

Certified Captain's Course Aims To Improve Lake Havasu Boating Safety

It's an all-too-common story. Take inexperienced, fun-seeking tourists renting fast moving boats — add in distractions, alcohol, lack of knowledge of the local navigation hazards and rules of the road, and what would have been a wonderful day on the water ends in catastrophe.

But how could that change if those revelers in the sun could opt to hire a licensed captain to look after their safety while their party goes on?

"Dramatically," says Jim Salscheider, president of the Lake Havasu Marine Association. "That's why we're excited to announce that we have obtained a

commitment from the Maritime Institute, based in San Diego, to teach a U.S. Coast Guard-approved Captain's Course locally."

According to Salscheider, operators in the watercraft-rental business have many horror stories about renting to people who don't know what they're doing, as well as to those who appear to have obtained a designated operator to pilot them on their journey of fun on the lake.

"Anything from damage to watercraft to an inebriated designated operation could and does happen. If certified captains were available for hire, the risk of the above catastrophes' spoiling a day on the water would be greatly diminished."

gione echoes the sentiment. "Having licensed captains available for hire could save lives and property on Lake Havasu and ensure safety on the lake's waterways.

"The two-week course we'll be offering is a U.S. Coast Guard-approved Captain's course [that] meets the written-examination requirement for the Master Inland and OUPV/6-PACK License [that] allows a captain to pilot inspected and un-inspected vessels with paying passengers."

Both the Marine Association and the Maritime Institute view the introduction of

licensed captains on the lake to be an important first step in solving a long-standing problem. "If the rental operators are successful in convincing boat renters to use new captains for their holiday fun on the water, everybody will benefit," Laragione said

The new course will be held from Oct. 17-28 in a classroom at the Lake Havasu Fraternal Order of Eagles. For more information or to sign up to attend the course, call the Maritime Institute at 1-888-262-8020.

Update your boating safety knowledge

Always wear a life jacket



TYPE I: Offshore Life Jackets

These vests are geared for rough or remote waters where rescue may take awhile. They provide the most buoyancy, are excellent for flotation, and will turn most unconscious persons face up in the water.

TYPE II: Near-Shore Vests

These vests are good for calm waters when quick rescue is likely. A Type II may not turn some unconscious wearers face up in the water.



TYPE III: Flotation Aids

These vests or full-sleeved jackets are good for calm waters when quick rescue is likely. They are not for rough waters since they will not turn most unconscious persons face up.



TYPE IV: Throwable Devices

Type IV: Inrowable Devices
These cushions and ring
buoys are designed to be
thrown to someone in
trouble. Since a Type IV is
not designed to be worn, it
is neither for rough waters nor for persons
who are unable to hold onto it.

TYPE V: Special-Use Devices

These vests, deck suits, hybrid PFDs, and others are designed for specific activities such as windurfing baseline. windsurfing, kayaking, or water-skiing. To be acceptable, Type V PFDs must be used in accordance with

Specifically for Skiing

Vessel operators towing a person(s) on water skis or a similar device have additional laws.

Towing Skiers

◆ A vessel towing a person(s) on water skis or any other similar device two persons on board one to



and a second person to observe the towed person(s). The observer must be at least 12 years old and be physically capable and mentally competent to act as an observer of a water-skier.

- ◆ Each person being towed behind a vessel Each person being towed behind a vessel on water skis or a similar device *must weur* a life jacket (PFD) or buoyant belt. Note, however, that buoyant belts are not approved by the U.S. Coast Guard. The AZGFD recommends the use of U.S. Coast Guard—approved, brightly colored, Type III life jacket (PFD). The brightly colored life jacket (PFD) aids in making a skier more visible to other vessels.
- Water-skiing is restricted to daylight hours only. It is illegal to tow a person(s) or water skis, surfboard, or other similar device from sunset to sunrise
- Both the operator of the towing vessel and the skier must operate in a safe manner. A reasonable distance from other vessels, people, and property must be maintained so as not to cause danger to the life or property of others.
- (the skier) responsible if he or she behaves in a careless, reckless, or negligent manner.
- Vessels towing person(s) on water skis or a similar device must carry and use a bright red or orange skier-down flag that is at least 12 x 12 inches in size and mounted on a handle. The observer must continuously observe the skier(s) and display a skier-down flag whenever a skier is in the water after falling or while preparing to ski.
- If towing a skier with a PWC, the same water-skiing laws apply. **Do not exceed** the carrying capacity of the personal

Hand Signals for Skiers Knowing proper hand signals will help the skiers comunicate with their vessel operator or the observer.

Preventing Theft

Defend against theft of your vessel and equipment

- Store your vessel so that it is not easily accessed.

 Store your vessel and trailer in a locked garage or storage area.
 Park another vehicle in front of the trailer, or lock the
 - trailer to a fixed object with a good quality chain and lock. If moored, secure the vessel to the dock with a steel cable and lock.
 - Remove a trailer wheel if parked for an extended time.
 Purchase a quality trailer hitch lock and use it.
- Chain and lock the motor and fuel tanks to the vessel.
- Chain and lock the motor and fuel tanks to the vessel.
 Mark or engrave all equipment with an identifier such as your driver's license number.
 Photograph or videotape the interior and exterior of your vessel, showing all installed equipment and additional gear and equipment. Make a complete inventory of your equipment, vessel, and tailer.
 Remove expensive electronics or other valuables if the vessel is left unattended.

- Cover your vessel and always remove the keys.
 Title and register your vessel.
 Remove the Certificate of Number (registration card) when

Diver-Down Flags

 Scuba divers and snorkelers must display a diver-down flag to mark their diving area. The flag must be displayed whenever

someone is diving below the surface.

· Vessels should stay as far away from a diver-down flag as is reasonable and prudent for the circumstances. The suggested safe distance from a flag is 100

A rectangular red flag with a white diagonal stripe is used on Arizona waters, including the Colorado River and Lake System.

BOATING BASICS: ON THE WATER Weather Emergencies

From AZGFD "The Boater's Guide"

Weather can change very rapidly and create unexpected situations for boat operators, and weather-related accidents in Arizona are on the rise. Even meteorologists have trouble predicting rapid weather changes

You should always monitor weather developments. One way is to tune a VHF radio to the frequencies listed below. Then seek a protected area before the weather becomes a threat

What To Do If Caught In Severe Weather

Prepare the boat to handle severe weather:

- · Slow down, but keep enough power to maintain headway and steering.
- · Close all hatches, windows, and doors to reduce the chance of swamping.
 - Stow any unnecessary gear.
- Turn on your boat's navigation lights. If there is fog, sound your fog horn.

 • Keep bilges free of water. Be prepared
- to remove water by bailing.
- · If there is lightning, disconnect all electrical equipment. Stay as clear of metal objects as possible.

Prepare your passengers for severe weather:

- · Have everyone put on a USCG-approved life jacket (PFD). If passengers are already wearing their PFDs, make sure they are secured properly.
- Have your passengers sit on the vessel floor close to the centerline for their safety and to make the boat more stable.

Decide whether to go to

shore or ride out the storm.

Take control of your

- · If possible, head for the nearest shore that is safe to approach. If already caught in a storm, it may be best to ride it out in open water rather than try to approach the shore in heavy wind and waves.

 • Head the bow into the waves at a 45-
- degree angle. PWCs should head directly into the waves.
- If the engine stops, drop a "sea anchor" on a line off the bow to keep the bow headed into the wind and reduce drifting while you ride out the storm. In an emergency, a bucket will work as a sea anchor.
- · If the sea anchor is not sufficient, anchor using your conventional anchor to prevent your boat from drifting into dangerous areas.

Use Only The Right Fuel Treatment

With all the concerns related to ethanolblended fuels (E10) today, it's easy to become confused over how to deal with it. One of the most common bits of advice is to use a fuel treatment, but which one? Some folks believe that E10 can be

used with no ill effects while others think it is the end of boating as we know it. The truth is somewhere in between.

The main problem of E10 comes from the fact that ethanol and gasoline do not form a chemical bond. This means the mixture begins to degrade in as little as four weeks as the light ends of the fuel begin to evaporate, leaving behind gums and other solids that clog injectors and car-buretors, causing once well-behaved engines suddenly to be difficult to start or to run rough.

And, Another Problem

This is also why ethanol is typically added to the gasoline only when the tanker is preparing to deliver the fuel to the gas station of fuel dock. Ethanol produces less energy than gasoline, which means en-

gines running on this fuel can no longer deliver the same power or cruising range as when they were powered by 100 per-

Another problem is caused by ethanol's ability to attract and bond to moisture. As it draws moisture into the vented fuel tank of your boat, the water and ethanol form a tight chemical bond. If more than .5 percent water (by volume) enters the tank, the ethanol water mixture falls out of suspension with the gasoline, settling to the bottom of the tank as a distinct layer.

The result is gasoline with a reduced octane level. Worse, when the engine draws in the water/ethanol mixture, it will stall, hopefully before the water damages the fuel pump.

Knowing What To Use

However, even if the only fuel you can get is E10, it is no reason to give up the boat for a set of golf clubs. Many thousands of boaters across the United States have been dealing with E10 for three-plus

The trick is knowing what to use to make up for the problems caused by adding alcohol to our gas. The first thing to look for in a treatment is its ingredients

Many additives actually contain alco-hol or a form of alcohol. Ethanol is alcohol, and adding any more alcohol will only make it worse. Review the MSDS and, if in doubt as to what an ingredient is or what it does, Google it for more info

After you discard the additives that contain alcohol, look for one that will stabilize fuel chemistry in order to help prevent the formation of performancerobbing gums and other solids.

The next thing to look for is a treatment that will deal with the moisture attracted by ethanol. This is a tricky thing to do, since many treatments claim to "remove water" or make it burn; if you remember your high school chemistry class, you already know that neither is possible.

Be Wary Of The Claims

Some treatments will have video that claims to prove they can remove water. If you see one in which they add gasoline, water and then their treatment, pay attention to the fluid level. It will remain the same even after they shake the beaker and show that the water is gone. It's still there, but is now emulsified in the fuel

Two things are bad about this. First, many emulsifiers use alcohol to entrain or entrap the water. We already know you don't want to add more alcohol to E10.

The second problem comes from the fact that emulsified fuel leads to significant carbon deposits and rough-running engines. The FAA and Department of Defense both forbid the use of emulsifiers in aviation fuel for the simple reason that gravity is very unforgiving to aircraft after their engines stall.

While gravity is less of a concern to a boater, it still remains a bad idea to use an emulsifying fuel treatment in your boat's fuel. Emulsifiers can also "thicken" fuel, taking on a cloudy appearance; in order to comply with engine manufacturer war-ranty requirements, fuel must be "clear and bright." The fuel must literally be clear enough to read a card placed behind the fuel; if it is not, it could void a warranty.

The Only Way

The only way to remove water from fuel is to somehow vaporize it during the combustion phase. Because water molecules tend to group together to firm large clumps, it's best to use a treatment that will break apart these clumps in order to disperse the water throughout the fuel in order to reduce the size of the water molecule clumps and make it easier to vaporize the small particles.

Look for a treatment that will remove gums or varnish or carbon in order to keep

the fuel delivery system functioning at its best. It should also enhance the fuel's combustibility in order to help prevent future deposits from forming. This enhanced combustibility will also help restore some of the power lost to ethanol, and that means the engine will start more easily an run better, too.

Another test to be wary of is the "clean-burning" treatment. Alcohol burns with an invisible flame. Treatments that use a petrochemical base will give off a mildly smoky flame. If it burns that cleanly, take a closer look at the MSDS to see if any of the ingredients end in "-ohol."

Finding a treatment that will do all the above is a tall order, but they do exist. Using one will allow you to get back to enjoying your time on the water.

NOTE: At present, E15 is not "mandated" for use, nor is it readily available. Even where it can be found, it cannot be used in anything other than cars and trucks 2001 or newer. It CANNOT be used in boats or motorcycles or PWC or lawnmowers or cars older than 2001. The fact that the gas station would have to purchase and install a dedicated tank and fuel pump make it more unlikely it will see widespread use anytime soon. Pets Ahoy! Boating With Pets

Editor's Note: For eight years, AZBW/WOT publisher Jim Allen and editor Carol Allen lived aboard in San Diego Bay. Their shipmate was a white Persian cat named "Popcorn," who was an excellent boating companion. Many have asked us about having their pets onboard, and in response, we present this thorough article from www.petsweeklv.com.

Dog overboard!" I heard the dreadful splash just seconds after our small dog slipped from the boat into the ocean below. Glancing over the side, I saw our tiny pug furiously doggie-paddling in the dark, cold sea. Kiang was struggling to reach the pier, but the frigid Pacific waters were quickly slowing him down and, despite the warm

sun overhead, he was already shivering.
Suddenly, a large green fishing net surged through the water, scooping the tired pup from the sea in a frenzy of splashing and kicking. Luckily we were still docked, and the sea was not quite as frigid on this sunny day. Had it been winter, or in the open ocean, our pet may not have fared as well.

When we first thought about taking our pets along for a summer of cruising the Pacific Northwest, it was with little trepidation. We dreamt of watching our dogs chase seagulls through the early morning surf and seeing our favorite feline vigilantly standing guard on the bow, surveying the whales that surfaced near our yacht



It didn't take long to understand that the reality of cruising with pets is much different than these sweet daydreams; but with preparation, planning and a lot of patience, we were able to make the dream a

Ahoy, Mate!

Introduce your pets slowly to a life at sea (or even to prolonged periods on inland waters). We began with short rides in the dinghy. Our thinking was if they could handle a dinghy; they would be fine on a large boat. As it turns out, our dogs don't like short rides in dinghies, preferring the yacht instead. Each pet is different.

If you find that your pet is susceptible to seasickness, consult your veterinarian before leaving the dock. The cats of several cruising friends exhibit symptoms such as excessive drooling, while our dogs tend to vomit in high seas. There are many options available for treating seasickness

in pets, from over-the-counter treatments like Dramamine to prescription medica-

Check with your veterinarian before administering anything to your pets. Keeping your pets restrained near the center of the boat where there is less motion while underway will also help. Finally, be sure to thoroughly examine

your pet's health prior to leaving. You should obtain blood work and a stool sample analysis to check for heartworm and other parasites, and since you could be going to an area that is ripe with these issues, put your pet on heartworm medication prior to leaving. It only needs to be administered once per month and it could save your pet's life



Basic training is also an important cruise precursor. You must teach all pets to wear harnesses rather than collars, and to stay on-leash. A sturdy harness will allow you more control over your pet while walking, and will make it much easier to pull them out of the water if required.

Train your pet to obey simple commands such as come, board, off boat, drop, and stay. Using positive reinforcement and clicker training, even cats can be trained. Many places have leash laws for all species, and not obeying this law can result in a large enough fine to put a damper on your cruising vacation.

"People know not to drink and drive a boat, but they don't always know that it's not a good idea to drink and swim," he added.


Buried deep in the claims files, Adriance comes across a story about a group of friends having drinks at a Florida resort who decided to go for a moonlit tour of the harbor.

At midnight, despite choppy seas and 20-knot winds, their boat is allowed to drift while several jump in. Unfortunately, winds quickly sweep the boat away, so the captain "backs down" on the swimmers in the water to get everyone back aboard.

Amazingly, no one is hurt except for a 40-year old woman — later identified as a good swimmer - who is simply never found

LAKE POWELL REPORT

Fishing Success Predicted For Fall Months

By Wayne Gustaveson

Powell is a lake divided into two separate fisheries. From Rainbow Bridge Canyon to Hite, stripers are boiling at many locations throughout the day. But, from Rainbow Bridge downlake the surface is quiet and fishing is challenging.

Striper boils only happen when shad are plentiful. Our recent trawl sampling showed record numbers of shad from the San Juan to Hite. High runoff spread nutrients throughout the upper lake resulting in increased plankton production.

When shad were spawned, abundant little plankters allowed shad to find easy meals close at hand and survive in high numbers. Shad grew quickly to a size attractive to all predators including stripers and bass. Stripers responded by herding up shad schools and trapping them against the surface where they can feed most effectively.

Recent Boils

Recent boils have been concentrated in the main channel from Cedar Canyon

Creek. Most of the action has been in the main channel but don't be surprised to find boils in the backs of canyons.

Stripers are not hard to catch on surface lures and Kastmaster spoons if the lure lands near the front of the rapidly.

Stripers are not hard to catch on surface lures and Kastmaster spoons if the lure lands near the front of the rapidly moving fish and is then worked back through the boil. But a lure that lands on the south side of a north-bound boil will be ignored.

In the southern lake, boils are nonexistent. The absence of surface feeding is a mystery. Shad numbers found in trawl samples were high just as seen in the north. The difference was shad size. Most shad were still small in the Wahweap sample.

Plenty Of Shad

We are not sure if the size disparity means there is less plankton for southern shad to eat or if growth will catch up with the northern shad in the near future. My guess is that there are plenty of shad from Rainbow to Wahweap and the lower lake is only days away from erupting.

The most likely explanation is that small shad can be eaten at depth by individual stripers. That means the striper school does not have to drive shad to the top. Stripers just eat shad in place and move on to the next customer. As shad size increases, stripers will have to work together to feed effectively and boils will happen.

On a recent trip on a calm evening from West Canyon to Wahweap, numerous shad schools were seen dimpling the surface. Open-water shad were abundant and in a jovial mood without any predators harassing them. That peaceful mood will soon be shattered when stripers find the schools. But, for now, trolling and bait fishing is worth a try while waiting for fish to boil.

Good For Bass

Bass fishing is good in the early morning and evening particularly around open water reefs where smallmouth like to hang out. Largemouth are in the flooded green bushes in the backs of canyons and coves.

Unfortunately, the lake is huge at this

Unfortunately, the lake is huge at this water level and choices are many. The right cove may have a school of largemouth making the trip a fantastic event while many other similar coves provide a meager catch.

The key now is lake stabilization. Fish will find a spot to their liking and set up a new home range similar to the one they had when the lake was 60 feet lower. They will remain at the new home and be found predictably from now into the fall.

Fishing success will now improve each day and last well into September and October.

At press time, water temperature was 80-85F, and lake elevation at 3,660.

Weather Plays A Big Part In Arizona Angling

It's time to get into a thunder-bumper frame of mind.

By Rory Aikens ÄZGFD

Afternoon rain showers in the high country can be the key to catching fish right now, whether trout in the higher mountain lakes or bass in places like Fool Hollow and Willow Springs lakes that have multiple fish species.

You might even tie into some huge northern pike, such as the one pictured from Upper Lake Mary



As those cumulonimbus clouds start billowing up toward the high heavens above the pine country, the barometer will start dropping, flying insects will become very active and hold just off the ground and water. More important, fish can become increasingly active and feed aggressively at the top of the water col-

This opens up a superb window of opportunity for anglers to catch actively feeding fish. But, if there is lightening, you don't want to have a high carbon fishing rod in your hand — they make excellent lightening rods. In fact, I have an old Hank Parker fiberglass fishing rod for



'Match The Hatch'

Fly anglers have a term called "match the hatch," which simply means to iden-tify what the fish are feeding upon and then mimicking those forage items

If the fishing are actively feeding on insects, even if you are a spin angler, you can still use flies such as woolly buggers. Simply get something like a casting float (typically fills with water) and run a small leader (you can even use fly line) with a

Or, you can also employ another tech-que — using reaction baits. When trout, nique bass, pike and walleye are actively feeding, a little bit of what I call "flash and dash" can often work well such as inline spinners. Try Mepps spinners, Rooster Tails and the like. Also try casting spoons, such as Z-rays (made in Arizona) or KastMasters.

Sometimes, for the larger fish, especially trout, try using Rapalas in silver, gold or rainbow trout colored. These crankbaits can sometimes be the ticket for larger trout, as well as bass and walleye

Mix it up. Experiment. Have fun.

More To Consider

Don't forget about the "cool water" fish such as walleye and northern pike. I have received some really good reports lately of anglers catching big walleye and some nice pike at Upper Lake Mary in Flagstaff

In the lower-elevation lakes, building T-storms and a dropping barometer can create an exciting window of fishing op-portunity for my favorite type of angling

Largemouth bass or even striped bass can start feeding aggressively on threadfin shad at or near the water's surface as T-storms roll across the desert. You'll want to use lures that mimic wounded shad, such as poppers, stick baits and buzz baits.

Spoons can also work — quite often the really big bass hang around the bot-tom to gobble up pieces of shad following

surface feeding frenzies.

Position your boat to cast past the surface melee, then work the lure back through it. My favorite is the Zara Puppy or Zara Spook and doing what's called walking the dog," which is making the



lure go back-and-forth in a zigzag pattern like a wounded shad flittering across the

And, If There's A T-Storm

However, a lot of anglers, myself included, can find themselves in a ticklish situation — the surface feeding can keep getting better and better, often reaching a crescendo right as the T-storm crashes across the lake.


Next thing you know, winds are whip-ping up the waves, lightning is flashing all around you, and you are being pelted

by wind-whipped rain or even hail.

Don't wait too long. But, just in case, be sure to have rain gear. Head protection from rain and hail can be essential. I always carry space blankets.

Sometimes, it's just not possible to make it to the boat ramp. If not, at least make it to shore in cove or a place where waves are not crashing up against the land mass and find whatever shelter is available. Carry a long length of line so you can tie up your boat

Let the planning begin. The drawing results for Arizona's 2011 fall big game hunting permits are now available at the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Web site at www.azgfd.gov/draw. Draw results are also available by telephone at (602) 942-3000 by selecting option two.

The more than 107,000 applicants, an

The more than 107,000 applicants, an increase of 3 percent from last year, can find out if they were issued a permit-tag for deer, fall turkey, fall juniors-only javelina, bighorn sheep, fall buffalo, or pheasant by providing their sportsman's ID and date of birth.

Game and Fish officials report that hunt permit-tags were mailed out to successful applicants by Aug. 12 (archery deer tags were earlier). Refunds for unsuccessful and rejected applicants will be mailed out to applicant "A" no later than Aug. 23 (less application fees).

For those individuals who missed the drawing application deadline or were unsuccessful in getting a permit-tag, there are more than 5,767 hunt permit-tags remaining. These remaining tags will be available on a first-come, first-served basis and include more than 4,600 deer tags, more than 700 fall turkey tags, and nearly 400 tags for the juniors-only fall javelina hunts. Starting on Aug. 8 at 8 a.m. (MST),

Starting on Aug. 8 at 8 a.m. (MST), hunters could get one in person at any of the seven Arizona Game and Fish Department offices. A list of office locations is available at www.azgfd.gov/offices.

For those applicants for either hunt number 4501 or hunt number 4518, there was a reduction in permitted tags issued through the draw compared to what was listed in the regulations. On July 8, the Arizona Game and Fish Commission voted to reduce the number of permit-tags by 1,075 permits due to the Wallow Fire. The commission action was taken after the application deadline, but before the draw was processed.



Dove Season Should Be Just Like The Good Old Days

Notice: One million acres are opened to hunting; dove limits now 10, and there are all-day hunts.

Arizona Game and Fish has turned back the hands-of-time for dove hunters, with the launching of the new 2011-12 Arizona Dove and Band-tailed Pigeon regulations that are now available online at www.azgfd.gov/dove.

"For those of us with a little gray hair, the upcoming September 1st dove season will feel like a hunt from the olden' days, now that we can once again hunt on much of the open, undeveloped public lands within municipalities, such as Phoenix," said Rory Aikens, a public information officer with the Arizona Game and Fish Department for the past two decades.

Changes Remove Barriers

A number of changes have been made to the dove regulations that have removed many barriers to this Arizona hunting tradition, most notably:

- · Hunting access re-opened to approximately a million acres of open uninhabited lands within municipalities,
- · Daily bag limit increased for whitewinged dove to 10 birds, and
- Hunting hours extended until sunset statewide.

The increased access is a result of two recently revised state laws. Those changes transferred the authority to regulate the use of firearms for the take of wildlife within municipal boundaries to the Arizona Game and Fish Commission.

Because of these changes, dove hunters will no longer have to drive long distances to participate in this Arizona hunting tradition

However, Game and Fish has taken a prudent approach in its deployment of



these shifted authorities and has closed hunting in many well-defined, densely populated metro areas. The flip side of this for dove hunters, especially those in the Phoenix metro area, is you will now be able to easily determine where you can and cannot hunt doves.

Know Before You Go

The closed to hunting boundaries are well defined in the notes section of the 2011-12 Arizona Dove and Band-tailed pigeon regulations. For the Phoenix metropolitan area, there is a map showing where you can and cannot hunt. The area is bounded by readily discernable roadways or waterways, such as the Gila River, and

is available at www.azgfd.gov/dove.

At first glance, these regulations may seem more complicated than in years past. However, with this one-stop resource comes some complexities. Hunters need to thoroughly understand the notes section before they go hunting.

"A perfect example are the lands along the Carefree Highway corridor, between I-17 and US Route 60. These lands are primarily wide-open desert, but they fall within the city limits of Phoenix and Peoria. Before the law change, it was illegal to discharge a firearm within city limits, making hunting in these safe, open, unpopulated fringe areas also illegal - that

Fall Is A Great Time Of Year In Rocky Mountain National Park

Summer is beautiful and busy in Rocky Mountain National Park, Colo., but visitors are discovering that autumn can be lovely and a bit quieter.

Located in north-central Colorado, Rocky Mountain National Park is the 10th most-visited national park in the United States, with an annual visitation of about three million people.

Rocky encompasses about 415 square miles of glorious mountain scenery ranging in elevation from 7,800 feet at park headquarters to the summit of Longs Peak at 14,259 feet. Ninety-five percent of the park is designated wilderness, full of mountains, glaciers, lakes, waterfalls, myriad species of mammals, birds, fish, and a profusion of wildflowers and butter-

Fall comes early to the high country. Years vary, but generally in the last week of August, the first shocks of gold aspen leaves start showing up, high on hillsides. In early September, more gold leaves

can be enjoyed in the Grand Lake area. On the east side of the park, aspen trees turn gold at Bear Lake starting in mid-September, and in late-September in the Estes Park area.

Besides enjoying glorious golden aspen, visitors can see the elk rut in full swing from about mid-September until mid-October. This is the mating ritual of the elk, during which big bulls spar with each other and bellow eerie bugles to attract cows

Elk are most active at dawn and dusk and tend to rest during the middle of the day. In the evenings, park visitors can ex-perience the rut from meadow edges, where volunteers are available to answer questions.

Also, each evening from Sept.1 through Oct. 10, rangers present 30-minute programs called "Elk Echoes," all about elk adaptations, migration and mating behavior. Programs are held at 6 p.m. at both the Moraine Park Visitor Center amphitheater and Sheep Lakes parking lot.

Weather can be changeable in the fall, so come prepared. It can definitely snow at higher elevations! Layers — including insulating, windproof clothing like synthetic or wool — are a great idea, and storm gear is essential. Hats and gloves are good to throw in your suitcase too. Proper footwear is important if you plan to hike. Trail Ridge Road, the highest, continu-

ous, paved road in the United States, crosses the park and crests at over 12,000 feet. Snow can close this road temporarily in fall, and the park tries to keep it open through mid-October. The average closing date of Trail Ridge Road is Oct. 22.

In winter, weather permitting, visitors can drive the first eight miles on the east side to Many Parks Curve, the first major overlook, and the first 10 miles on the west side to the Colorado River Trailhead.

Fall, which had been a best-kept secret

next marina for their regulations as they may differ from the state. Another costly issue is not cleaning up after your pet in marinas. We found it easiest to carry small plastic sandwich bags that can be easily sealed and disposed of.

While You Are Docked — Welcome Aboard!

Docked boats provide a perfect learning opportunity for pets, and this is the time to establish a routine. We immediately let our pets know when they were allowed outside, where it was appropriate to eliminate, and the difference between playtime and nap-

This is also the time to establish a boarding protocol. Ramps can be purchased to help a pet board safely, and everyday

bathroom mats can provide footing on the slick fiberglass of a freshly waxed boat while docked.

Keep your pet's health records handy as you could be asked for them at any time. A health certificate states the animal was in good health at the time of the visit to the veterinarian, its breed, name, date of visit, and any health concerns. If you're sailing abroad, European countries require an EU998 form which can be provided by

your veterinarian, so plan in advance.

Keep current pictures of your pets handy in case they become lost while docked, and always keep copies of your pet records in a separate location. Avian Flu has caused problems for many a boating bird-owner, so be sure to check the most recent legal requirements before embarking as these regulations change constantly.

Ensuring that your pet has proper identification is imperative. There are a number

of different types of ID forms available, including a new "electronic" collar that stores your pet's information on a waterproofed flash drive.

A service that we use is available in Canada and the U.S. called 1-800-LostDog. With a 98 percent recovery rate within the first 48 hours of a pet missing, this is one of the more efficient methods we have found for tracking our pets.

Microchipping your pet is important; yet keep in mind that it is best to combine mi-crochipping with an ID tag. Be sure to have a cell phone registered with any ID in case your pet is found. We know of cases where the owners were called on their home phone, but they didn't receive the message for two months as they were out cruising. It is also wise to register the phone number of a friend or family member you trust.



is no longer the case," said Aikens.

The Quarter-Mile Law

In addition to the closed area descriptions, hunters are reminded of the quartermile law, and while that is a minimum, responsible, ethical hunters will find an area where there is plenty of open space in all directions to hunt, in order to prevent any conflicts with other recreationists or homeowners, and to have an enjoyable hunting experience.

The early dove season opens on a Thursday this year, and runs from Sept. 1-15, statewide, with a 10-bird daily bag limit of mourning or white-winged dove. Printed copies of the dove regulations are available statewide at license dealers and Game and Fish offices.

Dove hunters are reminded they will

need a general hunting license and an Arizona migratory bird stamp. Both are available online, at Game and Fish offices and licensed dealers.

Dove Populations Doing Well

Overall, dove populations are doing well in Arizona. Many farms are growing grains, including corn, which are excellent dove attractants. Working a corridor in these areas will bode well for many

In addition, monsoonal rains have been adequate throughout the state bringing much needed new growth to desert flora, another excellent dove attractant. Finding a lone water tank in these newly opened desert areas could also provide some fast wing shooting action.

In either case, success will come to those who scout their areas the weekend before they go hunting, as much can happen between now and that 3 a.m. wake up on opening day.
