As Summer Sizzles In The Southwest

Tackle The Heat At A 'Cool' Fishing Hole

Although a trip to Washington state may not be in your plans this summer (as it was for Misti Gold in the cover photo), there are many cool fishing holes here in Arizona. When the Valley of the Sun motivates you to go north, anglers often head to these lakes for some good fishing. (We thank Leisure Arizona and Rory Aikens of the Arizona Game & Fish Department for the following "cool" suggestions.)



Ashurst Lake

Ashurst Lake

What can one find at Ashurst Lake? Gorgeous scenery. Cool, refreshing mountain country air. Those are two excellent reasons to visit Ashurst Lake, which is about 23 miles southeast of Flagstaff.

Fishing for stocked rainbow and brook trout, canoeing, windsurfing, camping, hiking, mountain biking and picture perfect views of San Francisco Peaks, all these are part of the Ashurst experience.

This medium-size Northern Arizona lake has a reputation of holding water even during long drought spells. Anglers and others can enjoy the campground nearby, pitch their tents, or park their campers and throw out the lawn chairs. They can choose to just kick back and enjoy relaxing in the great outdoors or cast a line and try to catch a lunker.

Flagstaff

Fishing in the Flagstaff area is mainly within the Mormon Lake Ranger District of the Coconino National Forest. There are four primary lakes in the area, all accessible at the Lake Mary Road exit from I-17 Freeway. The lakes are clustered within close proximity, the farthest only about 38 miles from Flagstaff.

With elevations above 7,000 feet, the summer temperatures are cool and refreshing, just right for fishing, camping and hiking. With views of the San Francisco Peaks in the background, these area lakes are located in beautiful scenery where herds of elk, deer and antelope graze.

Fish varieties in the Flagstaff area include northern pike, rainbow trout, brook trout, walleye, channel catfish, yellow bass and sun-

Kinnikinick

One of those small, remote Arizona lakes that are still quite easy to get to is Kinnikinick Lake, 38 miles south of Flagstaff. With the San Francisco Peaks on the horizon, anglers

can camp and fish for trout. Prairies of juniper pine surround Kinnikinick that typically abound with pronghorn antelope.

Kinnikinick is not a crowded lake so it's a good tranquil place to enjoy the outdoors, whether your purpose is fishing or just relaxing in cool country. The elevation is 7,000 feet with refreshing summer temperatures that rarely reach 90 degrees Fahrenheit.

Mormon Lake

The largest natural lake in Arizona is Mormon Lake, 29 miles southeast of Flagstaff. Often during severe droughts, the lake recedes and sometimes even completely dries up. It is fed from the rain and snow melt in the nearby mountains.

Mormon Lake is surrounded by ponderosa pine forests in a lush setting. At an elevation of about 7,000 feet, the summer temperatures


Arizona's largest boat show is upping the ante in 2013.





Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas that is very toxic even in small quanti-ties. It is produced when a carbon-based fuel, such as a gasoline or diesel, is burned. Cooking ranges, heaters, and charcoal grills produce carbon monoxide also.

Carbon Monoxide Kills!

- Carbon monoxide disperses feely through the air and will travel readily throughout a
- boat.
 Carbon monoxide discharged as engine, generator, or appliance exhaust may re-enter your boat through any opening.
 By keeping a steady flow of fresh air moving through your boat, you will eliminate much, if not all, of the hazard. The danger comes when there are pockets of stagnant air loaded with carbon monoxide that are not flushed from your boat.
 When operating any type of watercraft, be careful running downwind because exhaust gases may blow back on board.
 The best prevention for carbon monoxide poisoning is knowing that carbon monoxide exists.

 Everyone should know the symptoms and treatments of carbon monoxide poisoning. A marine-type carbon monoxide detector will sound an alarm when the gases reach an unacceptable level.

Symptoms of Carbon Monoxide Poisoning One or more of the following symptoms may signal the adverse effects of carbom monoxide accumulations

- Throbbing temples
 Inattentiveness or lack of concentration
 Inability to think coherently

- Ringing in the ears Tightness across the chest Headache, drowsiness, nausea, dizziness, fatigue, vomiting, collapse, and convulsions

Alcohol and Drugs

Arizona law probibits anyone from operating a power-driven vessel while under the influence of alcohol or any drug that causes the person to be even slightly impaired. Al-cohol and drugs cause impaired balance, blurred vission, poor coordination, impaired judgement, and slower reaction time. Alcohol contributes to about onethird of all boating accidents nationwide.

• A person is considered to be operating

under the influence (OUI) of alcohol if he or she has an alcohol concentration of 0.08% or greater as determined by a test of his or her

breath, blood, or urine. "Extreme OUI" is blood alcohol concentration

- (BAC) od 0.15% and higher. If convicted of OUI or "Extreme OUI," a person can be fined up to \$2,500 and jailed for up to six months. Subsequent convictions and 'Aggravated OUI' may carry even
- more sever penalties.

 By operating a vessel on Arizona waters, you have consented to be tested for alcohol or drugs if arrested by a law enforcement officer foralleged violations under Arizona Watercraft Statutes.

Once again, the National Safe Boating Kickoff at Lake Pleasant in mid-May was a success


We had more families than ever this time around. We had dads with their sons. There were several who had just graduated from high school and were getting ready to go on to college.

Operating Under the Influence (OUI): Don't Take A Chance

Picture Lake Havasu on a sunny day and you might think of college students with cases of beer on board, racing up and down the waterways. You might say to yourself, "It's just harmless fun." But op-erating a boat while impaired is just as dangerous — and just as illegal — as drinking while driving a car. The legal limit for blood alcohol is .08 in both cases.

The penalties are similar, too; as driving under the influence, operating a boat under the influence is a Class One misde-

Saturation Patrols And OUI

Checkpoints
To detect and remove impaired and unsafe boaters, officers from the Arizona Game and Fish Department and other agencies in Arizona and bordering states of California and Nevada conduct saturation patrols. A boating-law enforcement saturation patrol is on the water for one



reason only --- to save lives

Saturation patrols and OUI checkpoints, a similar operation, are conducted on Arizona's lakes and rivers during the busiest boating months (March through September).

If you're waved over by an officer during a saturation patrol or you enter an OUI checkpoint area while boating Arizona's waterways this summer, don't worry — if your boat operator is sober and the boat is safe, you'll quickly be on your way again.

The boat's driver will be checked to ensure he or she is not endangering others by



operating a boat while under the influence of alcohol; and your boat will be assessed for it's safety equipment to ensure it meets legal requirements

Designated Operator Safety Campaign Adds New Component

Lake Havasu boaters now have the option of hiring a 'Designated Captain.'

LAKE HAVASU CITY, Ariz. in time for the busy summer boating sea-son, the Lake Havasu Marine Association has launched a new "Designated Captain" program to complement its successful Designated Operator boating-safety campaign.

According to Jim Salscheider, president and CEO of the Lake Havasu Marine Association, "Designated Captain is



a logical and much-needed next step in our effort to minimize the number of intoxicated boat operators on-the-water, especially on busy holiday weekends.

"Our association now has compiled a list of local certified U.S. Coast Guard captains who are licensed to provide forhire boat-driving services to the general public, either using their own boat or a rental. It has become apparent, thanks to our Designated Operator awareness campaign, that an increasing number of boaters understand the seriousness involved while operating a boat under the influence of excessive alcohol or drugs.
"If boaters want to avoid that possibil-

ity entirely, they now have a means to do so by hiring a sober Coast Guard captain to do the driving for them."

Nine Boat-Rental Companies Support Campaign

Because Lake Havasu is a popular tourist destination, boat rentals are a major business. There are currently nine "preferred" boat-rental companies in Lake Havasu City who support the Designated Operator campaign.

"These boat rental companies are routinely asked by customers about the availability of hiring a professional boat driver," continued Salscheider. "Many are novice boaters who are not familiar with Lake Havasu, its rules and geogra-

phy.
"Having available licensed captains for-hire removes that deterrent from renting and significantly improves the onwater safety factor for all concerned."

The Life Of A Middle-Aged Boat, And What To Do About It

With people, middle age begins at around 40. With boats, it's about the 10year mark. And for both, it signals a time when age begins to show.

But that doesn't mean life is slowing down — only that more effort is needed to stay in shape. With decade-old boats, that means taking a hard look at things that haven't been checked out over the years. BoatUS has these nine "middle age" maintenance tips on boats:

Bilge pumps: Like a Louisiana oil field roughneck, a 10-year old bilge pump has likely led a tough life. Switches are often the first to go, so make sure yours works fine by pouring water in the bilge to activate the pump, making sure nothing interferes with the switch. Take a close look at wire connections as they often are near or in standing water at the bottom of the boat.

Gas hose: When it was new, the fuel hose did a great job of delivering gas to the engine. Over time, however, gas can permeate the hose wall causing damage. Take a rag around the hose, wipe it down and then smell the rag. If you smell gas, replace hose immediately. If you do have to re-place, always install new hose clamps, too.

Steering and control cable: Like an arthritic knee, bend the cable in your hands and listen for "crunching," a telltale sign that all is not well. Swelling and rust are also bad signs and indicate it's time to re-

Caulked fittings: The boatyard rule of thumb is that after 10 years, the bedding compound owes you nothing. Begin a schedule to periodically remove and re-bed fittings, doing a few each year so the job isn't overwhelming. This will keep the leaks out that could lead to more expensive

Prop: Eventually all props get dinged, and you may not see the damage clearly with your eye. If it's never been to a shop,





now is a good time to take it to a prop shop for reconditioning, and you'll also likely save some money on fuel with a tuned

Other drive gear: If you have an inboard, the cutlass bearing might be due for replacement, especially if there's more than just a smidgen of play in the drive shaft. It's also time to take a hard look at the stuffing box. If you've had to re-tighten the stuffing box nut often, it's time to replace the pack-

Exhaust manifolds: If you boat in salt or brackish waters and you still have the original manifolds, thank your lucky stars they haven't failed yet. Now is the time to do some proactive maintenance to replace them. "Leaking manifolds can destroy an engine," said BoatUS Seaworthy Magazine Associate Editor Chuck Fort

Seacocks/Through Hulls: If it's been vears since one has been fully opened and closed, it could be frozen, and that's useless. Make it a point to work seacocks a few times each season and while vou're there, check the hose clamps.

Standing rigging: When was the last time you had a close look at all of the fittings and mast attachments (even the ones up high)? Ten years is a long time for rigging on boats that are raced, but even those used for day sails can suffer from the cyclical loads that cause stress cracks, and saltwater can cause corrosion in swaged fittings not easily seen by the naked eye.

LAKE POWELL REPORT

It Seems There Is A Fish To Please Everyone

My weekly fishing trip was one day after a full moon and a big windstorm. I wasn't expecting much but was pleased to find cooperative smallmouth and striped

Stripers were feeding on plankton near the surface at the edge of the brush line. They seemed to be slightly deeper than last week with most hits coming where bottom depth was 25-30 feet. Every time we trolled into shallower water, pesky smallmouth would whack our Lucky Craft Bevy Shad lures. In two hours of fishing we caught 12 smallmouth, seven stripers and a walleye.

We were hoping to get a school of small stripers located by trolling and then cast to them, allowing us to catch yearling stripers until we got tired. But, it did not work that way. It turns out these stripers were a bit fussy

Until The Big One

We trolled two rods with similar lures but the lure tied to light line (6-pound test) was much more effective than the rod with 12-pound test. That worked great until we

hooked the big one.
We saw the 5-pound striper turn when it neared the boat and then run away, grinning with a Bevy shad in his mouth. We missed the big one but caught more 18inch stripers than we did last week. Looks like bigger stripers are starting to show up in the southern lake.

Fishing Lesson: When fishing is tough, use lighter line and smaller lures for timid fish. (But be prepared for the consequence of losing more lures while catching more fish!)

We were searching for boils but did not see any from Wahweap to Rock Creek. We arrived back at the dock at 11 a.m. only to get a phone call at noon saying stripers were slurping everywhere from the Castle Rock Cut to the main channel at Buoy 12. Slurps are most likely to be seen from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. (When there is a brightmoon evening, slurps will be much better than morning.)

Slurps are increasing lakewide. They are showing up in the evening in Bullfrog Bay closer to the main channel than the marina. Bigger stripers are slurping in Good Hope Bay and the San Juan.

Expect More Boils

Four-pound stripers are eating slightly larger shad in the productive inflow waters. Shad in the main lake are just an inch long or smaller. Expect more boils to occur over the entire lake when shad size doubles to 2 inches in July.

Walleye are now caught less frequently than they were in May. They are feeding more often at night and in low light and less during the day. Those that are being caught in the daytime are smaller year-

Largemouth and crappie are still found in the shallow trees but they are now caught in dwindling numbers as well. Catfish and bluegill catch is increasing to make up for the declining catch of other

Lake Powell offers a great variety of species to choose from. It seems there is a fish to please everyone

Great Summer Fishing Ahead At Arizona Lakes

High country trout hot spots include Knoll Lake, Blue Ridge Lake, Woods Canyon Lake, and Big Lake. Ashurst has been producing as well.

Show Low Lake and Fool Hollow

Lake are worth a try right now. The trout fishing has been decent, plus they both have delectable walleye. The state-record walleye came out of Show Low Lake. Fool Hollow also has some smallmouth

Another lake for a mixed bag of fish is Willow Springs Lake along the Mogollon Rim. This is one of the larger high country lakes and it has both largemouth and smallmouth bass, along with some small crappie. There are no limits on the bass and crappie. Since it's a deeper lake, it has some nice holdover-sized trout.

Good Place To Escape Triple Digits

Some anglers have been catching big northern pike at both Long Lake and Upper Lake Mary. Don't forget that Lake Mary also has bass and perch, plus, there are no boat motor restrictions there. It's a great place to take the bass boat when temperatures in the Valley hit triple digits.

This is a fantastic time for a Lake Powell adventure. Check out the Lake Powell report on this page. It's fun chasing slurps. But don't ignore the plentiful smallmouth bass or the walleye.



Probably 90 percent of the anglers at Powell only fish for the stripers. With more shoreline than the entire West Coast of North America, you might find whole stretches where the smallies haven't seen a lure in years, if ever.

When there is a waning moon, night fishing using submersible lights will be increasingly more effective, especially for stripers at Lake Pleasant, Lake Havasu and Lake Mead. Crappie hot spots are Alamo and Roosevelt, but Bartlett can also be good. It looks like San Carlos is down to nothing, so it's out of the running right now

A Good Time For Mr. Whiskers

This is a great time for Mr. Whiskers in the desert lakes. Grab a piece of shoreline at night, sit back, watch the stars, and use stink bait to get some hard-fighting channel catfish. You are allowed two hooks per line, so put on a second hook with corn as bait, chum with corn, and catch some carp as well.

Harper's catch was at the end of last month, but walleye are still being caught on the trolling pattern with shallow running lures clipping the tree tops where bottom depth is 10-20 feet. Walleye are an ambush feeder. They wait in the cover of trees for bait to swim by and then strike like a snake at a fish target or lure. They can also be taken on tube jigs fished on the bottom at 10-25 feet and trolled bottom bouncer rigs with a live night crawler as terminal tackle.





are cool and refreshing and rarely reach even 90 degrees F.

The lake is about 17 miles southeast of

Upper Lake Mary. If you are an outdoor enthusiast and love fishing, camping and hiking, Mormon Lake is a great choice. There is an abundance of wildlife, including herds of elk and deer with pronghorn antelope grazing the prairies of the southern points of the recreation area. There are even nesting pairs of bald eagles in the area.

The area features some the finest crosscountry skiing during the winter months, and during the summer, many enjoy boating and windsurfing.

Upper Lake Mary

. Upper Lake Mary is really a fun place to fish. The main attraction is northern pike that can get quite large and have razor-sharp teeth. The bite can be nasty; so don't forget your pliers. You'll also catch rainbow trout, vellow bass, channel catfish, sunfish and an occasional walleye. Fishing can be a lot more fun with a boat, but fishing from the bank can also give you good results.

When full, Upper Lake Mary covers

about 450 acres at a maximum depth of 38 feet. There are three paved boat ramps and there is no limit on boat-motor size. There are excellent facilities for disabled anglers. You'll find lakeside picnic tables and rest-

Nearby, there are two developed campgrounds including Lake View and Pine Grove. Canyon Vista campground is nearer to Lower Lake Mary and you'll find more camping available at nearby Mormon Lake and Ashurst Lake.

The season (weather permitting) for Lakeview and Pinegrove campgrounds extends through September. To get to Upper Lake Mary, from I-17 in Flagstaff, exit east

on Lake Mary Road and follow the paved road past Lower Lake Mary about 12 miles to the Upper Lake. For more information on this cool fishing venue, call (928) 774-1147.

More Ideas From Rory Rory Aikens, AZGFD

Hey, want an opportunity to catch some big trout? Well, both Woods Canyon Lake and Willow Springs Lake along the Mogol-lon Rim have recently been stocked with some bonus-sized trout weighing 5 to 8 pounds in addition to the regular stockers. Better put new fishing line on the reel!

Plus, Willow Springs has also been providing anglers some larger holdover trout as well. These larger trout are typically more predatory, so lures such as inline spinners, Rapalas, and casting spoons like Kast-Masters might work well. Also try troller baits, such as cowbells or Ford Fenders.

Keep in mind that the trout fishing at Big Lake is still excellent. Big has really been producing this season so far, so don't miss out on the action. I've also been hearing some great things about Upper Lake Mary near Flagstaff, where some anglers have been getting huge pike up to 10 pounds, and some decent-sized walleye as well.

The largemouth bass fishing should also be picking up at Mary. This is also one of our few lakes with yellow perch. Note: More from Rory Aikens is in the "Tight Lines" section of this issue.

catching one and holding it by the gills! The first and second days of fishing have been among the best days of my entire life.



"These are a great fish to catch [and most range] from ... 10 [to] 20 pounds."

Bighorn Sheep Take Center Stage At AZGFD Workshops

This is a free opportunity to learn about and view the animals.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department's Region III office in Kingman is serving as host to the popular Desert Bighorn Sheep Workshops.

There will be two separate, two-day workshops from July 27-28 and Aug. 3-4. The first night of the workshop is mandatory classroom education from 6-8 p.m. The second day provides the opportunity to view the majestic bighorns in their native environment during a four-hour boat ride beginning at 10:30 a.m. on the Colorado River between Willow Beach and the Hoover Dam.

"That is the time of year the bighorns are coming to the river pretty regularly," said Zen Mocarski, public information officer with the Kingman office. "The hotter it is, the better the opportunity to see the sheep along the river's banks.

Open To 14 And Older

These workshops are open to any member of the public 14-years-old and up. Nobody under 14 will be registered. Space, however, is limited to 49 people per session. Preference will be given to those who have not attended the workshop in at least three years

Participants will be selected through a random draw process, which takes place immediately following the noon, June 15



application deadline. All applicants are contacted by mail, or e-mail. Applications received after the deadline, and individuals not drawn, are placed on the reserve list.

"This is an opportunity to get connected with nature," Mocarski said. "It's a great way for people to learn about bighorn sheep, the department, and the conservation efforts of many different agencies in regards to bighorn sheep.'

Because Of The Heritage Fund

Mocarski said these workshops are available because of the Heritage Fund, a voter-passed initiative that provides money to the department through Arizona Lottery dollars for wildlife conservation and education

The workshops include an optional tour of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Willow Beach National Fish Hatchery prior to the Colorado River field trip. The 45-minute tour will begin at 9 a.m. and will feature both sport fish and endangered native fish.

Anyone interested in applying is encouraged to do so by downloading an application form www.azgfd.gov/bighornworkshop. Print the form and follow the instructions. For those without internet, or needing additional information, contact Zen Mocarski at (928) 692-7700, ext. 2301 or e-mail

While the trips are free, there is a \$20 per person refundable deposit to help reduce the problem of no-shows. The money is refunded when a person either attends the workshop or calls to cancel at least 48 hours in advance.

Registration Details

Registration is by mail or in-person drop-off at the Kingman office only.

"Please provide your e-mail address on the form if you have one," Mocarski said. "We send out follow-up instructions and information to registrants, and e-mail allows us to get the information out more quickly and saves on our costs."

Donations, which are not mandatory to participate, will be accepted at the work-shop to help offset increasing costs for boat rentals and fuel. Please do not send cash donations prior to the event.

Participants are encouraged to bring a camera, water, snacks, a hat, sunglasses, and sunscreen. No tripods will be allowed on the boats, but small coolers are OK. "It will be hot on the river," Mocarski

advised, "but that's when bighorn come down for a drink. There is limited shade on the boats ... the temperatures will be in the triple digits."

Bear Attacks At Ponderosa Campground Near Payson

One camper sustains non-life-threatening injuries.

An Arizona woman was injured recently when a bear ripped a hole in the tent where she, her husband and their dog had been sleeping at Ponderosa Campground in Tonto National Forest, just off Highway 260 about 10 miles east of Payson. The attack occurred around 4:30 a.m.

After tearing open the tent, the bear reportedly stuck its head in and clawed at the 74-year-old woman, leaving her with bruises and a laceration on her scalp. She

was treated at Payson Regional Medical Center for non-lifethreatening injuries and released. The woman's husband and dog were not hurt.

Campers Informed

A large adult bear had recently been seen hanging around the campsite dumpsters. A wildlife manager with Arizona Game and Fish Department visited Ponderosa Campground following the attack, looking for the bear, but it was not found. A culvertstyle trap was set. The wildlife manager talked to the campground host about precautions, and all

campers were informed of the bear threat.

The bear returned to the campground sometime during the night. The campground host chased the bear, which retreated. It returned a short time later and attacked the campers in their tent.

Officials evacuated campers and closed Ponderosa Campground. Lower Tonto Creek/Bear Flat/Forest Road 405A were also closed to entry. An official closure was put into effect by the Forest Service until the bear danger lessens.

Important To Stay Alert

The bear was probably looking for food, which is scarce this summer because

of drought," Paxon said. "These campers secured their food in the cab of their truck, and there was no food in the tent. While the campers were with the campground host and medical personnel, the bear came back to the tent a second time, ripped another hole in it, and then went after a pillow that had blood on it from the woman's wounds."

Bears are very active during the summer, Paxon added. "It's important to stay alert. Bears are attracted to places like dumpsters, trash bins and campsites. Whether folks live here or are just visiting, they need to remember this is bear country. Never leave food out, and never take food into a tent."

Bear attacks on humans are rare. There have only been seven documented cases of move food odors. Do not keep toiletries in your sleeping area, they might also attract bears. Avoid sleeping in the same area where you prepare or eat food. Never intentionally feed wildlife.

If you prepare desserts, such as S'mores, be sure those eating this delicious concoction wash up afterwards because marshmallows and chocolate are superb bear attractants

To Discourage A Black Bear, Immediately —

· Alter your route to avoid a bear in the distance

· Make yourself as large and imposing as possible, such as spreading out your jacket like a set of wings.

· If the bear continues to approach, stand upright and wave our arms, jacket or other items.

- · Make loud noises, such as yelling, whistles, and banging pots and pans.
- Do not run, that could prompt the bear to chase and catch you.
- Never play dead. Give the bear a chance to leave
- · If the bear does not leave, stay calm, continue facing it, and slowly back away

· If a black bear attacks, fight back with everything in your — fists, sticks, rocks and E.P.A. registered bear pepper spray. While household black and cayenne pepper is not as potent as bear pepper spray, they can still provide

Remember, removal is usually a last resort: Bears can be common at high elevations where food is plentiful. Different bears will visit the same area if attractants are not removed.

a slight deterrent factor.

Bears that must be removed are relocated or may have to be destroyed if they are considered too dangerous, have lost their fear of humans, or continue to get into conflicts with people.

So be bear aware while visiting the state's diverse outdoor habitats.

ered unpredictable and potentially dangerous – at all times.

A black bear will usually detect you and leave the area before you notice, unless the bear has been conditioned to people and their food. If you live in black bear country, take responsibility for not attracting them.

Grand Canyon's South Rim **Implements Campfire Restrictions**

GRAND CANYON, Ariz. - Due to continued hot, dry and windy conditions and increasing fire danger, Grand Canyon National Park's South Rim began campfire restrictions on June 8. All woodburning fires, including campfires and warming fires, will be prohibited throughout the South Rim, including campgrounds and residential areas.

This restriction is being implemented in

response to current and predicted weather and fuel conditions, as well as corresponding fire danger rating levels. Both rims of Grand Canyon National Park are currently at Very High Fire Danger; and fire danger is expected to continue to increase until monsoonal moisture occurs. The re-



striction will remain in place until significant precipitation falls and fire danger lev-

"Given current environmental conditions, any wildfire would have the potential to exhibit extreme fire behavior," said acting Grand Canyon Chief of Fire and Aviation Chris Marks. "As we phase in fire restrictions, we reduce the potential for accidental fire ignitions in the park."

When visiting your public lands during high fire danger, please remember to be fire aware. Taking a few extra precautions can make all the difference.

Before going hiking or camping, check for fire restrictions and closures in the area. Direct your inquiries to the agency that manages the public lands you are visiting.

If you are using a portable stove, clear the area of grasses and other fine fuels and be careful to prevent the stove from tipping over. Consider

alternatives campfires. During times of High fire danger (and above) unat-tended campfires are likely to es-

Practice Leave No Trace principles, including packing out cigarette butts and burned materials.

If you are driving on unpaved roads, be careful of parking or driving your vehicle in tall, dry vegetation. Hot vehicle parts may start a fire

If you see smoke or fire, note the location and report it to authorities. Do NOT attempt to put out a fire by yourself.

Increased Fire Restrictions On Tonto National Forest Have Begun

Fireworks are prohibited at all times as are most types of fire-causing activities.

Drought conditions, hot temperatures and increased fire danger have resulted in increased fire restrictions for the Tonto National Forest that began on June 8. Most typesof fire or fire-causing activities will be prohibited across the Tonto National



Only you can prevent wildfires!

Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire or wood or charcoalburning device is prohibited, except in Forest Service-provided fire grills and grates in developed recreation sites on the Cave Creek and Mesa ranger districts where charcoal only may be used. No campfires of any type are allowed under any conditions in any other areas on the forest.

Smoking is allowed only in a developed campground, vehicle, or building.

Gas and propane stoves, lanterns or heating devices are permitted, providing such devices meet the fire underwriter's specifications for safety.

Welding, grinding, or operating acety-lene or other torch with open flame is pro-

All internal combustion engines must have a spark-arresting device properly in-stalled, be maintained and in effective working order, and meet appropriate safety standards. The use of internal combustion engines is restricted to existing roads and trails, and developed campgrounds.

Discharging firearms except in taking

game in accordance with Arizona, federal, or tribal hunting laws, is prohibited.

"Because of ongoing drought, dry forest conditions, and exception-ally low relative humidities, fire restrictions are needed to protect forest users. structures and natural resources from the in-creased potential for dangerous fires," said Tonto Na-tional Forest Acting Fire Staff Officer Helen Graham.
"These precautionary

measures are intended to


enhance our visitors' quality recreation experiences. Most areas of the Tonto National Forest remain available recreation activity, including all the Salt River system lakes.

We continue to remind the public that all fireworks are prohibited on the forest at all times," concluded Graham.

Violation of these restrictions is punishable by a fine of up to \$5,000 for individ-\$10,000 for organizations, and imprisonment for up to six months.
