Update your boating safety knowledge

Diver-Down Flags

- Scuba divers and snorkelers must display a diver-down flag to mark their diving area. The flag must be displayed whenever some one is diving below the surface.
- A vessel should stay as far away from a diver-down flag as is reasonable and prudent for the circumstances. The suggested safe distance from a flag is 100 yards.



A rectangular red flag with a white diago-nal stripe is used on inland waters, in-cluding the Colorado River and Lake Systems.



A blue and white International Code Flag A (or Alfa flag) is used on international waters.

Filing a Float Plan

Before going out on a vessel, it is always a good idea to leave a float plan with a relative or friend, or at least with a local marina.

- A float plan should:
 Describe the vessel, including its registration number, length, make, horsepower, and
- engine type.

 State where you are going, the detailed route, and your expected return time.
 Give the name, address, and telephone number of each person on board and an emergency contact.
- Include the description and license plate of the tow vehicle and trailer, and tell where they will be located.
- ◆ Notify the person who has your float plan when you return or if you decide to extend your time on the water.

Unlawful and **Dangerous Operation**

Arizona law designates these dangerous operating practices as

- **Negligent or Reckless Operation** of a vessel is operating in a manner that causes danger to others or their property,
 - · Operating in a restricted area, such as a marked
- swimming area

 Operating while passenger(s) are positioned in the bow
 such that the operator's view is obstructed

 Weaving through congested waterway traffie

 Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife

 Teak surfing or platform dragging

No Wake or Wakeless speek means a speed that does not create a wake and is never in excess of five miles per hour.

- Speed Restrictions require the operator to maintain a proper speed while operating a vessel. Specifically, it is illegal to:
 - operate a vessel at speeds greater than are reasonable or proper given the existing waterway traffic, persons in the water, and weather conditions. Exceed any posted speed limits. Operate a vessel at greater than wakeless speed in a

 - Operate a vesser at greater than rances speed posted no wake zone. Operate a vessel as speeds that may cause injury or damage to any other person, another vessel, or the property of others. This includes causing damage or danger from the wake of your vessel
- Adding on the Bow or Gunwales is allowing passengers to ride where there may be a chance of falling overboard while underway at greater than "no wake speed" on a powerboat. Specifically, this means allowing passengers to ride on the covered bow, transom, swim step, or gunwales unless these are designed for carrying passengers at all
- Overloading is loading the vessel beyond its safe carrying capacity or the recommended capacity shown on the capacity plate. Take into consideration when determining if the vessel is overloaded.
- Failure To Follow Navigational Rules is operating a vessel in violation of the navigational rules of Arizona
 - Specifically, operators of vessels:
 - Must follow the navigational rules shown on pages 12-13 of the Arizona Boater's Guide.
 - Must follow a counter-clockwise traffic flow.

 - Leaving shore must give way to approaching vessels.
 An exception to these rules is waterways where power-driven vessels are prohibited

Remember — it is your responsibility to know the law. On waterways shared with other states, such as the Colorado River, other states' laws and federal regulations apply. Always know all applicable boating laws and regulatiosn

Are You Qualified To Be a Licensed Captain? You Might Be Surprised!

First of all, who has to have a Captain's License?

Captain's licenses are first and foremost required in order to legally carry passengers for hire. They are also a requirement in many commercial, law enforcement, transportation, charter; fishing; sailing instruc-tion; merchant marine, and large yacht vessel operations.

All kinds of new and used boats, yachts and vessels frequently have to be moved around for many reasons, and insurance companies frequently require a licensed Captain to make offshore vessel deliveries which also adds to the demand for licensed

O.K. - What are the main personal reasons a person would want to earn a Captain's License?

There are three main personal reasons one strives to become a licensed Captain -Career advancement; maritime education for vessel operation skills and safety; and prestige. Another reason is that having a Captain's License often can dramatically reduce insurance costs.

Are there different kinds of Captain's Licenses?

Yes. There are three basic types of Captain's Licenses – OUPV/6-Pack (Operator of Uninspected Vessel); Master; and Mate and there are sub-categories within each of those license categories. We will talk about that much more later on.

How old do you have to be to apply for a Captain's License?

To apply for a U.S. Coast Guard approved OUPV Captain's License you must be at least 18 years old; for Master or Mate you must be at least 19 years old.

Do you need a lot of vessel experience to qualify to apply for a Captain's License?

Yes, but let's talk about that in some depth, because many people look at the "sea time" requirements and rule themselves out as contenders for a Captain's License because they don't realize how much applicable experience they actually have.

It is a fact that even to obtain a U.S. Coast Guard approved OUPV Captain's License you will need to be able to document at least 360 "days" of vessel experience; 90 "days" of which will have to be within the previous 3 year period; and 90 "days" of which will have to have been on near coastal or open ocean waters. Otherwise, your license could be limited to inland wa-

But before you automatically rule yourself out because you don't think you have the required experience, consider that you may have never have driven, navigated, or captained a vessel and you still might have the required hours of experience.

How can that be? Well, first, depending on the specific license you're seeking, you can count your experience all the way back to age 18 or 19.

Secondly, it takes only 4 hours of "sea time" to qualify for a "day" of sea time. (You can't count multiple 4 hour periods at sea on the same physical day as multiple 'sea days" though).

The concept here is that one's experience performing all sorts of deck, operations, and vessel handling duties has added to your personal knowledge of what it takes to be skillful and safe on the water, and so you have an appreciation for the material you would have to learn to be a licensed captain. (Sorry - sipping martinis on that cruise ship voyage and that Windjammer sail in the Caribbean doesn't count - none of your sea time can be as a paying passen-

So think hard on this one. Do you now have a recreational boat or yacht or did you drive a recreational boat when you were young? Do you go out often with friends who have vessels and assist with the lines? Are you or were you part of ship's company at sea during your military service? Are you were you a deck hand for law enforcement; sport fishing; marine transportation, charter vessels; merchant marine, and large yacht vessel operations? It can add up!

Rafting The Colorado Is Adventure Of A Lifetime

Each year the Colorado River calls some adventurers to experience the thrilling beauty of a river rafting trip through the majesty of the Grand Canyon.

Already, though, applications for noncommercial river-trip permits are at a premium, at press time, probably all taken. For the calendar year 2014, a total of 450 permits have been available for 12-to-25-day river trips

However, even though the main lottery for next year's launch dates is completed, there are follow-up lotteries held as needed throughout the remainder of the year to reassign canceled and/or left-over river trips. Public notifications for these follow-up lotteries are made through e-mail, an RSS feed, and Twitter (twitter.com/GCRiverPermits).

The weighted lottery Web site can be accessed year-round to create or modify an account and to sign-up to receive e-mail

notifications. Individuals who are interested in a future non-commercial river permit are strongly encouraged to create an account. Lottery applications are accepted through the weighted lottery Web site only when lotteries are open.

LAKE POWELL FISH REPORT Here Are Some Angling Pointers

Declining water levels require special techniques for spring fishing.

Declining lake level will have a huge impact on spring fishing. Current lake level is now at the projected low of 3600 and it will likely decline another foot before spring runoff reverses the lake level.

That is great news for boaters using the southern lake as it will allow the construction crew currently deepening the Castle Rock Cut to remove one more foot of soil and make the pass last a bit longer in future low-water situations.


But, fish care more about the water level as it relates to forage and cover. This current generation of fish has been displaced from living in the luxurious brush zone where cover and forage have been abundant.

Now brush is 4 feet out of the water on dry land. Fish habitat has reverted to rocks, shelves and boulders. Shad have left clear water for the added security of murky water where sight-feeding predators are not quite as efficient. Crayfish are now the prime targets for many predators.

Welcome to the new (old) Lake Pow-

Welcome to the new (old) Lake Powell. These are the conditions prevalent in the 1980s after the lake filled and water-level fluctuation eliminated brush. Fishing strategy must be altered to match the new conditions.

Critical factors for successful anglers begin with water color and temperature. Expect shad to be in colored water and to avoid clear water. Predators will follow.

URBAN FISHING REPORT

It's A Great Time For Local Fishing

March offers the best time of the year to fish your nearby park lakes for trout, sun-fish, bass and catfish. Good fishing for trout will continue through March as all lakes receive their final winter stockings.

Most trout are biting on Power Bait

fished on the bottom, but worms and small jigs have worked well at times. The cool morning hours are the best times to target the trout.

As waters warm up, try fishing for largemouth bass that are now moving closer to shore as they prepare to spawn and search for food. Regulations require that all bass under 13 inches must be released unharmed immediately.

Reports keep coming in of anglers catching catfish, even though it has been nearly four months since the last cats were stocked. Speaking of catfish, the catfish stocking season starts on Thursday, March 21 at all Phoenix and Tucson area Urban

Bluegill stockings will be done by the end of March. Excellent trout fishing conditions can be found at Payson's Green Valley lakes. Best bets for these pine-country trout are Power Bait, marshmallows and worms. Some success has been found by trout anglers using spinners, small spoons

Trout Season Wrap-up; Catfish Coming March 21

The final winter trout stockings in the Phoenix and Tucson area Urban lakes took place the week of March 4-9. Urban lake water temperatures are rising into the '60s, signaling the annual stocking changeover from winter trout to spring catfish.

Last week's trout delivery will be the ninth one of the season, concluding a very successful winter stocking season of 100 percent on-time deliveries. For the fourth vear in a row the trout were larger than normal and averaged about ½ pound each.

At Payson's Green Valley Lakes, trout stockings will continue every two weeks for another two months until the middle of

All Urban Program lakes and ponds in the Phoenix and Tucson areas will be stocked with 1.5-pound average channel catfish on Thursday, March 21. Catfish



sizes this spring are expected to be average or a bit bigger according to our Arkansasbased contractor.

Catfish will run from 14-19 inches in length. Beginning with the spring season kick-off stocking, catfish will be stocked seven times through mid June at rates averaging from 40 to 60 fish per acre. More than 13,000 pounds of Arkansas farm-raised cat-fish will be delivered and stocked into 19 Urban Fishing Program lakes every two weeks throughout the spring.

Fall-Hunting Recommendations Being Considered

From AZGFD

The Arizona Game and Fish Department has hosted its series of public forums to meet with constituents about developing the 2013 fall hunt recommendations for deer, bighorn sheep, turkey, javelina, buffalo, bear, mountain lion, and small game animals. The meetings were held in Yuma, Mesa, Pinetop, Flagstaff, Tucson and Kingman.

Constituents interested in particular game management units within those regions had the opportunity to discuss management direction. The meetings allowed the department to get together with sportsmen to discuss recommendations being considered, based on survey data, harvest rates, and hunt guidelines.

Permit numbers were not proposed at this point, but where permit numbers might be headed was discussed generally.

What's Next?

Now that the public forums are com-pleted, final proposed draft hunt recommendations will be available for public review at regional open houses which will be posted at www.azgfd.gov/huntguidelines by April 1. The final fall hunt recom-

The best fishing pattern today is to fish in muddy water using shad-imitating lures like medium-running crankbaits, swim baits, jigs and spoons.

Colored water is literally the spring hot spot as murky water warms more quickly than clear water. Yesterday there was a 2-3 degree temperature difference between clear and cloudy water as the day progressed. As the surface layer warms, fish move to warmer shallow water. As water cools overnight, fish move back to the depths where they are more comfortable. Therefore, fish deeper water in the morning and move to shallows in the afternoon.

Stripers are still in the backs of the canyons in muddy water. Best technique is to troll or cast shallow running lures from the 25-foot channel toward shore. Expect

most stripers to be in water less than 10 feet deep. They are in small bunches rather than schools since muddy water requires them to feed individually instead of in schools.


Bass will be feeding on crayfish in both muddy and clear water. They don't move as much as stripers so are more likely to be satisfied with water conditions found in their home cove. Fish deep with crayfish imitating lures for smallmouth and shallower around any available cover for largemouth. In these harsh conditions, tumbleweed piles will be the preferred habitat.


Fishing technique and conditions are different this year but it is still Lake Powell, which always provides a very special fishing experience.

At press time, lake elevation was 3,600 and water temperature was 46-52F.

Arizona's Bald Eagle **Nestwatch Program** Celebrates 35 Years

For more than 35 years, Arizona's Bald Eagle Nestwatch Program has contributed to the tremendous growth of the state's bald eagle population and helped save the lives of more than 60 eagle nestlings.

This year's nestwatchers participate in four-month tours of duty, watching 14 breeding areas, most along the Salt and Verde rivers in national forests, on Native American lands, and in Maricopa County parks. They collect data about the eagles behavior, educate the public, and notify rescuers of any life-threatening situations for the birds.

So far in 2013, three new breeding areas have been documented bringing Arizona to a record 68 bald eagle breeding areas throughout the state

The department's bald eagle conservation program is supported by the Heritage Fund, a 1990 voter-passed initiative that

Volunteers Sought For Ferret Spotlighting Effort

mammal on the planet, the black-footed ferret continues its climb toward recovery in Arizona's Aubrey Valley. As part of this recovery effort, the Arizona Game and Fish Department is seeking volunteers to assist with two spring spotlighting events to document the population of this elusive, nocturnal, and endangered carnivore.

Witness the process of how researchers learn how to understand the black-footed ferret's population, longevity, and move-

ment throughout the range.

The Black-footed Ferret Recovery Project personnel will be conducting two shorter spotlighting efforts instead of five consecutive nights, as in the past. The spotlighting periods will be from March



28-30 and from April 25-27 at the blackfooted ferret recovery area in Aubrey Valley, just west of Seligman. Sign up for just one evening or several.

Volunteers must be able to stay atten-

tive from sunset to sunrise and be willing to learn how to use a Global Positioning System (GPS). A parent or guardian must accompany volunteers under the age of 18

Twice Thought To Be Extinct

Twice thought to be extinct, a small population of black-footed ferrets was discovered in 1981. Only 18 were left when captive breeding efforts began in 1985. In 1996, Arizona's Aubrey Valley was selected as a re-introduction site, where the population has become large enough over the past decade to be self-sustaining.

All the ferrets in the wild today are the offspring of just seven males and 11 fe-

Published by the Arizona Game and


Fish Department, this is the third in a series of wildlife histories that began with Man and Wildlife in Arizona: The American Exploration Period, 1824–1865, and continued with Arizona Wildlife: The Territorial Years, 1863–1912.

Archaeology Programs Featured At Red Rock State Park In March

Red Rock State Park is the perfect place to experience the red rocks of Sedona, several hiking trails, bird-watching and daily special events. Red Rock's diverse habitat, which is abundant with plants and wildlife, creates the perfect environment to provide environmental education programs. In March 2013 the programs will feature the opportunity to learn about archaeology.

Learning Opportunities
Wednesday and Saturday mornings at 8 a.m. in March, visitors will find bird enthusiasts joining a naturalist for a "Guided Bird Walk" directed at beginning and advanced birders. Visitors are invited to also explore on their own. The family-oriented trail system is well marked for both safety and pleasure. Five miles of trails consist of interconnecting loops, leading to red rock vistas or along the lush greenery of Oak Creek. The three major loops are connected along the riparian corridor by the Kisva Trail, which also leads to the short loop of the Yavapai Ridge Trail. The Javelina Trail takes you

into the pinon/juniper woodlands and back to the other loops. Detailed information is available at the Visitor Center. Bikes and horses are allowed on designated routes.

Spending Supports Jobs

The peer-reviewed visitor spending analysis was conducted by Yue Cui, Ed Mahoney, and Teresa Herbowicz of Michigan State University for the National Park Service. The report shows \$13 billion of direct spending by 279 million

national park visitors in communities within 60 miles of a park. This spending supported 252,000 jobs, most of which also are in communities near national parks. Park visitor spending had a combined \$30 billion impact on the U.S. economy as a whole.

According to the report, most visitor spending supports jobs in lodging, food, and beverage service (63 percent). Other

spending categories include recreation and entertainment (17 percent), other retail (11 percent), transportation and fuel (7 percent) and wholesale and manufacturing (2 percent).

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
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




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
