In The '30s

WWII on the horizon and more than 300,000 boats operating in U.S. waters, Congress passed legislation on June 23, 1939 forming the Coast Guard Reserve — a civilian organization with the primary purpose of providing boats and support to the Coast Guard during times of need.

Update your boating safety knowledge

Always wear a life jacket

TYPE I: Offshore Life Jackets
These vests are geared for rough or remote waters where rescue may take awhile. They provide the most buoyancy, are excellent for flotation, and will turn most unconscious persons face up in the water.

TYPE II: Near-Shore Vests

TrPE II: Near-Shore Vests
These vests are good for calm
waters when quick rescue is
likely. A Type II may not turn
some unconscious wearers face
up in the water.



TYPE III: Flotation Aids

These vests or full-sleeved jackets are good for calm waters when quick rescue is likely. They are not for rough waters since they will not turn most unconscious persons face up.



TYPE IV: Throwable Devices

These cushions and ring buoys are designed to be thrown to someone in trouble. Since a Type IV is not designed to be worn, it is neither for rough waters nor for persons who are unable to hold onto it.

TYPE V: Special-Use Devices

These vests, deck suits, hybrid PFDs, and others are designed for specific activities such as windsurfing kayaking or windsurfing, kayaking, or water-skiing. To be acceptable, Type V PFDs must be used in accordance with their label.



• Extinguishers should be placed in an accessible area-not near the engine or in a compartment, but where they can be reached immediately. Be sure you know how to use them, and inspect extinguishers regularly to ensure they are in working condition and fully charged

Enjoy Your Boating Summer Safely With Free Safety Check

With Memorial Day and Fourth of July now behind us, the summer boating season is definitely underway. Now is the time to get a Vessel Safety Check (VSC)!

A VSC is a complimentary safety in-

spection of a recreational boat conducted by a trained and certified U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary or U.S. Power Squadron Vessel Examiner.

A VSC helps to ensure your vessel meets current Federal safety standards. Items reviewed during the VSC include number, type, and condition of life jackets and fire extinguishers, emergency distress signals, navigation lights, ventilation, and registration and numbering.

While not mandatory a marine VHF-FM radio, dewatering device(s), anchor, and a first aid kit are also recommended.

Boats passing safety checks are awarded a VSC decal that indicates your boat was in full compliance with all Federal and State boating safety regulations at the time of inspection. A successful VSC may also qualify you for a discount from your boat insurance company



If your vessel does not meet the requirements, your Vessel Examiner will provide you with information on what corrective action needs to be taken to bring your boat into compliance to receive



Citations Issued For Quagga-Contaminated Boats

Invasive mussels discovered at Lake Powell decontamination station.

Arizona Game and Fish officers have recently issued citations to two individuals who brought quagga mussel contaminated boats to Lake Powell, and citations are pending in a third case.

"Fortunately, in these instances the quagga mussels on the boats were discovered at Lake Powell's decontamination station prior to launching," said Tom McMahon, the invasive species coordinator for the Game and Fish Department.

One of the vessels had mussels on its anchor, which many people forget to clean, and the boat owner neglected to remove the plug before leaving Lake Pleasant, which is another violation.

Often Attached To Anchor

About a quarter of the boats showing up at Lake Powell with quagga mussels have been in violation due to mussels being attached to the anchor," McMahon

McMahon added that these two incidents demonstrate why boaters coming from lakes such as Pleasant, Mead, Mohave, and Havasu that are infested with quagga mussels need to be conscientious about taking legally required proper precautions so they don't move these invasive mollusks to an unaffected water, such as

Powell or Bartlett Lake.

"It's essential that boaters clean, drain and dry their boats each and every time they go boating anywhere, any time. Unfortunately, there are lots of aquatic inva-sive species that might hitchhike to another water on your boat or trailer," McMahon said.

However, he added, those boating in waters listed as having aquatic invasive species, such as quagga and zebra mussels, by law must follow the prescribed decontamination procedures.

'Quite simply, it is against the law in Arizona to transport quagga or zebra mus-sels and those found doing so can and probably will be cited," McMahon pointed

For the most part, those legally required procedures are simple and straightforward.

Three Steps To Clear

Before leaving the vicinity of an aquatic invasive species listed water, such as Pleasant, Mead, Mohave or Havasu, the law requires that you — **Step 1:** Clean and remove any clinging

material such as plants, animals and mud

from anchor, boat, motor and trailer.

Step 2: Pull your plug and drain the water from the bilge, livewell and any other compartments that could hold water. Also be sure to drain the water from the engine and engine cooling system.

Step 3: Ensure your watercraft and equipment are allowed to dry completely and out of the water for a minimum of

"We've been asking boaters to clean, drain, and dry their boats for years. It's just a good practice to not only protect our precious water resources, but also to protect your own boating investment. Most boaters have been pretty understanding and cooperative," McMahon said.

Now when they boat at waters listed as having aquatic invasive species, such as Mead, Mohave, Havasu, and Pleasant, this is required by law. As McMahon tells everyone he contacts to remember, "Don't Move a Mussel — Now it's the Law.



Editor's Note: Recently our publisher Jim Allen and editor Carol Allen visited this remarkable animal haven in western New Mexico. We spent nearly two hours with the wonderful, committed volunteers there plus approximately 100 delightful dogs and 150 beautiful and affectionate cats — all friendly, happy fur-kids who, if it were not for Fur and Feathers, might not have a home, or, sadly, even a life. Please read this incredible story of a caring rescue home and see if there is a way you can help our friends.

Our Mission

Fur and Feather Animal Assistance is located in a very rural county in western New Mexico. This county, the largest in the state, has no animal control, so unwanted pets are often abandoned to fend for themselves in the wild.

In the fall of 2003, we took it upon ourselves to do something to help these homeless pets. Animals are housed at our own homes, kennels, and foster homes. Early in the spring of 2006, we became incorpo-

rated as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization.

We concentrate on rescuing lost and abandoned animals and helping out when people die and leave their pets behind. We also neuter every dog and cat that passes through our hands. We have been able to spay, neuter, and place over 1,200 pets.

About Fur And Feather

We are in a very rural county in western



New Mexico that has no animal control at all until we started trying to make a difference here in the fall of 2003. Early in the spring of 2006 we became incorporated as a non-profit facility. We concentrate on rescuing lost and abandoned animals and helping out when people die or become incapable of caring for their pets.

We are proud of our senior program, helping elderly people with unforeseen expenses and care.



FISHING IN ARIZONA AND BEYOND

Catching Best Early And Late In The Day

Water temperature has now reached the high point for the year. Early morning temp is 80 and by afternoon it reaches 83 or higher. From now on, the temperature will remain the same but the band of warm water will deepen.

These warm temperatures are higher than any of the fish in Lake Powell prefer. It makes sense, then, that fishing has slowed down all over Lake Powell.

Takes A Bit More Patience

Striped bass can still be caught but it takes a bit more patience or some late night work. Stripers are most active at dusk and dawn. There will be an occasional boil in the northern lake.

In the south there is scattered surface action from yearling stripers feeding in groups of two to five fish. They hit the surface from dawn to 7 a.m. (MST) but splashes are widely spaced.

If close enough to cast to a rising fish,

the chances of catching it are high. It is much more efficient to troll the general area where striper splashes are seen. Use a shallow-running pointer, LV 100 or Xrap to steadily catch stripers while trolling near surface-feeding stripers.

We tried trolling deeper under the surface action without success. We are still clueless as to the general location of adult stripers in the southern lake. It is now too warm for them to feed on the surface for extended periods. We don't see many adult striper schools when graphing deeper

Success After Dark

Conditions seem ideal for bait fishing now, but the only successful bait fishing reports come after dark. This is a great time to break out the green fishing lights and use bait in areas that have produced well in the past. Some fish are taken under the lights near the marinas or off houseboats in the buoy fields. Adult fish are deep and should be hungry. Down-rigger trolling is another good option to take big-

Smallmouth bass are by far the best choice for targeting catchable fish. The brush zone from shore to 25 feet deep is where the action is. Large and smallmouth bass, walleye, stripers and sunfish are in brush along with shad and small sunfish. Cast plastic grubs to rocky dropoffs in the brush zone to catch multiple bass. Surface lures work very well morning and evening. Casting crankbaits in the spaces between the trees also works well.

Use your favorite fishing technique to catch bass early and late.

Time For Smelly Stuff

Catfishing success peaks in warm water of summer. It's time to use some smelly old bait along the shoreline at dusk and into the night to catch some dandy whiskered fish. Chicken liver, shrimp, night crawlers, hot dog rounds and anchovies are excellent catfish bait.

My hopes are high that after this fishing lull that the anticipated summer boil season will break loose. Usually all that is needed is for me to write one dismal fishing report and stripers start to boil everywhere. This is that dismal report. Now we are impatiently waiting for the bigger stripers to find shad and start boil-

Good Summer Fishing Reported Throughout Arizona

With a waning moon and monsoongenerated rain showers possible on most days, you've got some nice choices for summer fishing, but on the extremely hot days, expect fish to go deep and be less ac-

As the monsoon thunder bumpers start to build and the barometric pressure drops, insects will start flying closer to the water's surface and predatory fish will typically become more aggressive at the top of the water column.



In The High Country

In the high country especially, the insectivorous trout will feed more aggressively. This is a good time to use reaction baits, such as in-line spinners. Try Mepps, Roost-ertails or Blue Fox. KastMasters, Crickhoppers and Super Dupers can also work well

Flies can work especially well. Even if you are spin fishing, you can use flies such was wooly buggers. I like to use a tapered fly line as a leader from a casting bubble, but 2-pound fishing line or leader can work

Typically, the deeper lakes such as Big, Willow Springs and Bear Canyon lakes are



the better producers. Since we stock Woods Canyon weekly, it is also a contender for some nice stockers. Ashurst and Kinnikinick near Flagstaff are typically reliable producers even in the heat of summer.

Best Bait Bets

When storms are not building then you can expect trout to be holding deep and feeding less aggressively. At those times, the best fishing will be at first and last light. Try using night crawlers, Power Bait or corn fished on the bottom using slip sinkers, small hooks and light line. Quite often, trolling out in deeper water is the key to finding a better bite. Try cowbells, spinners, Crickhoppers, Z-Rays or Super Dupers.

By the way, it's sad that Z-Ray has gone out of business — don't lose the ones you

I am still getting reports of some good northern pike fishing in Upper Lake Mary near Flagstaff and one angler caught a very nice channel catfish there. Haven't heard much out of Long Lake recently, but it has some huge pike as well.

At Lees Ferry

A little farther afield, my friend Terry Gunn at Lees Ferry Anglers says the ci-

URBAN FISHING REPORT This Is A Time To Change Tactics

With catfish stockings at all Phoenix and Tucson urban waters on hold over the summer months, fishing becomes more challenging, requiring anglers to be adaptable, patient and persistent. The dumb stockers are pretty much gone now, but plenty of wily catfish still lurk in the depths of the lakes, especially lakes of five or more acres.

Catfishing is fair for anglers using worms, stink baits, or shrimp fished on the bottom. Catfish can be caught throughout the day, but are most active when the sun goes down. Most catfish are from 13-16 inches, but some lunkers over 3 pounds are being hauled out of the lakes.

The many catfish, bass and bluegill remaining in the lakes have been around for awhile and have seen a lot of the same baits, presented in the same way. Successful summer anglers have learned to change it up and experiment with new baits, new bait combinations and new presentations.

Try combining a piece of shrimp with a worm, or try using a "worm blower" to



inflate the worm and elevate it above the bottom. Do a Web search for "secret catfish baits" and discover an amazing selection of concoctions sure to increase your fishing success.

This is the time to make some rigging changes and try out some of the fluorocarbon fishing lines in lighter test weights to make your line practically invisible. Or, try fishing without weights and let your bait flutter to the bottom.

For more bites, fish with 4- to 6-pound test line and keep your weights to a minimum. Keep trying new things, keep at it, and have fun learning more about fishing

Bluegill fishing is fair for anglers using worms and mealworms fished under a small bobber set at 4- to 6-foot depths. For more bluegill success, use 2-pound line, size 12 hooks, and just enough bait to cover the hook.

Action for largemouth bass is fair, with the best baits finesse plastics fished in the early morning hours.

At Green Valley lakes (Payson), fishing is best for bass, bluegill and crappie. Fishing is poor for trout and catfish. Anglers using worms and mealworms under a small slip bobber are enjoying plenty of action, especially when fishing the outside edge of the weed-lines. Fishing with lures is difficult due to the presence of weeds around the lake edge.

Last Stocking

Phoenix and Tucson Urban Fishing Program waters were last stocked on June 13 with catfish (Note: this was the final spring stocking before the summer break).

Green Valley lakes in Payson were last stocked on May 11 with trout.

Next Stocking

Phoenix and Tucson Urban Fishing Program waters will not be stocked again until fall catfish deliveries resume the week of Sept. 17-22. Green Valley lakes in Pavson will not be stocked again until October, when trout deliveries resume.



cadas are singing up a storm right now and the cicada bite should start any time soon (maybe it already has). With any luck, I'll get up there for the bite this year, I've had bad timing now for three years.

By the way, check out this month's edition of *Arizona Highways* magazine, they used one of my pictures of fly fishing at Lees Ferry. It was a small picture, but a big honor.

Bighorn Bonus

Sounds like the striper fishing at Lake Powell has slowed, but you can still find decent action for smallmouth bass, largemouth bass, walleye and catfish.

An awesome fishing adventure this time of year is Willow Beach where you can catch trout in the desert, along with huge stripers.

But, what makes this a true adventure is the desert bighorn sheep — this is the rutting season. You might see or hear bighorn rams butting heads. It's one of the best wildlife shows in North America.

You might also see or hear bighorns at Canyon Lake or Apache Lake along the Apache Trail. Canyon Lake is land of the largemouth lunkers, but don't expect high catch rates. This lake can be tough to fish. I've probably gotten skunked at Canyon more than any other Arizona lake.

But, seeing some bighorns scrambling up the cliffs or watching peregrine falcons stooping on ducks certainly makes it a wonderful experience anyway. Keep the binoculars handy.

Take A Camera Too

Apache Lake also has a healthy herd of bighorns. Plus Apache is one of my favorite summer fisheries. The past few years, it has really become a tremendous largemouth bass fishery. There are also plentiful yellow bass, which are a lot of fun to catch on light tackle.

Apache also has a decent population of walleye. Be sure to take a camera — this is one of our most photogenic lakes, which is saying something in a state full of photogenic waters.

However, if you are afraid of heights or get anxious on narrow winding dirt roads down treacherous cliff faces, traveling to Apache Lake across Fish Creek Hill is probably not for you. For some of us, that is part of the Apache Trail allure.

Night Fishing Soon Viable

Night fishing under submersible lights will become more viable with each passing night. The new moon is July 18. Some anglers have been loading up on striped bass even though the moon phases weren't agreeable, especially at Pleasant, Mead and Powell. Not hearing much on the crappie angling right now, but Alamo, Roosevelt and Bartlett should all be decent if you can find the suspended schools.

Write On Target

Chronic Wasting Disease Not Found In Arizona Deer Or Elk

Arizona Game and Fish Department has completed testing of deer and elk for Chronic Wasting Disease for the 2011 hunting season.

Chronic Wasting Disease attacks the brain of deer, elk, and moose, causing weight loss, abnormal behavior and death. The department tested 1,185 deer and elk during the 2011 hunting season and did not detect CWD.

However, the continued vigilance of hunters is essential for the department's effective monitoring of CWD in deer and elk. Testing will resume this fall.

Game and Fish began testing for CWD in Arizona in 1998. CWD has been found in Utah, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas, but no cases have been detected yet in Arizona. There is no evidence that CWD poses a risk to humans, according to the U.S. Center for Disease Control.

Areas Of Highest Concern

The areas of highest concern include Game Management Unit 12B, which borders Utah, and GMUs 1 and 27, which



border New Mexico. However, all hunters are invited to participate in the monitoring by bringing the heads of deer or elk recently harvested statewide to any Game and Fish Department office between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday and at additional locations around the state.

Information regarding sample collection sites will be available after Aug.15. There is no charge for testing and notifi-cation of results. Hunters will be asked to provide details about the county and game management unit in which the animal was harvested, the hunt and permit number, hunting license, and the hunter's address and phone contact information.

Test results will be available in six to

eight weeks online at www.azgfd.gov/ cwd, click "Chronic Wasting Disease Test Results" link on the right side of the page.

Participation of hunters, taxidermists and meat processors is crucial for effective CWD surveillance program," said Carrington Knox. "Collection of samples from elk and deer hunters is an essential element for successful CWD monitoring efforts.

CWD is a neurodegenerative wildlife disease that is fatal to cervids, including deer, elk and moose. Symptoms of CWD include emaciation or weight loss, excessive salivation, increased drinking and uri-

Animals with CWD may also stumble, tremble, have trouble walking, or appear

Precautions For Keeping

CWD Out Of Arizona
CWD has been reported in several neighboring states, including Utah, Colorado and New Mexico. To prevent CWD from entering Arizona, when hunting deer and elk in other states it important to take these precautions before returning to Arizona with deer or elk harvests:

- · Do not cut into the spinal cord or remove the head.
- Do not quarter (or other method) the carcass with any of the spinal column or head attached.
- Do not bring the brain, intact skull or spinal cord into Arizona.
- Bone out the harvested deer or elk meat and package it, either commercially or privately before entering Arizona.

There are no restrictions on returning to Arizona with out-of-state harvests of animal hides and skull plates cleaned of all tissue and washed in bleach. Heads from a taxidermist, sawed-off antlers and ivory teeth may also be brought into Arizona from out-of-state hunts.

Since 2002, the department has also had rules in place restricting the movement of captive deer and elk into or within Arizona, as well as subjecting the animals to marking and reporting requirements.



BLM Plan Allows For Recreational Target Shooting

The Arizona Game and Fish Department supports the Bureau of Land Management's proposed alternative (Alternative E) regarding 'Recreational Target Shooting Areas' in the BLM's proposed Lower Sonoran and Sonoran Desert National Monument Resource Management Plan and final Environmental Impact Statement. View the Department's letter of support to the BLM.

The plan encompasses the Sonoran Desert National Monument and other nearby lands managed by the BLM's Lower Sonoran Field Office — a total of nearly 1.4 million acres of public lands located southwest of Phoenix in parts of Maricopa, Pinal, Pima, Gila and Yuma

Multi-Use Mission

Game and Fish officials pointed out that the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (FLPMA) establishes a multiple-use mission for public lands under the jurisdiction of Bureau of Land Management.

"Recreational target shooting is a traditional recreational use of BLM lands, where appropriate, and we are encouraged that the Bureau has endorsed its multipleuse mission by embracing dispersed recreational shooting in its Resource Management Plan," said Josh Avey, habi-tat program chief for Game and Fish.

Recreational shooting is recognized as a legitimate and important recreational resource valued by the public. Dispersed recreational shooting on BLM public lands provides an important opportunity, especially for urban youth, to get outside and develop a personal connection with the

It serves as an informal gateway to formal shooting sports and hunting. Game and Fish recognizes hunters as not only supporters of the multiple-use mission, but

cessible with a potential for ecotourism. would help the BLM feed and care for excess wild horses that have been removed from Western public rangelands. Each proposed ecosanctuary must be able to support at least 100 wild horses.

To Submit An Application

The official notice of solicitation can be found at www.grants.gov. To submit an application, an applicant must register on www.grants.gov and must first obtain a Data Universal Number System (DUNS) number. This can be obtained by going to http://fedgov.dnb.com/webform/index.jsp.

After receiving a DUNS number, the applicant may proceed to the Central Contractor Registration (CCR) page and reg-The CCR registration Website is located at https://www.bpn.gov/ccr/default.aspx. Completing this registration process can take up to two weeks, so applicants should work on their proposals while they are waiting for their registration

Many motorists have wondered what the new 8-foot fences are along Interstate 17 near Munds Park. These "exclusion fences" are designed to keep elk off the highway as part of a larger statewide effort to make highways safer for motorists and wildlife

This transportation enhancement project is a cooperative effort between the Arizona Game and Fish Department and Arizona Department of Transportation.

Elk are a common sight along I-17. Research indicates that I-17 has the highest rate of elk-vehicle collisions in the state. An elk can weigh more than 800 pounds, and a collision with an animal that size can have serious consequences.

Elk Crossings

In an effort to minimize vehicle-wildlife collisions, Game and Fish captured elk and fitted them with radio transmitter collars in order to follow their daily movements. This information tells biologists where the elk prefer to cross the highway and how often.

Game and Fish worked with ADOT to design an elk-exclusionary fencing project and to pursue funding opportunities. The

exclusionary fencing must be at least 8 feet high to keep elk from jumping over it and entering the roadway

If the elk enter the fenced areas adjacent to the interstate, escape ramps (large mounds of dirt) will allow them to safely leave the area and avoid being trapped.

As research has been conducted over the years, biologists have learned that wildlife will only utilize certain overpass and underpass designs. ADOT uses this information to construct specific structures and install fencing to funnel animals over or under the highways, as was the case on

'As we identify portions of the highways in Arizona that are active with wildlife, we can work closely with ADOT and create wildlife-friendly roadways which, in turn, will decrease the number of vehicle collisions, especially those involving elk," says Jeff Gagnon, research biologist for Game and Fish.

"We (Game and Fish and ADOT) have already completed several projects across the state and will continue this partnership to make highways safer for motorists.

One major success story in Arizona is the State Route 260 project east of Payson. Fencing was installed to keep elk off the road and force them to safer crossing locations. Results from this project showed an 85 percent reduction in vehicle-elk collisions

Elk and other wildlife are moving under bridges that are similar to those structures along I-17 near Munds Park.

Game and Fish and ADOT are also addressing wildlife and roadway issues in

Once captive, desert fortoises can never be released into the wild," Jones em-phasized. "Not only is it illegal; it can jeopardize wild populations through the introduction of disease, or displace wild tortoises.'

Desert tortoises can live as long as 50 to 100 years. They grow to be about 15 pounds and hibernate in the winter months. They eat plant material, including grasses and wildflowers.

The Tortoise Adoption Program is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year.

Desert Tortoises Truly In Need Of Adoption

Holding facilities are at capacity, hundreds of tortoises need good homes.

A unique, fascinating, low-maintenance and educational pet can be had through the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Tortoise Adoption Program, conducted in partnership with the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum and the Phoenix Herpetological Society.

If you have a yard, but little time for a dog, this well-mannered critter might be just the answer to having a household companion.

Seeking Adoptive 'Parents'

Desert tortoises are protected in Arizona and cannot be legally collected from the wild, but breeding of captive tortoises and the return of tortoises by owners who can no longer care for them has led to a surplus of these unique animals at authorized adoption facilities. The facilities are at capacity and are seeking people willing to adopt and care for a tortoise.

"The Game and Fish Department receives hundreds of unwanted adult and captive-born tortoises each year, which takes away resources for conservation efforts of wild tortoises," says Cristina

Arizona State Parks, Apache County Partner To Re-open Lyman Lake

"With Arizona's valleys heating up as we go into the summer, it's time to head for your favorite high country State Park," says Bryan Martyn, Arizona's State Parks Director.

"Lyman Lake State Park in northeastern Arizona is a stunning 1,500-acre lake at an elevation of 6,000 feet with no size restrictions on boats, making it a popular water-skiing destination. Apache County has been our financial partner for three years and the park re-opened in mid-June with a ribbon cutting and mixer for friends.

"We are pleased to announce that the park now can stay open until Sept. 17, which is fantastic news.

"With no General Fund allocation, we continue to struggle to maintain the operations and maintenance in the parks and still have eight parks operating with partners. We've gone from 165 full-time park rangers in 2009 to just 86 today and with long-term rangers' retiring, that is a dangerous decline.

14,300 Summer Visitors In 2011

To fill the positions, we have to hire more part-time rangers to keep the parks

operating. The good news is there were 14,300 visitors last summer at Lyman and campground bookings are going well, so we are predicting another busy summer," he continued.

According to Apache County Manager, Delwin Wengert, "With the support of Apache County's District III Supervisor, R. John Lee, we have partnered with private companies such as Blue Hills Envi-



ronmental Association, Salt River Project, Tucson Electric Power, Preferred Sands Processing and American West Potash so Lyman Lake State Park can stay open all summer long.

"The park serves residents to enjoy the swimming and fishing and to draw visitors from around the southwest to the area."



Supervisor John Lee explained the fund-raising effort by saying, "We have raised \$20,000, which will add to the State Parks gate fees to keep the park open this summer. Our private company partners want to be sure the park has the adequate staff and high-quality operations to keep people coming back to the park each summer.

In addition, the County has been helping staff by providing inmates to do maintenance projects," said Lee.

Camping Sites, Cabins, Yurts

Summer days at Lyman Lake State Park are perfect for fishing, water-skiing, camping and hiking. There are many other fishing lakes in the area as well. The park features 61 camping sites with shade ramadas, picnic tables and grills.

There are also four air-conditioned camping cabins (\$55) and four (16-feet round) yurts (\$40) that book quickly on weekends throughout the summer, but are usually available on weekdays. Campsites range from \$20 to \$30 a night.

Be sure to book your sites; however, usually there are primitive camping sites along the lake and the park always has room somewhere during weekends in the summer. Campers also have access to modern restrooms and hot showers.

To book a reservation for sites, go to the AZStateParks.com Web site or call (520) 586-2283. The Lyman Lake State Park local office number is (928) 337-3393; however, reservations should be made through the Web site. The park is located 11 miles south of St. Johns, Ariz., on US 191.

motorists and portable message signs are occasionally used, motorists should be aware that this stretch of roadway runs through a wildlife travel corridor.

This is a "road" used by deer and elk to move back and forth during their seasonal migration from the foothills of Mount Elden to Turkey Hills and other areas east of U.S. 89.

Game and Fish and ADOT remind motorists that when travelling on roadways in Arizona, be aware of wildlife and maintain safe speeds, especially when driving between sundown and sunrise.

Information About Wildlife-Friendly Projects

The joint project was funded by the Federal Highway Administration through the Transportation Enhancement Program. States like Arizona are required to allocate 10 percent of their federal transportation funding for enhancement projects, which are limited to specific types of projects. Fences designed to reduce vehicle-wildlife collisions are among the eligible projects.

Gateway To Hunting

Further, the importance of hunting, and of recreational shooting as a gateway to hunting, is recognized in the 2006 Executive Order 13443, "Facilitation of Hunting Heritage and Wildlife Conservation."

That executive order called for the development of a "Recreational Hunting and Wildlife Resource Conservation Plan," with an implementation recommendation to increase structured hunting programs and recreational shooting opportunities as a means of achieving a net increase in federal land hunting.

"The department understands and re-

spects BLM's mandate to avoid and minimize impacts to monument objects and protect the public's safety, as well as the need to proactively manage recreational activities on the monument," said Avey.

We look forward to continuing our collaborative partnership with BLM in planning and implementation efforts for responsible recreational shooting as described in the plan."
