened.

Habituated animals such as coyotes and javelina lose their natural fear and learn to see humans, their yards and their pets as food sources and safe havens.

People have a responsibility to help keep wildlife "wild." While wild animals are already present in urban areas, they should not be allowed to become comfortable with human presence.

Residents and visitors are encouraged to remove all potential food sources and make wildlife feel unwelcome when they are spotted in urban areas. The following tips will help minimize encounters:

- · Do not feed wildlife.
- · Keep birdseed and water sources off the ground and out of reach.
- · Store garbage inside and place trash containers outside at the last possible time on day of pickup.
- · Feed pets inside and/or remove uneaten pet food between feedings.
- · Keep pets indoors, in a secure outdoor enclosure with a roof, or on a leash.
 - · Supervise small children outdoors
- · If you see a coyote or javelina, discourage it from the area by using aggres-

sive gestures with your arms and legs, yelling, shaking a can filled with pennies, or spraying it with a hose or "Super-Soaker" filled with diluted ammonia.

- · Trim back plants and bushes around the house to prevent hiding or resting pl•
 - · Install outdoor lighting.
- Use fences and walls at least 6 feet high, with the bottom buried a few inches underground.
- · Eliminate a coyote's ability to get over the top of a fence or wall by installing barbed wire, electric wire, or a pipe that spins around a wire.

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



To help put the current flow levels into perspective; our current high flow is approximately four vertical feet lower than the flows that we saw last year — the river is finally back to normal. 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



lation to reproduce.

Research has demonstrated that with as few as 5-7 bucks per 100 does, reproduction and recruitment is not diminished.

Based upon public input and Commission guidance, the De-

partment manages within a conservative range for buck-to-doe ratios, but could increase permits for deer or elk, without any negative consequences to recruitment, if there is a desire to increase the numbers of permits.

The Commission has chosen a conservative range because

sportsmen have requested a more conservative hunt structure, often focusing on public desires to pursue older-age class animals.

Arizona's guidelines for mule deer buck-to-doe ratios fall within the center of the ranges managed by other states. Selecting this conservative strategy reduced permit availability.

We hope this information broadens constituents' understanding of the data that was circulated in the open letter on this topic and gives a better understanding of harvestable big game numbers and the factors that influence those numbers. We look forward to continuing to work with you on these challenges and opportunities.

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
