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Alcohol and Drugs

Arizona law prohibits anyone from operating a power-driven vessel while under the influence of alcohol or any drug that causes the person to be even slightly impaired. Alcohol ad drugs cause impaired balance, blurred vision, poor coordination, impaired judgment, and slower reaction time. Alcohol contributes to about one-third of all fatal boating accidents nationwide.

- A person is considered to be operating under the influence (OUI) of alcohol if he or she has an alcohol concentration of 0.08% or greater as determined by a test of his or her breath, blood, or urine. "Extreme OUI" is blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of 0.15% and higher
- If convicted of OUI or "Extreme OUI," a person can be fined up to \$2,500 and jailed for up to six months.
- By operating a vessel on Arizona Waters, you have consented to be tested for alcohol or drugs if arrested by a law enforcement officer for alleged violations under Arizona Watercraft Statutes.

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Minimize Risk of Boating Accidents — Avoid Alcohol

From AZGFD Safe Boating Course The effect of alcohol is increased by the natural stressors placed on your body

while boating. Also, alcohol causes dehydration of your body. It takes less alcohol, combined with stressors, to impair an op-



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
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erator's ability to operate safely.

Research has proven that one-third of the amount of alcohol that it takes to make a person legally intoxicated on land can make a boater equally intoxicated on the

Alcohol depresses the central nervous system, affects judgment, and slows physical reaction time. Most people become impaired after only one drink

Alcohol makes it difficult for you to pay attention and perform multiple tasks. For example, it will be more difficult for you to keep track of two or more vessels operating in your area. This could become critical if you are placed in an emergency situation and must make a sudden decision.

Alcohol can reduce your ability to distinguish colors, especially red and green.

Alcohol impairment increases the likelihood of accidents — for both passengers and vessel operators.


Always designate non-drinking boaters to operate the vessel and to act as an observer if your group plans to consume alcohol. Do not allow your skipper to operate if he or she is drink-

Alcohol is a major contributor to boating accidents and fatalities. Drinking while boating is a choice. The best way to minimize the risk of an accident is to make the wise choice: Don't drink and boat!

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Tonto National Forest Now Offers Online Printable Tonto Passes

Tonto National Forest officials announced in early April that a new Tonto Pass online service is now available: a printable Tonto Pass (color black/white)

These passes are vehicle and date specific and can be purchased through Kinsail, an online contractor for the Tonto National Forest recreation program.

"Customers have repeatedly asked for this printable option and we are pleased to meet their expectations," said Greg Schuster, forest recreation planner.

Visitors must place these passes on their dashboard so they are clearly visible for compliance purposes.

The Tonto Pass is required at more than 50 recreation sites on the forest, including the Salt and Verde river locations, boat launch ramps, swimming areas, and campgrounds, and passes are sold at more than 250 locations.

Prices for the pass remain the same:

Day-use pass: \$6.00

Water pass: \$4.00

Half-price (seniors) pass: \$3.00

Boaters' Spring Commissioning Tips For Saving Gas

Do it now or pay later.

With gas prices forecast to remain higher than last summer, <u>BoatUS</u> has five in addition to joining their organization for discounts — on spring commissioning that can be done now to save you money on gas all summer long:

Lighten the load is one of easiest no-cost things to save on gas. Clear out all of that junk that's been stored aboard the boat over winter.

Get a tune-up: An annual tune-up is a must if you're truly serious about saving

Check the prop: Props with little dings should be taken to a repair shop now. This is also the time to ensure you are happy with your prop's performance — have a discussion with your marina or local prop shop to ensure you still have the right prop installed based on your current boating Lighten the load is one of easiest no-cost things to save on gas. Clear out all of that junk that's been stored aboard the boat over

Paint the bottom: For boats docked in salt or brackish water, keeping the fuelrobbing "green gunk" growth from adhering to your boat's hull can save a lot of fuel. But, you'll need to ensure the vessel has a new coat of bottom paint put on, making it difficult for anything to grow on the hull bottom.

Check the trim tabs: Unbalanced boats chew up the gas. During spring commissioning, ensure that trim tabs function properly. Check the reservoir for leaks.

Editor's Note: And, there's always owning a sailboat instead!



LAKE POWELL REPORT

Superb Fishing Mid-April To Mid-May Predicted

The report this week finds most striper fishing success in the southern end of Lake Powell. Fishing upstream from Dangling Rope Marina has not started as quickly for most with striped bass being hard to catch.

Fish that are responding well right now are largemouth bass and crappie. Brushlined coves from Good Hope Bay to Hite harbor good populations of crappie that are moving ever closer to spawning with each warm afternoon. Crappie have responded well to 2-inch pearl or white plastic grubs in thick brush. Largemouth bass and walleye are being caught on a regular basis now with smallmouth bass fishing improving every day.

The common theme over the entire lake is that murky water in the backs of the canyons warms more quickly than clear water. Searching for active fish visually by selecting stained water and with a thermometer to find the warmest water available are the most effective search patterns. These work until base water temperature exceeds 60F. Then clear water is just as

My weekly fish-sampling trip included a circuit of the striper spots near Wahweap. Anglers tied off to the barricade in front of the dam reported striper fishing to be outstanding beginning precisely as the first sun rays hit the water. That flurry of action

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Arizona Anglers Watching The Weather

Thanks to all of you who were patient waiting for the more fully updated report still missing a couple of regions, but fortunately, with a few calls I was able to fill in the blanks. For thosewho weren't as patient or understanding, well, hopefully you'll get a chance to wet a line because fishing can teach patience and humility if you let it.

Here's a piece of great news — we surveyed Tempe Town Lake last week and guess what? IT'S BACK!

Our biologists are still crunching the numbers, but the survey showed lots of largemouth bass ranging up to 4 pounds, and the yellow bass were plentiful.

Even though the lake lost all of its

water last summer when one of the inflatable dams broke, the water from SRP used to fill it back up again last fall was apparently loaded with fish.

Striper Bite At Pleasant

My old friend Michael McFarland called Wednesday morning and said the largemouth bass were off the beds, but like me, he believes the striper bite at Pleasant won't be negatively impacted by the recent storm fronts, and might even get better. However, Pleasant can be scary when the wind is blowing.

Crappie Are Weather-Wary

Once a spring storm hits, crappie anglers might either hang up their poles, or put on some finesse baits for bass. Crappie don't like stormy weather, no matter who is singing it.

If a weather front doesn't change the equation, there should be a massive

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spawning time for crappie, and a spawning surge for largemouth bass (maybe for stripers as well in some lakes) as early as mid-April.

All Precip Appreciated

But we really need the precipitation. Mark Hubble at SRP said the runoff so far is only about 40 percent of normal in the Salt and Verde watersheds. Fortunately, we went into winter with pretty full lakes. But, we were glad to see more weather come our way recently — all precip is appreciated at this juncture.

For fishing, that's not gloom and doom by any stretch of the imagination. We just had two back-to-back years of good runoff (2009 and 2010) with very-good-toexcellent spor-fish and forage fish spawns or productivity. Anglers are already reaping that bounty this year. We just won't



have that nutrient super-charging we seen the previous two years.

More Good News

Here's some more good news. The road opened into Willow Springs and Black Canyon lakes. In early April, we reported that Blue Ridge and Long Lake were both open. Kaibab Lake near Williams is not only open, but also it has had back-to-back week stockings of trout totaling 20,000 fish. We are hoping to get trout into Dog-town and Whitehorse lakes soon, so stay

Access to Ashurst could open soon, but it will be northern pike time. No trout are scheduled for stocking until our Flagstaff

region assess the situation.

Here's the latest from Big Lake, although I would call before going if snow is expected. At http://www.biglakeaz.com/index.htm they posted the following: "We are in the process of opening the store for the 2011 season. Highway 261 gates are still locked but you can access the lake via FS 249. We do have boats available for rent, but please call ahead to make a reser-

Spring Catfish Stockings Get Off To Great Start

An excellent load of 1.5-4 pound channel catfish arrived safely in good health at the end of last month. Strong and hungry, the cats started biting right away. Bait choice didn't seem to matter much as the ravenous catfish readily took worms, hot dogs, shrimp and stink baits.

Daily limits are four catfish per person at Urban Lakes or two catfish per person at Urban Ponds (note regulations and park signage for Lake and Pond designations). Anglers are encouraged to call Operation Game Thief, any time of day, at 1-800-352-0700 to report any ongoing over-limit or license violations.

22,000 Bluegill Have Found Homes In Urban Lakes

Just in time for spring break, over 22,000 feisty, hard biting sunfish were successfully stocked into all Phoenix and Tucson area Urban waters at the end of March. Twice each year, the Department stocks 5-8 inch bluegill to replenish populations of this popular sport fish and offer some great

Fishing is excellent for anglers using meal worms, worms or doughballs fished under small bobbers along the shorelines. Daily bag limits for bluegill/sunfish are 10 per day at Urban Lakes or 5 per day at Urban Ponds.

A Record 4,000 Kids Successful Catching Fish At AZGFD Expo

The immensely popular 2011 Game and Fish Department Outdoor Expo drew record numbers of families and kids. More than 4,250 children participated in the

largest-ever kids' fishing tank experience.
After three days of fishing, more than 95 percent of the kids caught at least one bluegill. More than 80 percent caught and released their limit of two fish.

For many of the kids, it was the first fish they had ever caught. Shouts of glee kept erupting as the feisty sunfish were lifted from the tank and then released in a pattern that repeated itself thousands of times.

Cameras, smart phones and cell phones captured images of this fun and memorable family experience. Over the weekend, 60 department employees and volunteers worked in unison to assist the kids in catching fish and ensuring they had a great time. But, the 5,000 super-hungry bluegill were show, bluegill were delivered to Desert West, Encanto, Cortez and Riverview lakes.

Urban Fishing Report

The second catfish stocking of the spring season was April 4-9 at all Phoenix and Tucson area Urban waters. Cats from the March 24 season-opening date have been biting very well on worms, stink baits, hot dogs or shrimp fished on the bot-tom. Reports of 4 to 6 pound channel catfish have come in from a variety of lakes

in Tucson, Phoenix, Chandler and Mesa. Bluegill fishing is excellent at all Phoenix and Tucson area waters that were just stocked in early April. Best baits for the feisty, 5-8 inch bluegill are worms and mealworms fished under a small bobber in 3-6 foot depths.

Largemouth bass have been moving into the shallows for spawning off and on over the past few weeks. Please exercise catch and release for spawning bass and remember the minimum keepable size for bass is 13 inches

At Green Valley lakes (Payson) fishing is good to excellent for trout. Try Power Bait, worms or salmon eggs off the bottom. Trout stockings at this higher elevation Urban lake will continue every two

The Arizona Wildlife Fund is a voluntary program that allows Arizona taxpayers to make a donation to help imperiled and endangered wildlife and other nongame species. Nongame wildlife are those animals that are neither hunted nor fished in a traditional sense.

The fund has a tremendous impact on conserving one of Arizona's greatest natural - its wildlife — which provides treasures a variety of low-cost recreational opportunities for residents to enjoy and real economic benefits to local communities.

Arizona is one of 41 states that allow

taxpayers to make a contribution to worthwhile causes. Since Arizona started the program more than 25 years ago, taxpayers have donated more than \$5 million to the conservation of nongame animals.








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Drawing Results For Elk, Pronghorn Hunts Available

Permits remaining issued first-come, first-served beginning April 25.

The drawing results for Arizona's 2011 elk and pronghorn antelope big game hunts are now available. The more than 120,000 eager applicants can find out if they were drawn for the limited permits by visiting the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Web site at www.azgfd.gov/draw or by calling (602) 942-3000 and selecting option two.

Hunt permit-tags for successful applicants, and refunds for unsuccessful or rejected applicants/applications (less application fees), will be mailed out no later than April 22.

For those individuals who missed the draw deadline or were unsuccessful in getting a permit-tag, there are more than 600 leftover tags remaining. Remaining tags are available on a first-come, first-served basis and include more than 600 elk tags and four pronghorn antelope tags.

Leftover tags in Hopi hunt open areas are available to everyone (tribal members and non-tribal members) through the firstcome, first-served process.

There are two methods to obtain a leftover tag. Applications will be accepted by mail only beginning at 8 a.m. (MST) on April 25. Starting on May 2 at 8 a.m.



(MST), hunters can purchase a leftover tag in person with an application at any of the seven Arizona Game and Fish Department offices

For those who qualify, there are military hunts available for Camp Navajo; call (928) 773-3274 for additional information.

Important information regarding 19B pronghorn antelope hunts: Hunters who applied for pronghorn antelope in Game Management Unit 19B, hunt number 2022 (50 general permits) and 2054 (15 archeryonly permits), are reminded that the Arizona Game and Fish Commission has canceled all the 2011 antelope hunts in this unit due to the loss of public access onto the Chino Grande Ranch.

With the elimination of these two hunts, the draw program processed any choices with these hunt numbers as if all the tags had been issued and moved to the appli-

Arizona State Parks Land Conservation Fund Growing Smarter grant workshop will be May 4.

In November 1998, voters approved an annual appropriation of \$20 million to the Land Conservation Fund from the General Fund until FY 2011. These funds are used to assist eligible applicants in purchasing or leasing State Trust land that has been reclassified for conservation.

Political subdivisions of the state and non-profit organizations created with the purpose of preserving open space can all apply for these monies. There is approximately \$80 million remaining in the fund for distribution to successful grant applicants.





Bald Eagle Breeding Closure Areas Lifted On Some Arizona Lakes, Rivers

The Arizona Game and Fish Department and its partners are lifting some of the closures at lakes and rivers statewide that are put into place annually to help bald eagles during the breeding season.

The closures at the following five sites were removed March 31 because the bald eagles in these areas failed to produce young and will not breed this late in the spring:

- · Lake Pleasant
- · Verde River below Horseshoe Dam
- Verde River below Sycamore Canyon
- · Salt River below Stewart Mountain Dam downstream of the Bush Highway Bridge
 - Salt River near Meddler Point
- All other previously announced closures remain in effect because bald eagle



breeding activities are still continuing in those areas. The public should contact the local land management agency to ensure the area they are visiting is open for recre-

Each year, land and wildlife manage-

ment agencies close bald eagle breeding areas for part of the year, beginning in December, to protect the state's bald eagles. Outdoor recreationists are asked to help protect these important breeding areas by honoring the closures.

Bald eagles are particularly sensitive to human disturbance during the breeding season and public cooperation with the closures is an important part of helping to conserve the species. Human activity near active bald eagle nests can cause a breeding pair to leave its eggs uncovered, leading to a failed breeding attempt. Human presence can also cause a young bird to prematurely leave the nest.

Management of the bald eagle falls under the Arizona Game and Fish Department's program to recover species that are declining or that have been extirpated from the state. Through its partnerships with other public agencies, non-profit organizations and the science community, the department's wildlife recovery program aims to prevent species from becoming endangered and conserve them in a more costeffective manner.

State-level involvement provides closer oversight of wildlife species on a day-today basis. Specific emphasis is placed on identifying and managing the wildlife and habitat of greatest conservation need, or those species that are no longer abundant and facing increasing threats from habitat degradation, disease, introduction of non-native species and climate change.

Adaptive management of these species helps ensure their continued presence in Arizona and protects the delicate balance of the ecosystem for future generations.

The Elegant Bald Eagle Respected Internationally

The **Bald Eagle** (*Haliaeetus leuco-cephalus*) is a bird of prey found in North America. It is the national bird and symbol of the United States of America.

This sea eagle has two known sub-

This sea eagle has two known sub-species and forms a species pair with the White-tailed Eagle. Its range includes most of Canada and Alaska, all of the con-tiguous United States, and northern Mexico. It is found near large bodies of open water with an abundant food supply and old-growth trees for nesting.
In the late 20th century the Bald Eagle

was on the brink of extirpation in the continental United States, while flourishing in much of Alaska and Canada. Populations recovered and stabilized, so the species was removed from the U.S. federal government's list of endangered species and transferred to the list of threatened species on July 12, 1995, and it was removed from the List of Endangered and Threatened Wildlife in the Lower 48 States on June 28 2007

Bald Eagles are not actually bald, the name deriving from the older meaning of the word, "white headed".

Description

The plumage of an adult Bald Eagle is evenly brown with a white head and tail. The tail is moderately long and slightly wedge-shaped. Males and females are identical in plumage coloration, but sexual dimorphism is evident in the species in that females are 25 percent larger than

The beak, feet, and irises are bright yellow. The legs are feather-free, and the toes are short and powerful with large talons. The highly developed talon of the hind toe is used to pierce the vital areas of prey while it is held immobile by the front toes. The beak is large and hooked, with a

The plumage of the immature is brown, speckled with white until the fifth (rarely fourth, very rarely third) year, when it reaches sexual maturity. Immature Bald Eagles are distinguishable from the Golden Eagle in that the former has a more protruding head with a larger beak, straighter-edged wings which are held flat (not slightly raised) and with a stiffer wing beat, and feathers which do not completely

cover the legs.

The Bald Eagle is a large bird, with a body length of 70–102 centimeters (28–40 in), a wingspan of between 1.68 m (66 in) and 2.44 m (96 in), and a mass of 2.5–7 kilograms (5.5–15 lb); females are about 25 percent larger than males, adult females averaging 5.8 kilograms (13 lb) and males averaging 4.1 kilograms (9.0 lb).

The size of the bird varies by location;

the smallest specimens are those from Florida, where an adult male may barely exceed 2.3 kilograms (5.1 lb) and a wingspan of 1.8 m (5.9 ft). The largest are Alaskan birds, where large females may exceed 7.5 kilograms (17 lb) and have a wingspan of over 2.4 m (7.9 ft).

Its diet consists mainly of fish, but it is an opportunistic feeder. It hunts fish by swooping down and snatching the fish out of the water with its talons. It is sexually mature at four years or five years of age In the wild, Bald Eagles can live up to thirty years, and often survive longer in captivity. The Bald Eagle builds the largest nest of any North American bird, up to 4 meters (13 ft) deep, 2.5 meters (8.2 ft) wide, and one metric ton (1.1 tons) in

The call consists of weak chirping whistles, harsher and more shrill from young birds than adults.

The average lifespan of Bald Eagles in

the wild is around 20 years, with the oldest living to be about 30. In captivity, they often live somewhat longer. In one instance, a captive individual in New York lived for nearly 50 years. As with size, the average lifespan of an eagle population appears to be influenced by its location.

Habitat/Range

The Bald Eagle prefers habitats near seacoasts, rivers, large lakes, oceans, and other large bodies of open water with an abundance of fish. Studies have shown a preference for bodies of water with a circumference greater than 11 km (7 mi), and lakes with an area greater than 10 square kilometers (4 sq mi) are optimal for breeding Bald Eagles

The Bald Eagle requires old-growth and mature stands of coniferous or hardwood trees for perching, roosting, and nesting. Selected trees must have good visibility, an open structure, and proximity to prey, but the height or species of tree is not as important as an abundance of compara-tively large trees surrounding the body of water. Forests used for nesting should have a canopy cover of no more than 60 percent, and no less than 20 percent, and be in close proximity to water.

The Bald Eagle is extremely sensitive to human activity, and is found most commonly in areas free of human disturbance. It chooses sites more than 1.2 km (0.75 mi) from low-density human disturbance and more than 1.8 km (1.1 mi) from mediumto high-density human disturbance.

Occasionally Bald Eagles will venture into large estuaries or secluded groves within major cities, such as Hardtack Island on the Willamette River in Portland, Ore. Despite this sensitivity, a family of Bald Eagles recently moved to the Harlem neighborhood of Manhattan in New York

City.

Bald Eagle's natural range covers most including most of of North America, including most of Canada, all of the continental United States, and northern Mexico. It is the only sea eagle endemic to North America. Occupying varied habitats from the bayous of Louisiana to the Sonoran Desert and the eastern deciduous forests of Quebec and New England, northern birds are migratory, while southern birds are resident, remaining on their breeding territory all

At minimum population, in the 1950s, it was largely restricted to Alaska, the Aleutian Islands, northern and eastern Canada, and Florida.

It has occurred as a vagrant twice in

Ireland; a juvenile was shot illegally in Fermanagh on January 11, 1973 (misidentified at first as a White-tailed Eagle), and an exhausted juvenile was captured in Kerry on November 15, 1987. Bald Eagles will also congregate in

cant's next choice for all drawing passes. Hunters are reminded, that while there are no pronghorn antelope permittags allocated for Unit 19B, the unit remains open for all other hunting seasons; however, access, and areas to hunt may be limited due to the closure of the Chino Grande Ranch.

lasted about 1.5 hours before slowing

Those at the barricade caught over 50 fish in the initial skirmish. The next flurry of catching was at midday and lasted for 2 hours with similar numbers of fish caught. I suspect an evening bite as well but did not document it.

Never trust fish to repeat a previous pattern but download the information that recently, fishing at the dam is good in streaks during first light and later at midday.

We then moved on to other likely striper spots beginning with Buoy 1. Two boats were fishing there. Later at the fish-cleaning station, we found that both groups collected 30 some stripers from this location.

We graphed at Buoy 3 but did not see fish traces so moved on to Antelope Canyon where we caught two stripers in 10 minutes. I did not heed my own advice, fishing only clear water where we could actually see stripers at 25 feet before catching them. There have been many more fish caught recently in the back of Antelope

where water is stained.

Next stop was the Power Plant Intake. Two more fish were caught here in another 10-minute effort. But, I was anxious to fish dirty water so went quickly to Navajo Canyon.

The first point past the double islands was good for two more stripers in five min-utes, but we didn't stay. We passed the big sand dune and saw water color change from clear to off-color. Around the next corner, color changed again, this time to murky.

We began to troll deep, diving Lucky Craft pointers in ghost color at 4.5 miles per hour and immediately began hooking stripers. As each fish was brought to the boat, we would spoon the bottom to catch trailing fish — with good results. We ended up with the same number of fish at the end of the day as those that were fishing bait, but I like to troll and use spoons better than bait.


There is a fishing technique to suit your individual desires working now. The bottom line is that striper fishing in the southern lake is red hot. It will get much better for stripers in the mid lake to Hite area in the near future.

Bass and crappie fishing is slightly better uplake, but warming water will make fishing success superb from mid-April to May 15, weather permitting.

At press time, lake elevation was 3,609 and water temperature, 51-57F.

Advisory: Castle Rock Cut near Wah-

weap is now closed due to low water. It is necessary to go through the main channel for uplake travel. Antelope Point launch ramp is open and provides time savings for those heading uplake.





in your hair — it's easy to see why waterskiers describe their sport using such terms as ecstasy and exhilaration. Sensational waterski shows, water-skiing competitions and ski tournaments, as well as television spectaculars, all publicize the fact that waterskiing is fun, clean and immensely popular.

Long after you have passed beyond the novice stage, it's still fun to cross the wake of your own towboat on an Arizona lake without taking a tumble. Every maneuver produces its own distinct, animated feeling.

While young people in particular have embraced watersking, the sport actually has no age limits. It's a family sport; everyone from the youngest to the oldest member can learn how to waterski. Most beginners master the techniques of starting, turning, crossing the wake, and stopping after only an hour or two of practice — and even the practice sessions are fun

History

In Éurope

In Europe, waterskiing between the world wars spread from the French Riviera around the Mediterranean through the lakes of Switzerland and on to the Thames River in England. The sport today is popular in Singapore, Sweden, South Africa, Australia and South America. Enthusiasts have skied past (over) crocodiles on the Zambezi River in Africa and through the locks of the Panama Canal.

In North America

Waterskiing in this country began on a summer day in 1924 on Long Island Sound. Before then, people had sometimes ridden on towed planks called aquaplanes, but now a newsreel cameraman named Fred Waller needed an excuse for photographing young women in bathing suits. He hitched together a pair of snow skis and put a young maiden on them. Success was instantaneous. Waterskiing not only had novelty, but also looked vaguely dangerous. The sport quickly worked its way around the country, including Arizona.

Perhaps the biggest single boost to waterskiing was the starring role Florida's Cypress Gardens played in the first Cinerama motion picture production in 1952. On a huge screen, millions of people saw young women gliding by beneath moss-laden cypress trees, and athletic young men hurtling through thin air on skis. Curiously, the man who invented the Cinerama photographic process — Fred Waller — was the same man who, years earlier, assembled the first pair of water-skis.

At first, the sport was limited to the yachtclub and polo-pony class of people, since it required the use of an expensive inboard speedboat to reach the minimum towing speed of 20 miles per hour. Shortly after World War II, commercially produced skis came on the market at a reasonable price.

Great Arizona Ski Lakes

Around that same time, boats with outboard motors began appearing on Arizona waterways. Skiers have been splashing happily behind them ever since, including on Martinez Lake near Yuma.

Other fun places in the state to waterski include Bartlett Lake near Carefree, Patagonia Lake near Nogales, south of Tucson, Lake Havasu, Canyon Lake near Tortilla Flat east of Phoenix, Saguaro Lake, located within the Tonto National Forest, 20 minutes from Mesa, Arizona, and Apache Lake, which is surrounded by the Superstition Wilderness and the Three Bar Wildlife Area east of Phoenix.

Some Advice For Beginners

Virtually everyone with access to a boat powered by an outboard motor can learn to get up on a pair of water-skis in an afternoon. Proper posture — back and arms straight, knees bent — will help you keep your balance and maneuver on the water successfully, without undue strain.

Don't worry about falling. All water-skiers fall occasionally. If you feel a fall coming, throw the tow bar away from you. Then, try to fall backwards, or slide down into the water. Some beginners ski the first time they try to get up out of the water, but most people average several tries before succeeding.

Pull Power/Driver Ed

It takes motor power to lift a person out of the water and skim over the surface. Most ski buffs prefer outboard motors in the 50, 60, 70, or 100-hp range. It's true, as manufacturers claim, that you can ski with a motor as low-powered as 30 hp, but use then must be limited to a light boat, with a light-to-medium-weight person in tow. If you plan to buy an outboard motor essentially for skiing, think at least 60 horsepower.

It takes patience and understanding to be a good towboat driver. Driving a ski boat on a crowded lake has been likened to "driving through a shopping mall parking lot the week before Christmas." Know the distance it takes for your boat to come to a stop, and be aware of all other vessels and markers in your field of vision. A sharp-eyed observer should always be in the boat.

Never forget a waterskier is depending on you to steer him or her safely through congested areas. The skier is concentrating on turns and is not always aware of other boat traffic. It is up to the driver and observer to bring the skier back to shore safe and happy, preferably in one piece.

Before starting out, explain to the skier what path the boat will be taking, how far up the lake you'll go, whether you will be making right or left turns, and where any hazards are located. Driving a ski boat is more than recreation. It's an activity to be taken seriously.

Most people think of waterskiing in Arizona only during the warm months, but the sport can be enjoyed year-round if you follow certain tips for cool-weather skiing:

Ski Safely

- Master the dock start. The only time chilly water stings is when you let go of the rope.
- Wear a wetsuit. You might consider putting on a suit similar to what divers wear, one that's constructed especially for coldwater activity.
 When it's really cold, it's best to wait
- When it's really cold, it's best to wait until the middle of the day to get in the water.
 While water temperatures may not warm up much, the air temperature will, and the sun definitely helps you feel warmer.
- Don't rule out a cloudy day for waterskiing. You might think the sun's rays provide the most heat, but cloud cover also insulates the earth.
 - Protect your hands with latex gloves,

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

the kind your mom used for washing dishes. Even better are surgical gloves. Then slip on ski gloves that are a size larger than what you normally wear.

- Make sure you have an attentive boat driver. If you do fall when it's chilly, you want someone who can swing back around in a matter of seconds. When you're submerged in cold water, the difference be-tween a 10-second and 60-second turnaround can feel like a lifetime.
- Wear a life jacket; there are several styles that are not cumbersome; check

Once you have experienced the thrill of successfully crossing your own wake, you'll know what it means to win your ski legs — and you'll begin to understand why waterskiing all around Arizona is so popular. If you haven't yet done so, give it a try, and enjoy Arizona from a refreshing
