

# **Superstition Search And Rescue Responds South Of The Border**

On Dec. 30, 2009, a convoy of vehicles from Superstition Search & Rescue headed south of the border to assist "our Mexico friends" in starting up their first volunteer search-and-rescue team.

SSAR Commander Robert Cooper thanked the members and the community for many much-needed supplies to begin the effort in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico. Included (but always welcome in the future) were the following items:

- GPS units Radios
- Webbing
- Water coolers · Ice chests
- · Stokes · Back boards Flashlights
- Medical supplies
  - Tents · Thermoses
- · Blankets · Back backs
  - Sleeping bags
- Ropes
  - Rain gear · and much more
- Boots · Harnesses

Members dug deep into their personal gear, Cooper said, and added that Mexico released a press conference calling this"Bi-national SAR Cooperation." SSAR took along their own interpreter and photographer.

#### A Letter To The Team

When SSAR members returned from Nogales, Commander Cooper wrote the following letter: Hey, Team,

We are back from Nogales, and it was a rewarding and educational experience. Jesse [the Mexican contact] has been a dog handler for 13 years and is moving full speed foreword into SAR. He and 13 volunteers have been self-training and are being used more and more by the police and federals.

However, Jesse has two battles he's dealing with: 1) Convincing the powers that be, those responsible for different areas, to use his team because until now, Mexico has never had a volunteer resource and 2) Talking to all the traffickers and "bad guys" not to shoot them while they're helping those in need.

He was telling us that when they enter an area, the bad guys tell them where they can and can't search and whether they can or can't enter into an area to rescue or re-

When we arrived, we were met by Jess, his wife and two children plus two federals in orange, a cop, a representative for Red Cross and a paramedic. Jesse was very excited about our donation because they have no equipment, support or funding of any kind.

He did make a request of us and I wanted to bounce it off of all of you. He asked if we could come down to Nogales and set up a demonstration of how to pa-tient package and utilize ropes in a low and steep-angle environment?

I would like to [set] a training day to drive down, get a room, train with them, then if anyone wants to enter into Nogales, they can make some purchases before we head home. Please RSVP if this is something that you would be interested in

# Refreshen your boating safety knowledge

# Unlawful and Dangerous Operation

Arizona law designates these dangerous operating practices as illegal.

- ◆ Negligent or Reckless Operation of a vessel is operating in a manner that causes danger to others or their property, such as:
  - Operating in a restricted area such as a marked swimming area;
  - Operating while passenger(s) are positioned in the bow such that the operator's view is obstructed;
     Weaving through congested
  - Weaving through congested waterway traffic;
  - Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife;
  - · Teak surfing or platform dragging.

No Wake or Wakeless speed means a speed that does not create a wake and is never in excess of five miles per hour.

- Speed Restrictions require the operator to maintain a proper speed while operating a vessel. Specifically, it is illegal to:
  - Operate a vessel at speeds greater than are reasonable or proper given the existing waterway traffic, persons in the water, and weather conditions;
  - the water, and weather conditions;
    Exceed any posted speed limits;
  - Operate a vessel at greater than wakeless speed in a posted no wake zone.
  - Operate a vessel at speeds that may cause injury or damage to any other person, another vessel, or the property of others. This includes causing damage or danger from the wake of your vessel.
- Riding on the Bow or Gunwales is allowing passengers to ride where there may be a chance of falling over board while underway at greater than "no wake speed" on a powerboat. Specifically, this means allowing passengers to ride on the covered bow, transom, swim step, or gunwales unless these are designated for carrying passengers at all speeds.
- Overloading is loading the vessel beyond its safe carrying capacity or the recommended capacity shown on the capacity plate. Take into consideration the weather and other operating conditions when determining if the vessel is overloaded.
- ◆ Failure To Follow Navigational Rules is operating a vessel in violation of the navigational rules of Arizona waters
  - To learn more about Arizona's rules of Navigation, go to the Arizona Boater's Guide at www.azgfd.gov/ watercraft or www.navcen.uscg.gov.

Remember it is your responsibilty to know the law. On waterways shared with other states, such as the Colorado River, other states' laws and federal regulations apply. Always know all applicable boating laws and regulations.

#### Fire Extinquisher


- All vessels are required to have at least one Type B-I fire extinguisher on board if one or more of the following conditions exist:
  - Inboard engine
  - Closed compartments where
  - portable fuel tanks may be stored;
    Double bottoms not sealed to the hull or which are not filled completely with flotation material;
  - Closed living spaces;
  - Closed storage compartments in which flammable or combustible
- materials may be stored;
- Permanently installed fuel tanks (any tank where the removal of the tank is hampered by the installation of tie-down straps or clamps).
- Approved types of fire extinguishers are identified by the following marking on the label—"Marine Type USCG-Approved"—followed by the type and size symbols and the approval number.
- Extinguishers should be placed in an

accessible area—not near the engine or in a compartment, but where they can be reached immediately. Be sure you know how to use them, and inspect extinguishers regularly to ensure they are in working condition and fully charged.

# **Boating Basics: Before Going Out**

Before going out on the water, take steps to make the outing safe and enjoy-

#### Vessel Length Classes

A vessel's length class determines the equipment necessary to comply with federal and state laws.

Vessels are divided into length classes:


- · Less than 16 feet
- 16 feet to less than 26 feet
- 26 feet to less than 40 feet40 feet to less than 65 feet

Length is measured from the tip of the bow in a straight line to the stern. This does not include outboard motors, brackets, rudders, bow attachments, or swim platforms and ladders that are not a molded part of the hull.

#### **Vessel Capacity**

Always check the capacity plate, which is usually found near the operator's position or on the vessel's transom.

Measuring Vessel Length

This plate indicates the maximum weight capacity and maximum number of people that the vessel can carry safely.

PWCs and some other vessels are not required to have a capacity plate. Always follow the recommended capacity in the owner's manual and on the manufacturer's warning decal.

On vessels with no capacity plate, a

# **Boating Basics: On The Water**

Carbon Monoxide Poisoning
Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas that is very toxic even in small quantities. It is produced when a carbon-based fuel, such as gasoline or diesel, is burned. Cooking ranges, heaters, and charcoal grills produce carbon monoxide

#### Carbon Monoxide Kills!

Carbon monoxide disperses freely through the air and will travel readily throughout a boat.

Carbon monoxide discharged as engine, generator, or appliance exhaust may re-enter your boat through any opening.

A marine-type carbon monoxide detec-tor will sound an alarm when the gases reach an unacceptable level.

The best prevention for carbon monoxide poisoning is knowing that carbon monoxide exists.

By keeping a steady flow of fresh air moving through your boat, you will eliminate much, if not all, of the hazard. The danger comes when there are pockets of stagnant air loaded with carbon monoxide that are not flushed from your boat.

When operating any type of watercraft, be careful running downwind because exhaust gases may blow back on board.

Everyone should know the symptoms and treatment of carbon monoxide poison-

#### Symptoms Of Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

One or more of the following symptoms may signal the adverse effects of carbon monoxide accumulations:


- Throbbing templesInattentiveness or lack of concentration
  - · · Inability to think coherently

  - Ringing in the ears
     Tightness across the chest
- · Headache, drowsiness, nausea, dizziness, fatigue, vomiting, collapse, and convulsions

#### Treatment of Carbon **Monoxide Poisoning**

Evacuate, Ventilate, Investigate, and Seek Medical Help.



#### Danger!

Teak surfing, platform dragging, and water-skiing within 20 feet of a moving watercraft can be fatal.

Stay away from the exhaust ports-carbon monoxide builds up in areas near exhaust vents.

DO NOT swim in areas where carbon monoxide may accumulate, such as the cavity between the swim platform and the stern of the boat.

#### Weather Emergencies

Weather can change very rapidly and create unexpected situations for boat oper-

ators, weather-related accidents in Arizona are on the rise. Even meteorologists have trouble pre-

dicting rapid weather changes. You should always monitor weather developments. One way is to tune a VHF radio to the frequencies listed below. Then seek a protected area before the weather becomes a threat.

#### It's The Law: Control Aquatic Pests—Don't Move a Mussel

Quagga mussels have invaded vast stretches of the Colorado River bordering Arizona, as well as Lake Pleasant near Phoenix

It is crucial that all boaters follow simple steps to help prevent the spread of Quagga mussels and other invasive aquatic species.

Day-Use Procedures

Boats on the water for fewer than 5 days could be contaminated with microscopic quagga larvae. Before leaving any

Drain the water from the bilge, livewell, and any other compartments that could hold water.

Clean the hull and remove any clinging material such as plants, animals and mud from boat, motor, equipment, and trailer.

**Dry boat and equipment.** If your boat will be used within 5 days, take these additional steps:

Replace bilge drain plug and **disinfect the bilge** by pouring in 1 gallon of household vinegar. Drain the bilge once home. Vinegar can be reused a few times.

Hot power wash the boat, motor,

trailer, livewell, anchor rope, and anything else that came in contact with the water. Try do-ityourself car washes

If a power wash is not available, spray

# 'Best Fishing Decision I've Ever Made'

By Mike Wallace

My saltwater fishing obsession started at a very early age on a sandy beach in Mexico. My weapon: a Zebco reel loaded with 12-pound test tipped with a cast master. The sacrificial fiberglass rod caught countless pompano with a mix of small sea trout and rock bass for two days before it became seized by the grips of saltwater corrosion and sand.

This childhood experience grew incredibly fast into a full addiction, and as I grew, it evolved into short-range yellowtail and albacore excursions. I am now in the last third of my life, and I have found the destination of my extended salt-water journey: long range fishing.

Several months ago, Jim Allen from Arizona Boating & Watersports and John Bacos from Westcoastfishing.com invited me to fish the 12-day trip on Intrepid. Of course I said, "Yes!" and this is the best fishing decision I have ever made!

The horizon was just beginning to glow when my first sardine was carefully picked and presented to the darkness below. It began to strip line off my reel into the unseen depths of the tuna grounds. The fresh bait swam 20 yards with line in tow when I felt the short pulse of the frightened sardine burst into a frantic run.

The thought that this was the sign before the event was not even completed before I felt a bump. The pulse from the tail beat of my tiny frightened morsel of swimming bait could no longer be felt; in its place was a strong, steady run.

The line tightened to a sharp edge as a hooked giant stripped off yards of line — a battle that lasted nearly an hour before popping the stressed top shot. I was so amazed by this first encounter. It was an awesome battle won by a better foe.

Later that same day, another hookup proceeded to strip off nearly all the Spectra from my reel before it hit an unseen underwrap hidden in the last lengths of my spool. Once again, with a loud crack, the battle was won by a stronger opponent. I walked away, grinning again and amazed by the power of this short fight.

My next encounter was similar, shortened by a break-off from lines crossed and tangled. The next fish pulled the hook.

Long story short: It wasn't until the last two days that things finally came together for me by landing five yellowfin in the 50 and up class — one at 100 pounds, two at 177 pounds, and one that put me into the cow club at 218.

I can't say enough about this crew, captain, and boat. The numbers speak for them selves. Out of 18 fishermen, 28 fish over 200 pounds were caught, 52 in the 100 to 190 class, and many under 100 pounds. And, the mammoth catch of the trip was a whopping 352-pounder!

Let be known that there is no question

Let be known that there is no question *Intrepid* is a hunter-gatherer and on top of the San Diego fishing fleet food chain. This boat fishes you hard, treats you good, and feeds you better. What better compliment can I give?

Take a walk through any gym, and you'll notice many mistakes. Mistakes that waste time. Mistakes that put people in danger. And mistakes that are just plain stupid. Maybe you even make a few of these mistakes yourself.

By avoiding these common blunders, you'll put yourself on the fast track to reand much better experiences in the outdoors. Check out the following five fitness mistakes and the solutions you need to avoid danger and to get fit fast

Resolution for 2010: "I will be totally fit for the outdoors this year.'

Mistake 1: You use the wrong weight

The goal is to challenge your muscles, not to simply go through the motions. If you are able to complete 15 repetitions easily, then the weight is too light. On the flip side, if you aren't able to perform an exercise through its full range of motion, and find yourself cheating on form, then

the weight is too heavy.

The correct weights will feel challenging by your last few repetitions, but won't force you to sacrifice form.

#### Mistake 2: You do the same routine

You may have noticed that most people do the same exercises each time they visit the gym. Maybe you've been doing the same exercise routine as long as you can remember - if it isn't broken then don't fix it, right?

The truth is that exercise routines have expiration dates, and that is the date that they begin to lose their effectiveness. As a rule of thumb, never use the same routine for more than four weeks.

#### Mistake 3: You don't warm up

Most people consider warm up time to be wasted time - they'd rather jump right into the heart of the routine. What they don't realize is that a good warm up will allow you to perform at a higher intensity, which means greater results.

The point of a warm up is to increase your muscle temperature. This increases blood flow, muscle contraction and reduces muscle resistance. Your warm up should last 5-10 minutes.

#### Mistake 4: You use bad form

Gyms are filled with people performing exercises with bad form. The two biggest reasons are that you aren't concentrating on the exercise, or you're trying to lift weight that is too heavy. Lifting with improper form almost always results in injury

Civil War battles across America were well documented and history teachers carefully covered each battle across the East Coast, but few ever knew what was happening in the West during this time. A battle of the American Civil War was a skirmish fought near a rocky spire called Picacho Peak located between Phoenix and Tucson. The new highway follows the old wagon route that passed Picacho in 1862.

In 1860, the New Mexico Territory, which consisted of the lands that would become the states of Arizona and New Mexico, was sparsely populated. It ranked 34th in population out of 43 states and territories with only 83,009 inhabitants. It was 37th in black populations, with just eight of whom were free.

When the Civil War broke out in 1861, the U.S. Government recalled the majority of its troops from the West to build the Union army for the fighting in the east. Henry Hopkins Sibley joined the Confederacy and convinced Jefferson Davis that he would raise an army in Texas and invade New Mexico territories. He proposed that mineral resources would fill the coffers of the Confederacy and fund their massive war effort.

# Prepare the boat to handle severe

Slow down, but keep enough power to maintain headway and steering.

Close all hatches, windows, and doors to reduce the chance of swamping.

Stow any unnecessary gear. Turn on your boat's navigation lights. If there is fog, sound your fog horn.

Keep bilges free of water. Be prepared to remove water by bailing.

If there is lightning, disconnect all electrical equipment. Stay as clear of metal objects as possible.

Prepare your passengers for severe

Have everyone put on a USCG-approved life jacket (PFD). If passengers are already wearing their PFDs, make sure they are secured properly.

Have your passengers sit on the vessel floor close to the centerline for their safety and to make the boat more stable.

#### Decide whether to go to shore or ride out the storm.

If possible, head for the nearest shore that is safe to approach. If already caught in a storm, it may be best to ride it out in open water rather than try to approach the shore in heavy wind and waves.

Head the bow into the waves at a 45-de-

gree angle. PWCs should head directly into the waves

If the engine stops, drop a "sea anchor' on a line off the bow to keep the bow headed into the wind and reduce drifting while you ride out the storm. In an emergency, a bucket will work as a sea anchor

If the sea anchor is not sufficient, anchor using your conventional anchor to prevent your boat from drifting into dangerous




