



Update your boating safety knowledge

ATTENTION BOATERS... Don't Pick Up Hitchhikers?



What can you do? Inspect your boat

Inspecting — Thoroughly inspect your boat's hull, outdrive, trim plates, trolling plates, prop transducers, and trailer. If you see any "hitchhikers," remove them. Remove aquatic plants and plant fragments clinging to the trailer frame, axles, wheel, hitch, motor's lower unit, and interior boat spaces. Spray down your boat and trailer before leaving any lake or stream or at home before setting out for a new boating

Draining — Drain all bilge water, live wells, and bait buckets before leaving any waterway. Leftover bait should not be released or trans-

Remove and Dispose of Plants on Dry Land.

Stop the spread of **Aquatic Pests**

Giant salvinia, quagga mussels, crayfish, and mud snails most often spread between waterways by hitchhiking a ride on vessels and trailers. When transplanted into new waters, these organisms proliferate, displacing native species and damaging the water resource and your vessel

Falling Overboard

- · Don't sit on the gunwale, bow, seat backs, motor cover, or any other area not designated for seating.
- Don't sit on pedestal seats when underway at greater than idle
- Don't stand up on or lean out from the boat.
 Don't move about the boat when underway
- If someone on your boat falls overboard:
 - Reduce speed and toss the victim a throwable PFD.
 - · Have other passengers watch the victim.
 - · Turn your boat around and slowly pull alongside the victim, approaching the victim from downwind or into the current, whichever is stronger.
 - Turn off the engine. Pull victim on board over the stern, keeping the weight in the boat balanced.

Hypothermia

- If you are boating in cold water:
 - Dress in several layers of clothing under your PFD or wear a
 - Learn to recognize the symptoms of hypothermia. Symptoms begin with shivering and blush lips and nails, and progress to a coma and, ultimately, death

To reduce the effects of hypothermia:

- · Put on a PFD if not wearing one. It helps you to float without excessive movement and insulates your body.
- Get as much of your body out of the water as possible.
- Don't take your clothes off unless necessary clothes can help you float and provide insulation.
- Don't thrash or move about. Excess motion consumes energy and increases loss of body heat.
- · Draw your knees to your chest and your arms to your sides, protecting the major areas of heat loss. If others are in the water with you, huddle together with your
- arms around their shoulders.

Boating Safety Information From AZGFD: Hypothermia

Wearing a pfd, staying calm and with your boat can help save your life.

Do not let the temperature outside fool you. Cold-water immersion and hypothermia can occur in water as cool as 70 degrees at any time of the year, even on a warm and sunny day.

Arizona winters are mild, and recreational boating is popular year-round, but a sudden and unexpected immersion into cold water can cause hypothermia and even lead to a life-threatening situa-

Entering extremely cold water causes an immediate gasp reflex that can fill the lungs with water. After falling overboard or entering the water, it is important to be wearing your life jacket (PFD). A life jacket keeps your head above water and your body on the surface.

Stay calm and move slowly. Don't try to take off clothing in the water (a com-

mon misconception is that heavy cloth-ing or waders weigh down your body when, in fact, both can trap air and help keep your body afloat).

If your boat has capsized, stay with it.

More than likely, it will not sink and it can be used as a platform to maneuver, so stay on top of it as much as possible, getting yourself out of the water and maintaining stability.



2013 Fishing Regulations Are Now Available A summary of key changes is on page two of the booklet.

The 2013 Arizona Fishing Regulations are now available at all seven Arizona Game and Fish Department offices and at fishing license dealers throughout the state. They are also posted online at

www.azgfd.gov/fishing.
"Arizona's diverse fisheries offer great opportunities all year round," said Acting Fisheries Chief Eric Swanson. "If getting outdoors, staying healthy and spending quality time with family and friends are among your 2013 resolutions, fishing is a great way to meet your goals, have fun and make memories.

Bass, crappie and catfish are abundant in Arizona's large lakes and reservoirs. Mountain lakes and streams will be well stocked this year with trout. Local urban lakes are regularly stocked and are a terrific option for anglers who want to stay close to home.

Summary Of Key Changes

A summary of key changes is on Page 2 of the 2013 Fishing Regulations booklet. Of special interest to many anglers are limit changes at Alamo, Cataract and Kaibab lakes

Some of the regulation changes are — **Alamo Lake** – Slot limit for bass is removed, statewide limits now apply – six bass per day with no size restrictions.

Cataract Lake – Bag limits reduced to

four catfish, four trout and two bass (minimum size 13 inches). **Kaibab Lake** – Bag limits reduced to

four catfish, four trout and two bass (minimum size 13 inches). Council Park Pond (Somerton) – Bag

limits reduced to two catfish, two trout, one bass (minimum size 13 inches), and five sunfish

Frye Mesa Reservoir - Limits established to allow one Gila Trout daily (statewide limit of six trout still applies to other trout species: rainbow, brook, brown, cutthroat)

Lake Powell - Change walleye limits

Well, you now have that opportunity, so grab your favorite fishing pole and make sure you have a 2013 Urban Fishing license because the "incentive" trout stocking was just completed on Jan. 12 at all Urban Program lakes.

To kick off the New Year in a big way, the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Urban Fishing Program has stocked incentive-size trout. In addition to the usual 11-12 inchers, incentive stockings include bigger fish and up to 20 percent more fish.

Many of the more than 9,000 rainbow trout will be from 13-16 inches, and some even larger ones up to 4 pounds are ex-

'This is a great way to start off the New Year and helps highlight that an urban fishing license is one of the best recreational buys out there — it's a ticket to fun all year long," said Eric Swanson, who heads up the urban fishing program.

Trout are routinely stocked in the urban program lakes from early November through the middle of March. Starting in March, channel catfish are stocked.

'These urban lakes also have sunfish

and bass to catch. Plus, these lakes are all in city parks that also offer other recreational opportunities for the whole family," Swanson said.

The Urban Fishing Program is selfsupporting, and the cost of the fishing license helps defray the cost of purchasing and stocking the fish. "It's a user pay, user play concept that can net you a lot of fun throughout the year," Swanson said.

URBAN FISHING REPORT Winter Is Trout Time!

Throughout the winter, lakes in the Urban Fishing Program (UFP) have been successfully stocked with rainbow trout at two-week intervals. More trout and bigger trout arrived the week of Jan. 7-12 as part of the UFP's annual incentive trout stocking, making this a great time to go fishing.

Many fish in the 12-15 inch range are part of this special delivery, and some 3-4 pound whoppers are expected. Get ready for some big fish action by making sure your fishing line is in good shape, your hooks are sharp and your knots are strong.

Don't forget to bring along a net to help hoist a lunker from the lake. Best baits for trout continue to be scented dough baits (such as Power Bait), worms or cheese. A new lure called Micetails has been working well for trout. Produced by Berklev's Power Bait division, Micetails look like a salmon egg with a 2-inch worm attached.

Lures such as Panther Martins, Rooster

Tails and Kastmasters also work well.

Warm-Water Kids Slow Now

Not much is going on for catfish, bass or bluegill due to cold-water temperatures that slow down these warm-water species. Trout fishing is consistently good to excellent at Green Valley lakes in Payson, with Power Bait and worms fished on the bottom working best. Try small, flashy lures to attract the trout.

And, referencing the incentive largetrout stockings: Hooking into a large trout is an exciting and memorable experience. Remember to be patient in reeling in these lunkers and to adjust the drag on your reel, or else you may be talking about the big one that got away instead of the big one you expertly reeled in.

And if you are looking for bragging rights to your big catch, don't forget to get your fish weighed at a Game and Fish of-

The fish started biting hard and I pretty quickly bagged three largemouth bass in the 12- to 15-inch range.

I had a few other bites that I missed. It was a blast because I hooked them at about 25 feet down and about 100 feet off the side of the kayak, so the fight was pretty fun with that much line out, even though the fish weren't that big.

It was a beautiful day, a little windy, but the lake was pretty much deserted. My buddies didn't fare as well, so they decided to kayak to the back of the lake and take pictures. Thanks for the great fishing reports, I read them every week!

Parker Canyon Lake

Don and Bev recently submitted this report on Parker Canyon Lake (southern Arizona):

This lake right now is a great place if you want to catch some fish. Anglers on the dock were catching smaller trout. Up on the mainland by the marina, people were catching nice fish in the 9- to 17-inch range.

The rig I caught the most fish on was a 1/16-ounce sliding sinker on the main line and a swivel tied underneath the sinker. Attached to the swivel was a

snelled size 10 hook.

For bait, try PowerBait® or chunks of nightcrawlers. Hold your fishing rod! (at least if want to catch fish). For lures, try Kastmasters or Panther Martins. Also try rooster tails and flies.

Roger C. submitted this report from Water Ranch Lake (Gilbert, Phoenix metro area):



AZGFD Seeks Input On Game-Management Hunt Guidelines

The Arizona Game and Fish Department is accepting comments on improving the hunt guidelines to continue the sustainable management of the state's game animals, while providing as much hunting recreation as possible.

Comments on the existing hunt guidelines may be submitted through Feb. 15 at azgamebranch@azgfd.gov, or by mail to Hunt Guidelines, Arizona Game and Fish Department, 5000 W. Carefree Highway, Phoenix, AZ 85086.

"This is the public's opportunity to get involved in the nuts and bolts of this bi-annual process," said Big Game Management Supervisor Amber Munig.

"We are seeking your ideas, comments,

concerns, or observations on how to meet the many demands by our varied hunting public, as well as fostering new opportunities for continuing our hunting heritage for future generations."

The hunt guidelines provide the biological and social parameters that make up the "recipes" used by wildlife managers to formulate the annual hunt recommendations (season structures, season lengths, season dates, permits allocated, etc.) and results in the hunts in which sportsmen, women and children participate.

However, wildlife biologists note that while wildlife is held in the public's trust, and hunting opportunity is important, using science-based principles in shaping

the guideline process remains paramount to assure healthy, sustainable, and diverse wildlife populations in perpetuity.

After all the comments are received, reviewed and processed, the department will host public meetings across the state to present the proposed revisions, answer questions, and collect any further public input. A final draft will then be prepared and posted at the department's Web site prior to being presented to the Game and Fish Commission in September.



Mexican Wolf

Mexican Wolf Set For Release In Arizona: Replacement For Bluestem Pack Alpha Male

An adult male Mexican wolf, designated M1133, may soon be exploring its new territory in the Apache National Forest of east-central Arizona

est of east-central Arizona.

The Mexican Wolf Reintroduction Project's interagency field team (IFT) recently received approval from Dr. Benjamin Tuggle, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (Service) Regional Director, in coordination with the Arizona Game and Fish Department, to conduct this initial (a wolf

born and raised in captivity) release in mid-January adjacent to the Bluestem pack to replace the pack's alpha male that was illegally killed last summer.

The release is contingent upon the IFT's current survey work to determine and ensure no other male wolf has paired with the existing Bluestem alpha female, AF1042.

All initial wolf releases occur in Arizona in the primary recovery zone of the

Blue Range Wolf Recovery Area in compliance with the existing federal 10(j) rule covering the reintroduction project. The last initial release of wolves occurred in

In January 2012, during its regular monthly public meeting, the Arizona Game and Fish Commission voted unanimously to give the department director the

Survey Results Released For Desert Bighorn Sheep On Kofa NWR

Populations remain low; management agencies' concern is still high.

The recently completed survey of the desert bighorn sheep population on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Kofa National Wildlife Refuge in Southwestern Arizona resulted in a population estimate of 428 sheep (95 percent confidence interval of 376 – 492). The 2012 survey estimate is up slightly from the 2010 survey estimate of 402 sheep, and is the highest estimate since the 2007 survey.

The apparent increase in the population size is not statistically significant, however, and biologists' analysis of the past six surveys indicates no significant decline or improvement to the herd's population.

Wildlife management agencies remain concerned about the low population levels on the refuge compared to the estimated 812 animals of the 2000 survey. The U.S.



Desert Bighorn Sheep

Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and Arizona Game and Fish Department (AGFD) have jointly conducted Kofa bighorn sheep surveys since 1981.

Once a very robust population, the size of the herd on the refuge has dropped significantly since 2000. Wildlife experts attribute the decline to a variety of potential factors including drought, predation, water availability, disease and human disturbance

Due to the significance of this sheep population, the USFWS and AGFD have instituted a comprehensive management program that addresses the suspected causes of the population's decline. Predation management, water improvement and disease monitoring are some of the ongoing projects

For the past 50 years, the Kofa has been an important source of desert bighorn sheep for the restoration and maintenance of bighorn populations across Arizona and throughout the southwestern United States, including New Mexico, Colorado, and Texas.

Eagle With Broken Wing Now Soars Free At Roosevelt Lake

Arizona's only satellitetracked bald eagle was released by AZGFD specialists.

After months of rehabilitation and preparation, Arizona's only satellite-tracked bald eagle soared free yesterday when it was released at Roosevelt Lake by Arizona Game and Fish Department biologists and rehabilitation specialists from Liberty Wildlife Rehabilitation of Scottsdale.

The 4-year-old male was found at Canyon Lake with a broken wing that required medical treatment. Once the wing healed, rehabilitators at Liberty Wildlife worked with the bird to rebuild muscle strength for flying.

Hatched in 2008 from a nest site near

Hatched in 2008 from a nest site near the lower Verde River, the bald eagle was fitted with a solar-powered GPS transmitter prior to release. Biologists are excited at the rare opportunity to now track an adult bald eagle and learn more about its habits, migrations and possible breeding activities. The transmitter is lightweight and does not interfere with the bird's flight or activities.

AZGFD Temporarily Closes Raymond Wildlife Area East Of Flagstaff

Recently, the Arizona Game and Fish Department temporarily closed to all public entry the Raymond Wildlife Area, located 30 miles east of Flagstaff. The closure will be in effect until March 7

Game and Fish decided on the closure to assist wildlife managers with efforts to maintain the local bison herd on the department-owned property. The closure is necessary to protect ranching operations and property of nearby neighbors, as well as the safety of the public visiting the wildlife area.

The bison have been moving off the wildlife area because of pressure from visitors along with hunting activity. Although bison are the largest land mammal in North America, they can get nervous very easily and react by running away.

Bison have been living on the Raymond Wildlife Area since 1945 when they were transplanted from the department-owned House Rock Valley Wildlife Area. That move was necessary due to drought conditions threatening the survival of the House Rock herd. The Raymond Wildlife Area covers approximately 15,000 acres and is located 12 miles south of Interstate 40 and the Buffalo Range Road exit (225).

"Without people approaching them, the bison may stay on the wildlife area during the closure and allow our wildlife managers to work on long-term strategies for bison management," says Craig McMullen, supervisor for the Flagstaff Regional Office. "We will supplemental feed the bison to encourage them to stay on the wildlife area."

Game and Fish will be posting information about the closure at the Buffalo Range Road exit off 1-40 and all entrances to the wildlife area. Information will also be available on the department's website.

The department would like to remind everyone that when observing wildlife, remember to do so at a safe distance, and do not feed or try to approach wildlife.

On the guided cave tours, visitors view dynamic structures such as stalactites dripping down like icicles and giant stalag-mites reaching up from the ground, sometimes meeting to form a massive col-The caverns host some of the world's most diverse minerals and formations

Kartchner Caverns State Park has three hiking trails outside the cave, and in 2013, there will be ranger-led hikes on Feb. 2, March 2 and April 6 from 9 to 11 a.m. on the Foothills Loop trail.

The Foothills Loop Trail

The Foothills Loop Trail is approximately 2.5 miles, rated moderate to difficult. This is a hiking trail, with no bicycles or motorized vehicles permitted. The trail climbs the limestone hill north of the cave and descends into the wash that follows the fault between the Whetstone Block and the San Pedro Block

A short spur trail leads visitors to the scenic Mountain Viewpoint and is at the upper portion of the Foothills Loop Trail. Visitors should meet at the Discovery Center and bring their own water, hat and sun protection. Visitors may bring a camera and/or binoculars, but it is not necessary. No reservations are necessary. Please call (520) 586-4118 for more information. Dogs are welcome on a 6-foot or shorter

Other hiking trails include the Guindani and the Hummingbird Garden Walk. The Guindani is located on the east flank of the Whetstone Mountains in the Coronado National Forest, is 4.2 miles in length (first mile is an easy walk, next 2/3 of trail is moderate difficulty, and the last leg is strenuous).

This is a shared-use, non-motorized trail that is well marked with directional signs. The Hummingbird Garden Walk is located on the southwest side of the Discovery Center. The walk is lined with a variety of local vegetation.

Two Guided Tours Inside Cave

There are two guided tours inside the cave at Kartchner Caverns. The Rotunda/Throne Room Tour is half of a mile in length and takes approximately an hour and a half to complete, 50 minutes of which is underground. On this tour, visitors will discover the role that water plays



in creating the caverns

You will see the discoverers' original trail, 45,000-year-old bat guano, delicate formations and "Kubla Khan," the largest column formation in Arizona. The Big Room Tour is available from mid-October to mid-April. It is half of a mile long and takes an hour and 45 minutes to complete, one hour of which is underground.

The Big Room's unique formations include: flowstone consisting of calcium car-

Oracle State Park Center for Environmental Education will re-open to the public on Saturdays and Sundays beginning Feb. 2, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Spring activ ities will include the popular guided bird walks and hikes, tours of the historic Kannally ranch house, an astronomy night, nature-based workshops and Earth Day programs.

Tours of the historic Kannally Ranch House will also resume weekly on Saturdays and Sunday starting Feb. 2 at 10 a.m. and offered again at 2 p.m. House tours are free with park admission where visitors will learn the stories behind its handcarved corbels, stenciled walls, handformed fireplace, French casement windows and cozy ranch kitchen.

The Kannally Ranch House
The Kannally Ranch House is a fourlevel pueblo-revival adobe home with Moorish and Mediterranean influences. It was built by the Kannally ranching family and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The displays include family photos, furnishings and several paint-ings by "self-taught" cowboy artist Lee Kannally. Picnicking on the patios is welcomed.

Environmental education programs for school children, first through sixth grades, are being scheduled by reservation on weekdays. Thousands of students have learned important environmental princi-

Red Rock State Park is the perfect place to experience the red rocks of Sedona, several hiking trails, bird-watching and daily special events that feature the opportunity to learn about local geology, archaeology, botany, history and wildlife.

The diverse habitat, abundant with plants and wildlife, creates the perfect environment for the Park's mission of providing environmental education programs.

Wednesday and Saturday mornings at 9 a.m. in January, visitors will find bird enthusiasts joining a naturalist for a "Guided Bird Walk" directed at beginning and advanced birders. to 2 hours and will introduce them to the riparian ecosystem of Oak Creek and other aspects of the park. Plants, wildlife, geology, history and archaeology are some of the subjects that may be discussed.

Daily at 2 p.m., the park hosts either a guest speaker or a ranger/naturalist led activity of approximately 45-minutes. Programs may include a nature-hike, a special presentation or an educational/nature video. This program may be an indoor or outdoor activity.

Also, On Your Own

Visitors may also explore on their own. The family oriented trail system is well marked for both safety and pleasure. Five miles of trails consist of interconnecting loops, leading to red rock vistas or along the lush greenery of Oak Creek.

The three major loops are connected along the riparian corridor by the Kisva Trail, which also leads to the short loop of the Yavapai Ridge Trail. The Javelina Trail takes you into the pinon/juniper woodlands and back to the other loops. Detailed information is available at the Visitor Center. Bikes and horses are allowed on designated routes.

A Junior Ranger program is available for children between the ages of six and 12. Junior Rangers pledge their part in helping preserve the beauty of the park for everyone! Junior Ranger booklets, available at the Visitor Center, have activities to complete and, once approved by a Ranger, the newest Junior Ranger at Red Rock State Park is sworn in after taking the pledge and receiving a Junior Ranger button.

The Park Visitor Center features many displays about the area's geology, archaeol-

ogy, flora and fauna, including an interactive relief map of Sedona and computer programs about various park features. The popular video, "The Natural Wonders of Sedona," is shown several times daily in the Park Theatre. Aerial explorations reveal ancient Indian ruins and dramatic landscapes, colorful desert wildflowers and local wildlife.

For more information about Red Rock State Park call (928) 282-6907. Red Rock State Park is located at 4050 Lower Red Rock Loop Road in Sedona, AZ. Park hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and the Visitor Center is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Entrance fee is \$10 per vehicle, up to four adults. bonate, gypsum and other mineral matter accumulated on the floors and walls of the cave, turnip shields that look like turnips hanging from the ceiling, large fried egg stalagmite and brushite moonmilk. Note: Big Room Tours are not available for children younger than 7 years of age.

Feels Warm And Steamy

The cave has an average temperature of 72° Fahrenheit (22° Celsius) and 99% humidity year-round, so it will feel very warm and steamy. Most areas are dimly lit and some passages may pass through narrow or enclosed areas. This may be difficult for persons with mobility, respiratory or claustrophobia issues.

The Discovery Center facility contains exhibits on cave formations, cave life, hydrology and history. In the Tenen-Tufts

Theater, a video presentation (15 minutes long) plays twice an hour. The program highlights the discovery aspect of the cave.

The Gift Shop offers a wide array of cave related and southwestern themed souvenirs, gifts and practical items to meet the needs of travelers. The Bat Cave Cafe is open daily from 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. for dining while at the Park.

Kartchner Caverns State Park also offers a large, modern campground adjacent to the Whetstone Mountains with views of the entire San Pedro Valley. Electric camping sites with water are available at a fee of \$25. All sites are developed as electric hook-up sites. NO sites have been developed or designated for basic "dry camping."

Reservations, More Info

Non-electrical and tent campers are welcome to use these sites but the full fee will be required. A paid camping permit entitles the holder to use of the shower/restroom, water, electrical and dump station facilities. Reservations for camping can be made at AZStateParks.com or by calling

(520) 586-2283.

Reservations for cave tours can be made 24-hours a day at AZStateParks.com or by calling (520) 586-2283 between 8am and 5pm (Mountain Standard Time) seven days per week. Reservations are highly recommended for all tours. You will need to pick up your tickets at the park on the day of your tour; tour tickets are not mailed out. Bring your reservation receipt with you to the park.

Cave Tour tickets must be picked up at least 1 hour prior to your scheduled tour time. Late arrival may result in the forfeiture of your reserved tour time. Kartchner Caverns State Park is located on Highway 90, nine miles south of I-10 near Benson, Arizona.

ples in these ranger/volunteer-led programs over the last two decades.

Oracle State Park has trails that offer varying degrees of difficulty including a four-mile section of the Arizona Trail that transects the park. Bring your camera, binoculars, notebook, sketchbook, birdbook and leash for your pet.

Oracle Community Nearby

Oracle State Park is located northeast of Tucson in the northern foothills of the Catalina Mountains and features quiet picnic spots, miles of hiking trails, stunning views of the mountains, access to the Arizona Trail plus other oak-woodland trails. Restaurants and attractions in the quaint community of Oracle are nearby.

Elevations in the 4,000-acre wildlife

refuge range from 3,500 to 4,500 feet. The park features a diversity of animals, plant species and rock formations. There are also oak tree-shaded washes, mesquite scrub habitats and riparian woodlands with manzanita and beargrass.

Rewarding Rehabilitation

"It is very rewarding to take a bald eagle that may not have otherwise survived and rehabilitate it to the point where it can be released back into the population, especially a bird that was hatched in the state and will hopefully contribute to the population in the future," says Kenneth Ja-cobson, head of the Arizona Game and Fish Department Bald Eagle Management Program.

The state had 54 breeding pairs of bald eagles this year. The bald eagle population in Arizona has grown nearly 600



percent since it was originally listed on the federal Endangered Species list in 1978, thanks in part to management efforts supported by the Heritage Fund. The Heritage Fund is a voter-passed initiative that was started in 1990 to further wildlife conservation efforts in the state, including protecting endangered species, through Arizona Lottery ticket sales.

Protective Closures In Spring

Courtship and nest building begin in October and November, and the bald eagles lay eggs from December to March. During the spring, many areas are closed to protect breeding bald eagles around the

The Arizona Game and Fish Department manages the bald eagle as part of the Southwestern Bald Eagle Management Committee (SWBEMC), a broad coalition of 23 government agencies, private organizations and Native American tribes.



authority to approve a wolf release, in coordination with the Service, in cases where an animal is lost from the population due to an unlawful act.

When a wolf is lost by any other cause of mortality, the commission, not the director, must approve the release.

The IFT closely manages all initially released wolves to reduce the potential of nuisance-related behaviors and livestock depredations once they are free-ranging in the wild. Past experience has shown that initially released wolves sometimes require intensive management to assist them in learning to avoid situations that may lead to conflict with human activity or with livestock that also utilize the Apache-Sitgreaves National Forests.






