Fire Extinguishers

- All vessels are required to have at lease one Type-B-I fire extinguisher)s) on board if one or more of the following conditions
 - Inboard engine
 - Closed compartments where portable fuel
 - tanks may be stored
 Double bottoms not sealed to the hull or which are not filled completely with flotation material
 - Closed living spaces
 - Closed storage compartments in which flammable or combustible materials may be stored
 - Permanently installed fuel tanks (any tank where the removal of the tank is hampered by the installation of tie-down straps or clamps)
- Approved types of fire extinguishers are

identified by the following marking on the label — :Marine Type USCG-Approved — followed by the type and size symbols and

the approval number.

Extinguishers should be placed in an accessible area - not near the engine or in

a compartment, but where they can be reached immediately. Be sure you know how to operate them, and inspect extin guishers regularly to ensure they are in working condition and fully charged.

Trailering your Vessel

- Secure all gear in the vessel and arrange it so that the weight is evenly distributed in the vessel
 Properly secure the vessel with several tie-down
- straps and/or safety lines to prevent it from
- Crisscross the safety chains when attaching them to the towing vehicle
 Make sure the trailer brakes and lights are
- working.

- On the road:
 Think farther ahead on the road than usual: anticipate changes in traffic flow in advance; make wide turns at corners and curves; allow extra time and distance for stopping and for passing other vehicles; and remember the length added by your trailer.

 Be aware that there may be lower speed limits for vehicles with trailer.

 After 5 to 10 miles of travel at highway speed, stop for a walk-around inspection of the vehicle

and trailer. Check tires, lights, coupler, etc.; and feel the trailer hubs. Excessively hot hubs may indicate a problem. On extended trips, make periodic stops to do a walk-around inspection.

ATTENTION BOATERS... Don't Pick Up Hitchhikers!

What can you do? Inspect your boat

Inspecting — Thoroughly inspect your boat's hull, outdrive, trim Inspecting — Inforoughly inspect your boat's hull, outdrive, trim plates, trolling plates, prop guards, transducers, and trailer. If you see any "hitchhikers," remove them. Remove aquatic plants and plant fragments clinging to the trailer frame, axles, wheel, hitch, motor's lower unit, and interior boat spaces. Spray down your boat and trailer before leaving any lake or stream or at home before setting out for a new boating

Draining — Drain all bilge water, live wells, and bait buckets before leaving any waterway. Leftover bait should not be released or transported.

Stop the spread of aquatic pests!

Giant salvinia, quagga mussels, crayfish, and mud snails most often spread between waterways by hitchhiking a ride on vessels and trailers. When transplanted into new waters, these organisms proliferate, displacing native species and damaging the water resource and your vessel

WHAT TO DO WITH 'DOWN TIME'?

Coast Guard Auxiliary Gives Great Suggestions

Are you patiently waiting for the ice to thaw or the weather to warm up so you can get your boat back on the water again? Then why not use the down time productively and take a boating-safety class conducted by your local Coast Guard Auxiliary flotilla or AZGFD, the local U.S. Power Squadron, or the Lake Pleasant Sailing Club?

The Coast Guard Auxiliary (as do the others above) offers numerous boating courses for the public, but you may want to go with the basic "About Boating Safely" course or the more in-depth "Boating Skills & Seamanship" course as a refresher prior to the start of your 2013 boating season.

"About Boating Safely" is an eighthour beginner boating class designed to give you the knowledge needed to obtain a boat license or safety certification in many states. Many boat insurance companies will offer discounts on boating insurance to boaters who successfully complete "About Boating Safely"





"Boating Skills & Seamanship" is a more comprehensive, multiple session program designed for both the experienced and the novice boater. The course consists of eight core-required two-hour lessons plus five elective lessons, providing up-to-date knowledge for safely handling boats in all conditions.

Downtime Also A Good Time To Check Safety Gear

Don't arrive at a launch ramp this spring and find your on-board safety equipment missing or in need of repair. Use "downtime" to check your boat's safety equipment and make sure it's in top operating condition. The following safety items are essential (and required by law):

Life jackets -one wearable Coast

Guard approved life jacket for each person on board in good, serviceable condition, of appropriate size and type for the intended user and readily accessible.

Throwable floatation – Boats 16 feet

and longer (except kayaks and canoes) must carry one throwable device (cushions, ring buoys, etc.)

Visual distress signals – Vessels over 16 feet must be equipped with day and night visual distress signals; vessels less than 16 feet are not required to carry day signals but must carry night signals from sunset to sunrise. Signaling devices include pyrotechnic devices (flares and smoke), orange distress flags and electric distress lights. Check if you are unsure of what de-

vices are required for your vessel. Fire extinguishers – Coast Guard-approved, marine-type fire extinguishers are required on boats propelled by machinery mounted where they can be easily reached away from locations where a fire is likely

bells, horns, and whistles,

Navigation lights - Vessels are required to display navigation lights between sunset and sunrise and during periods of re-stricted visibility (fog, rain, haze, etc). Check the U.S. Coast Guard Navigation Rules. International-inland for details

News From Arizona Anglers Includes Hints. Gift Ideas

Get Out For Trout

This is the time of year when the Arizona Game and Fish Department really kicks in its winter trout stockings in the lower-elevation lakes. You can't beat the recent weather, so now is a great time to get out and fish for trout.

Fishing Updates

Anglers sent in the following reports this week:

Brand reported that he caught some rainbow trout at Desert Breeze Lake (an Urban Fishing Program water in Chandler) using spring green Power Bait, small panther martins, mealworms, and nightcrawlers under a bobber.

Mike A. reports he fished the lower Salt River at Phon D. Sutton last weekend and got a few strikes but didn't catch anything. Mike said, "I had high hopes because two weeks ago I managed to catch two trout in a short amount of time. I was using night crawlers and Power Bait both times. There was plenty of wildlife and other animals to see though, including bald eagles, horses and even a bull (all on the opposite side of

Brett M. reports that the grass or algae growth on the bottom of Kiwanis Lake is significant. "Every cast results in clumps of this nasty coarse grass on the hook and weight. Even bobbers are getting stuck on it unless you keep your line less than 2 feet from the bobber.

Fishing is unproductive, although I've seen a few lucky catches. I've made 3 good attempts for trout in the last week with no success, where I usually would catch my limit (or at least one). I would have to rate Kiwanis poor-to-bad at the present; [I'm] going to have to try some of the other urban lakes.

Brian M. reports that Oak Creek is fishing good for rainbow and brown trout. Most catches were on a small white midge (18) with a Hare's Ear flashback dropper. Trout in the Upper West Fork area aren't very active, but lower in the canyon temperatures are around 70 and the fishing is great. Key times are 8-11 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. to dusk.

Lyman Lake State Park and access to Lyman Lake in eastern Arizona closed for the season on Dec. 1.

Fishing Licenses For Gifts

In the midst of the holiday rush, don't forget to buy your 2013 fishing license. <u>Class A licenses</u> (general fishing license for state waters) cost \$23.50 for residents and \$70.25 for non-residents. Trout stamps (which are required in addition to a Class A license for the taking of trout) are \$15.75 for residents and \$57.75 for non-

Class U (Urban) fishing licenses cost \$18.50 for residents and nonresidents. The Class U license is valid only at the 21 designated Urban Fishing Program waters and is good for all fish species (including trout).

Tips From AZGFD For Avoiding Problems With Forest Service Travel-Management Rules

The Arizona Game and Fish Department has been receiving inquiries from outdoor enthusiasts who are uncertain about new Forest Service Travel Management Rules and whether the rules apply to them and their favorite recreational areas. Many hunters, anglers, campers and wildlife watchers are especially concerned about how the new travel management rules are being enforced, especially in national forests located in Arizona.

In response to these questions and concerns, Arizona Game and Fish has issued law enforcement guidance to its wildlife of-

Applies To AZGFD Officers

However, this guidance applies only to Arizona Game and Fish officers.

When heading out on a hunt or other outdoor activities, it's a good idea to consult directly with the land-management agency that has jurisdiction over the area you will be visiting.

Over a period of several years, each national forest located in Arizona has been working on establishing its own rules restricting motor vehicle use, pursuant to the federal Travel Management Rule (Federal Register, Vol. 70, No. 216). Some forests have already implemented Travel Management Rules for their areas, while other forests have not yet put any new rules into

When Rules Apply
The Forest Service Travel Management Rules usually apply when people are driving to a camping location, often referred to as dispersed camping, driving off-road to retrieve big game, and to road

closures/route designations. The rules require motor vehicles to stay on designated roads and trails. These areas are identified on a free Motor Vehicle Use Map, available at any U.S. Forest Service office. The rules vary from forest to forest, often resulting in unintentional violations

Because various Travel Management Rules are inconsistent, Game and Fish's recently-issued guidelines encourage its wildlife officers to exercise discretion and promote education when appropriate. Whether a Game and Fish wildlife officer takes enforcement action will depend on the circumstances, and could include providing education, giving a written or ver-bal warning, or issuing a citation. Some of the situations where travel management rules and restrictions might cause confusion include the following:

Motorized Retrieval Of Big Game: The restrictions on motorized retrieval of legally taken big game vary by forest and species. For example, in the Coconino National Forest, motorized retrieval is allowed only for elk, and only in certain Game Management Units. Confusingly, it is not allowed for other game species, such

Dispersed Camping: Restrictions on dispersed camping are also inconsistent and confusing, ranging from prohibited in some forests to permissible within 300 feet of a designated travel route in other

Road Closures, Signage, Barriers: Road closures and route designations also vary by forest. Some roads remain open unless signed closed, some are closed unless signed open, some are designated "Administrative Use Only," and some are closed in one forest yet open in an adjacent

"Federal land management agencies are valuable partners in conservation law enforcement, and we'll continue to enforce laws applicable to our authority that are critical to our mission and important to our customers," said Elms. "However, we won't expend law enforcement resources on low priority or counterproductive efforts that, due to their inconsistency, generate fear and uncertainty to outdoor recreationists and become a barrier to the public's ability to enjoy responsible recreation on their public lands."

To Learn More

The Arizona Game and Fish Department has been negotiating with and pro-viding input to the Forest Service on Travel Management Plans since 2005. Despite the best efforts of Arizona Game and ish, the various forests in the state have failed to adopt a consistent approach to travel management.

To learn more about Travel Manage-

ment Rules in effect in various national forests in Arizona, visit the Web sites of the different forests (in Arizona, the national forests are the Apache-Sitgreaves, Coconino, Coronado, Kaibab, Prescott, and Tonto) or contact their offices.

Be sure to also stop by the offices of the

national forests you visit, and ask for a free Motor Vehicle Use Map for the specific area in which you will be hunting, camping, and enjoying the great outdoors. You can also visit the official U.S. Forest Service website at www.fs.fed.us and use the site's search feature to find rules for specific forests.



There was a small crowd waiting when Justin Fleck backed Excel into the slip in front of Fisherman's Landing Dec. 9 sometime around 4 a.m., and it rapidly grew until there looked to be several hundred folks clustered around the biggest yellowfin tuna ever caught. By 6 a.m., to say the place was a zoo might be understatement. The trip was a Braid charter to the Hurricane Bank with 22 anglers.

The star of the event, electrician John Petruescu, was pinned to the dock rail by reporters, picture-takers, and manufacturer's reps, while his huge tuna resided in a cart that was about one size too small for its length. Meanwhile, the ship's crew and dock handlers struggled to haul 42 tuna over 200 pounds, along with many smaller tuna, through the churning mass of by-

Biggest Yellowfin Ever Caught

When the sky went light the giant tuna was hoisted up on a rented skyhook, and the crowd pressed in while the certified scales were read. They told an incredible weight of 445 pounds! Picture-taking began in earnest, and camera flashes went off all around the scene. Rookie long ranger Petruescu was asked to look this way and that, as professional and amateur photographers stepped on one another, trying to get a clean shot in the poor light of a cloudy dawn.

Everyone wanted to come forward and pose with the giant fish, the biggest yellowfin ever caught, as though to claim a piece of the action. I got my photos with

Grants Available For Public Shooting Ranges In Arizona

The deadline to apply is Jan. 15, 2013.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department wants to continue to improve and expand public shooting ranges across the state by providing grant funding to qualified appli-cants involved in the development, improvement or maintenance of public shooting and archery ranges.

The department is accepting grant applications now through Jan. 15, 2013. Shooting clubs, sportsmen's groups and government agencies operating public shooting ranges are encouraged to apply. Privately owned for-profit ranges are not eligible for this program.

"This program has been instrumental in the vitality of shooting ranges across the state," said Anthony Chavez, Game and Fish shooting ranges administrator. "It has afforded ranges the opportunity to expand safety barriers, add capabilities such as clay target shooting and archery shooting, improve ADA accessibility, and update and modernize these facilities.

Examples Of Projects

Examples of projects that could be eligible for funds include shooting range development and redevelopment, construction of noise abatement structures and safety berms, installation of shooting pads and stations, and construction or improvement of access roads and parking lots.

Grants are available through a competitive application process each year. The Arizona Game and Fish Commission determines how much money is available, but generally the total is about \$100,000. The maximum grant award is \$50,000 per

Chavez added, "Public shooting ranges are critical to the preservation of recreational and competitive shooting. They also support hunter education and youth programs, as well as facilitate law enforcement training.'

'User Pay-User Benefit'

The Arizona Game and Fish Department does not receive general funds from the State of Arizona. Most department funding comes from "user-pay, user-benefit" sources of funding, including sales of hunting and fishing licenses, stamps and tags. The benefit for allocating revenue for this grant is that it supports the department's hunter education, hunter recruitment and shooting sports programs, and it promotes and provides Arizona residents with safe shooting areas – all important elements of the department's mission.

Shooting sports and hunting are rated among the safest forms of recreation. Some 40 million people of all ages safely participate in these activities. However, research shows there are nearly 48 million men and women who are interested in shooting

sports and are simply waiting for an invitation. Grants of this kind will assist the department's already successful shooting and Application packets are available online hunter education programs. Volunteers Can Help Conduct Annual Bird-**Population Surveys**

Enjoy a wildlife-viewing experience and help wildlife conservation at the same time by volunteering to help out in one or more annual Arizona Christmas Bird Counts this month

The count program is a bird population survey that has been coordinated annually by the National Audubon Society since 1900. For each count, volunteers (including those from the Arizona Game and Fish Department) will take to the field for one calendar day between Dec. 14, 2012, and Jan. 5, 2013, to record every bird species and every individual bird sighted within a designated 15-mile diameter area

The data collected will be added to an extensive database that enables monitoring of winter bird populations across North America and helps in assessing the overall health of the environment.

Volunteer help is needed on most of these counts. This year there is no participation fee (in past years, a \$5 fee had been

Outdoor Recreationists Asked To Help Bald Eagles

Each year as part of its highly successful program to manage and conserve bald eagles in the state, the Arizona Game and Fish Department asks outdoor recreationists to help protect important eagle breeding areas by honoring the closure of 21 areas across the state.

Various land and wildlife management agencies close the breeding areas for part of the year, beginning in December, to protect the state's 55 breeding pairs of bald eagles. Some of the closure areas are located near popular recreation sites

Bald eagles continue to do well in Arizona, but they are sensitive to human activity during the breeding season and it can take as little as 30 minutes of leaving the eggs uncovered for a breeding attempt to fail," says Kenneth Jacobson, head of the Arizona Game and Fish Department Bald Eagle Management Program. "Cooperation from outdoor recreationists during the breeding season has been a major reason that the population continues to grow.

The bald eagle was federally listed as



an endangered species in 1978. Nationally, the birds recovered enough to be removed from the list in 2007

In December, Arizona bald eagles begin rebuilding nests in preparation for laying eggs. During this time, land and wildlife management agencies enact the seasonal breeding area closures. Bald eagles nest, forage and roost at the rivers and lakes that have become some of Arizona's most popular recreation spots, and this time of year can be challenging for the

Game and Fish's bald eagle management efforts are supported by the Heritage Fund, an initiative passed 20 years ago to provide for wildlife education and conservation through Arizona lottery ticket sales.

Airspace Advisory

Statewide - The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has established a 2000foot above ground level (AGL) advisory along the Salt and Verde river drainages. When traveling in these drainages or near riparian habitat statewide, aircraft should maintain a minimum of 2000-foot AGL to ensure compliance with state and federal

Growing Smarter Fund Distributes \$25 Million For Conservation

Earlier this fall, the Arizona State Parks Board awarded \$24,646,380 in Growing Smarter State Trust Land Acquisition Fund grants from the Land Conservation Fund.

"The State Parks Board feels these six open space projects will ensure protection of Arizona's scenic deserts around urban areas that are experiencing high growth," said State Parks Director Bryan Martyn.

The following six grants were awarded:

1. City of Scottsdale — McDowell
Sonoran Preserve/Cholla Mountain-

Rawhide Wash towards the purchase of 2,045 acres for up to \$4,824,330

2. City of Scottsdale — McDowell

2. City of Scottsdale — McDowell Sonoran Preserve/Granite Mountain towards the purchase of 3,200 acres for up to \$6,783,082

3. City of Scottsdale — McDowell Sonoran Preserve/Upper Sonoran Desert towards the purchase of 1,153 acres for up to \$4,389,051

4. Pima County — Tortolita Mountain towards the purchase of 1,415 acres for up to \$1,890,000.

5. City of Flagstaff — Picture Canyon towards the purchase of 477.80 acres for up to \$2,389,000.

6. City of Phoenix — Sonoran Preserve Priority 3-D towards the purchase of 1,543.78 acrers for up to \$4, 379,917

A total of \$40,734,760 was available from the Land Conservation Fund for the FY 2012 Growing Smarter Grant Cycle. However, A.R.S. §41-511.23.H.2 states that no more than 50 percent of the Land Conservation Fund from any one fiscal year may be awarded to projects in a single county.

This resulted in a total of \$20,367,380 available for the four projects in Maricopa County. Approval of the awards is contingent upon the applicants being the successful bidders at public auction. The final grant amounts will be based on the Arizona State Land Department final appraisal value of the parcels.

The purpose of the Land Conservation Fund is to conserve open spaces in or near urban areas and other areas experiencing high growth pressures. This is accomplished by awarding grants for the purchase or lease of State Trust land that has been classified as suitable for conservation purposed by the Arizona State Land Department (ASLD).

The passage of Proposition 303 on November 3, 1998 established an annual \$20 million appropriation by the Arizona State

Legislature from the General Fund to the Land Conservation Fund. This annual appropriation began in FY 2001 and ended in FY 2011.

With the passage of Senate Bill 1071 in 2003, State Parks annually transferred \$2 million to the Livestock and Crop Conservation Fund administered by the Depart-

ment of Agriculture. As a result, an \$18 million annual appropriation was available for the Growing Smarter grant program through FY 2011.

Beginning FY 2012 only remaining unexpended funds are available for grant awards. It is anticipated that approximately \$16,083,380 will remain available for the next grant cycle.



'One Size Fits All'

If you want one fishing license that covers all waters in the state, then the Class L, Super Conservation Fishing li-cense is the way to go. At \$53 for residents and only \$63 for non-residents, this super license includes the state fishing license, trout stamp and urban license - all in one package deal.

Fishing licenses are sold at over 320 license dealers statewide, at any Game and Fish office, or online at www.azgfd.gov/ eservices/licenses.shtml. You can even buy them ahead of time as Christmas gifts for friends and family as long as you know the personal information that needs to go on the license.

All anglers age 14 and over must purchase a license to fish in Arizona.

the help of Excel relief skipper Mike Ramirez, who found a couple of spots for me to grab some shots and shoot some video of the event.

It won't be an official IGFA record, because skipper Justin took the rod for a brief moment while Petruescu took a break. It will be a record for the San Diego longrange fleet, however, and this megacow record may stand for a bit longer than Mike Livingston's 405.2-pounder (and the current IGFA mark from 2010) did, before a couple of private boaters beat it.

Now the fleet has its mojo back, deservedly so, since nobody fishes for giant yellowfin longer or harder. Deckhands said Petruescu fought his fish for 99 percent of the scrap.

"It took me about an hour and 50 minutes," Petruescu told me, "and it started early. I just got up, had a cup of coffee, and then went out and caught a skipjack. I fooled with it a bit and sent it out. I brought it back a couple of times, and the big fish ate it around 6:30.

"The bait was at a 45-degree angle and maybe 100 yards out when it started. After he bit, he ran straight out, fast, and the line lifted up out of the water. The boat had to move to help with another fish. I had him partly in, and then he took off again. I had to decrease the drag pressure twice.

"At 8:15 I got him to the boat on the starboard side, and they put four gaffs in him and brought him up through the gate. I was still in my belt, standing about 20 feet from the gate when they gaffed him.

This was an excellent crew, and so was the service.'

John said he pinned his skippie to a 12/0 Mustad 7691 hook and a BHP windon leader of 130-pound Momoi. His backing was 130-pound Line One spectra on a Tiagra LRS 50 W reel and a on a Seeker Black Steel 6460 XH rod. He also had a cow that weighed 201 pounds.

John Petruescu is lead electrician on the San Vicente Dam project, scheduled for completion around April. He came from Romania, after his father and brother, and 11 more family members are now here

Interviewed on the dock, John may still have been fishing.

"I'm 33," he remarked, "and single."
John's brother David was along on this trip, and he caught cows of 204, 206, 237 and 247 pounds.



Spanning from 1865 through 1890 Camp Lincoln, Camp Verde and finally Fort Verde were home to officers, doctors, families, enlisted men and scouts.

Today, visitors can experience three historic house museums, the Commanding Officer's Quarters, Bachelors' Quarters and Doctor's Quarters on Officer's

row, all furnished in the 1880s period and holiday grace. These Arizona treasures are currently listed on the National and State Register of Historic Places due to their unique architectural and historic significance.

In the former Administration building, the Park offers visitors interpretive exhibits with period artifacts on military life, Indian Scouts and Indian Wars history


