

Preparing for Boating Emergencies

A safe boater knows how to prevent and respond to boating emergencies.

To prevent from falling overboard: Don't sit on the gunwale, bow,

- seatbacks, motor cover or any other area not designed for seating. · Don't sit on pedestal seats when
- underway at greater than idle speed.

 Don't stand up in or lean out from
- Don't move about the boat when underway

If someone on your boat falls

- Reduce speed and toss the victim a throwable personal floatation device (PFD)
- Have other passengers watch the
- · Turn your boat around and slowly pull alongside the victim, approaching the victim from downwind or into the current, whichever is stronger
- Turn off the engine. Pull the victim on board over the stern, keeping the weight in the boat balanced

Know the Rules: Learn to identify "Navi-Aids"

Arizona law enforcement agencies write many citations for "failure to obey navigation laws." You can help ensure the safety of all on the water by learning to identify these common navigational aids.



Information

Squares indicate where to find food, supplies, repairs, etc and give directions and other information.



Controlled

Circles indicate a controlled area such as speed imit, no fishing or anchoraing, ski only or no skiing, or "slow, no



Exclusion

Crossed diamonds indicate areas off-limits to all vessels such as swimming areas, dams, and spillways.



Danger

Diamonds warn of dangers such as rocks, shoals, construction, dams, or stumps Always proceed with caution.

Other Non-Lateral Markers

Safe Water Markers are white with red vertical stripes and mark mid-channels or fairways. They may be passed on either side



Inland Water Obstruction Markers are white with black vertical stripes and indicate an obstruction to navigation. You should not pass between these buoys and nearest

Mooring Buoy

Mooring Buoys are round and white with a blue horizontal band and are found in marinas and other areas where vessels are allowed to anchor.

Note, the following actions are ille-

- Willfully damaging, removing, interfering with, or tying up to a navagation buoy not intended for mooring
- Mooring, anchoring, or fastening to shore for more than 14 consecutive days any vessel on public waters.

Forget a life jacket or need to borrow one?

Boaters at Lake Pleasant Lake Havasu and Lake Mohave that need a life jacket can borrow one from the stations placed near each lake's boat ramps.

The stations contain jackets for infants to adults. However, boaters are reminded to please return the life jackets to the station once they are done with them so they can be used by other boaters. .

Some interesting history re: recreational boating since 1966 is reflected in its archives.



THE WELL-DRESSED SHOOTER

This Is Not Just A Matter Of Style

BY JOHN ANDERSON

There are a few absolute essentials that every shooter, no matter what his sport, must wear. No range will let you shoot without "eyes and ears" — eye protection and hearing protection. That being said, there are tons of different ways to protect your eyes and ears, and some are better than others, some are good for one kind of shooting and not another, and some are just barely acceptable.



These are John Anderson's ear protection that he's had for years and says are fan-

Ear Protection

Ear protection is one place where you'll find a lot of different products to prevent hearing loss in shooters. Bottom of the line are those little foam ear plugs that you compress and stick in your ear. I'm sorry if you like those, but I think they stink

3M Push-Ins

They never seem to fit right, and they don't seem to do a whole of good. At the SHOT Show this year in Las Vegas (Shooting Hunting and Outdoor Trades), they gave us some disposable hearing protection that was actually very good. They are called 3M Push-Ins and they work very well. They are also comfortable, easy to insert and they have a cord so that if you remove them for a bit, they don't get lost.

Earmuffs

For pistol shooting at the indoor range, I prefer earmuffs. They offer a ton of protection and really muffle the noise a lot, which is extremely important at an indoor

Muffs come in a ton of colors and they adjust to fit anyone. There are even muffs that have earplugs as well, for double the protection. There is one drawback to the muffs — they can definitely be in the way when you are using a firearm that you have to shoulder, like a rifle or a shotgun.

In-The-Ear Protection

At the sporting clays range or at the rifle range, I prefer in-the-ear protection. Margie and I use 3M Peltor Combat Arms Earplugs. They come in a small case so you don't lose them, and they have a yellow end and a green end. The yellow end goes in your ear if you're outdoors, and at an indoor range you put the green end in



Of the various kinds of hearing protection, the foam plugs are the worst. 3M Push-Ins are great, but earmuffs or double-ended plugs are better.

your ear

We love them — they are totally out of the way of your gun, and you can talk to each other just fine, but they muffle gun noise very well. You can get them on Amazon for less than \$30.



wear glasses, there are tons of shooting safety glasses in a wide variety of colors and styles. We bought our granddaughter a set of pink earmuffs and red glasses and she loves them.

Corrective Lenses

A word about corrective lenses: Glasses can make it difficult to shoot at times. If you wear bifocals, it's hard to cock your head just right so that you see the sights and the target clearly. With a shotgun, you are often sighting through the corner of your glasses when you first pick up the bird, and that can give you a warped view. I have found that progressive lenses make it a lot easier to shoot.

Shooting Glasses

For shotgun shooters especially, there are shooting glasses with a variety of lens colors designed to make the clays really pop out at you. Some companies even make prescription glasses with interchangeable colored lenses that install in front of your corrective lenses, so you can choose the perfect color for any con-

When Margie and I shoot clays, we wear our progressive Transition lenses and we do just fine, but we don't shoot competitively. If you are a serious shooter, you should definitely check out a variety of lenses and see which ones work best for you.

Other Things To Consider

Eye and ear protectors are absolute requirements, but there are other things to consider, such as hats and vests. These aren't something you need at an indoor pistol range, but if you're a sporting-clays shooter, you probably will want to have

Hats Are Important

Sporting clays ranges are out-side, which means the sun is beating down on you the entire time you're shooting, so a hat is almost a necessitv. The brim can be in the way at times, so you may have to try a few different types of hats before you find one that suits vou

Margie always wears visors, and I prefer the type of felt hat that upland bird hunters wear. looking Besides

good, it shades ears and neck and doesn't get in the way of seeing the clays or the shotgun sights



Vests are great for clays. A well-fitting vest will make it easier to shoot. Why? Because your shirts can have a tendency to catch on the butt stock and crumple up between your shoulder and the gun.

A good vest has a patch on the shoulder that makes it easy to bring the gun up to the perfect position. In addition to



A good shooting vest will let you shoulder your shotgun quickly and smoothly.

that, shooting vests have nice big pockets for shells, your clays card, chokes, your phone, etc.

There are so many styles and colors of vests that you could fill a book with them. Just find one you like and make sure it fits well and you'll be good to go.

The Bottom Line



vou're just getting into shooting, make sure you have decent hearprotection and some good safety glasses. Earmuffs aren't

very expensive, and your hearing is worth

Most indoor ranges have earmuffs you can borrow, but get your own. For heav-en's sake don't rely on those awful foam earplugs. If you prefer plugs to muffs, buy yourself a decent set that will last you for-

Your hearing and vision are precious, and once they're gone, they're gone for good. Take care of them.


Sick Of El Niño? NASA Says, 'You Ain't Seen Nothing Yet'

As we began 2016, heavy rains were predicted for San Diego and Arizona. Anticipation of rising water sheds appear to be in our future for Arizona lakes especially on the Salt River lakes chain.

Meanwhile, the offshore water current temperatures hold and numbers of 15-30 pound yellow tail are being reported at H&M Landing from the 1/2- and 3/4-day boats. The offshore fishing season took the Christmas holiday week off but we're at it once again; it continues!

The El Niño currently causing mayhem around the world is predicted only to worsen in 2016 – and NASA specialists worry it could possibly get as bad as the most devastating El Niño ever.

A fresh satellite picture of the weather system has a surprising likeness to another out of December 1997 — the very worst El Niño on record - which had been attributed for severe weather conditions, including record precipitation located in California along with Peru, heat waves through Australia, plus fires within Indonesia. Those severe variables triggered approximately 23,000 deaths in



1997 and 1998

Crazy Factors

This year, El Niño has already resulted in crazy factors for much of the United States. It resulted in a great number of Americans' witnessing a balmy Christmas Eve, with temperatures peaking through the 70s throughout locations down the East Coast, and it is the cause of deadly storms and near-record flooding inside the South plus Midwest.

In Ethiopia, for example, the govern-

ment predicts 10.2 million people will require humanitarian assistance next season because of a drought made worse by way of El Niño, according to Oxfam. In Malawi, 2.8 million people are anticipated to see food shortages as February ends.

Effects Around The U.S.A.

Around the U.S., the biggest *El Niño* effects are anticipated at the beginning of 2016, NASA said. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration fore-casts "several months of relatively cool

and wet conditions across the southern United States, and relatively warm and dry conditions over the northern United

Matt Sitkowski, a coordinating weather producer at The Weather Channel, said that El Niño could result in a "wetter and stormier California" for the next two to three months - which could be a boon for the drought-stricken state.

"The fear is some of these storms come and you get too much at once, which could lead to flooding concerns," he added. "It doesn't take much in parts of California."

The East Coast can potentially end up being impacted, also. The 1997-1998 El Niño brought about a crippling ice storm within New England plus southeastern

Winds Are A Reason

El Niños usually are generated any time winds within the Pacific deteriorate and / or invert course, creating rising temperatures in the ocean inside central and eastern Pacific, principally across the Equator. Clouds, in addition to storms, go along with the warming water, altering jet streams and, in addition, storm paths

Look for the bass action to get even better at some our pristine lakes in the desert. Apache, Canyon and Saguaro all have been stocked with rainbow trout throughout the winter, so throwing some trout-imitation swim baits can produce some trophy bass.

With an onset of warmer-than-average temperatures, more bass have ventured into shallower waters in a pre-spawn mode (certainly at Roosevelt and likely Saguaro, too) and are willing to chase crankbaits, spinnerbaits and chatter baits as they feed actively before their spawn.

Catfish Are Coming Back

At our Community lakes and ponds, the final trout stocking of the winter season has taken place. The next stocking will be in late April — catfish are coming back.



SB1361: A Solution To A Major Problem!

Every year the State of Arizona convenes the legislature in January and all kinds of bills pop up. Some are ludicrous (just ask Representative Townsend) and some are a response to critical problems. This year the Arizona Game & Fish Department has been pushing for SB1361 to be approved.

What Is SB1361?

What is SB1361 and why are a few select former commissioners screaming?

Back in 1990, The Heritage Fund (Indian gaming monies) awarded an annual amount of \$10 million dollars to the Arizona Game and Fish Department to purchase sensitive habitat for threatened and endangered species. For awhile those monies did exactly what they were sup-posed to do and the Game & Fish Department — under the guidance of the Arizona Game & Fish Commission — has purchased a number of properties.

Now There Is A Problem

For a brief period of time, the system worked well. Now, however, it has become very obvious that there is a problem. There is no language in the statute that allows for the Heritage monies to be



During the past year, there were several meetings where a lot of concerned people from all walks of the outdoor community tried to find a solution to the lack of funding for operation and maintenance. That group could never arrive at a consensus on how to pay for these properties.


For those who need a little primer on this, consider, if you will, purchasing a new car. If you had \$25,000 to spend on the car and it indeed cost exactly \$25,000, it sounds great.

However -

You can never buy a vehicle, drive it daily and never consider replacing tires, doing an oil change or any other form of maintenance. Well, I guess you could if you wanted to destroy the vehicle in no time flat.

So -

Currently the Arizona Game & Fish Department is forced to pay for the opera-tion and maintenance for these properties out of ... you guessed it. Sportsmen's dol-

A Bonus For The Public

Quite frankly, the Arizona general public that does not hunt or fish should always thank their lucky stars that hunters and fisherman exist. Since the general public does not pay a single dime of support to the Arizona Game & Fish Department, any wildlife they see is a bonus to them. No taxpayer dollars are spent by the Arizona Game & Fish Department. Through Federal self-imposed taxes on hunting and fishing equipment as well as state licenses and tags, the sportsmen pay for the Department.

A Good Solution

SB1361 is a good solution to a prob-lem that will only become a more onerous burden as time passes. The shame of it is that Beth, Bill and Bob still keep trying to be commissioners after their day in the sun is long over. The current commissioners reached out to many groups for a solution. No one had anything remotely close to a good idea.

It's time to back SB1361 and get on with maintaining these properties but no longer out of sportsmen's dollars.

Heritage Fund Program Makes A Wildlife Difference

For more than 20 years, the Heritage Fund has made a difference not just to wildlife conservation efforts, but also to the state's economy, public access, environmental education and outdoor recreation

Passed by voters as a ballot initiative in 1990 by a 2-1 ratio, the fund provides up to \$10 million each year from Arizona lottery proceeds to the Arizona Game and Fish Department for the conservation and protection of the state's wildlife and natu-

Protect, Provide, Educate

The Heritage Fund is used to protect endangered species, acquire habitat for the benefit of sensitive species, provide access to outdoor recreational opportunities, and educate children and adults about wildlife

Because the department receives no state tax dollars to cover its operating budget, the Heritage Fund is critical to recovering or sustaining Arizona's unique native wildlife and to managing more than 800 species. The fund's impact is multiplied through its use as a match for federal dollars.

Heritage Success Stories

The Heritage Fund has contributed to some significant and nationally-recognized wildlife conservation success stories. Notable accomplishments of the department's Heritage dollars over the past two decades include the following:

covered to a point that the species has been downlisted from endangered to threatened, and limited fishing opportunities are allowed.

· Research has identified critical wildlife corridors to be considered in future construction of the state's roadways to help maintain pathways for wildlife to move to seasonal foraging grounds and prevent populations from becoming isolated. This research has also aided in introducing measures to decrease wildlifevehicle collisions on Arizona's roads.

• Heritage funding contributed to the acquisition of nearly 18,000 acres for public enjoyment and wildlife conservation, and establishment of the Becker Lake Wildlife Area (Apache County), Whitewater Draw Wildlife Area (Cochise County), Verde River Wildlife Area (Yavapai County), and Quigley Wildlife Area (Yuma County) for habitat conservation and species recovery programs.

 Barrier-free fishing piers have been constructed at Woodland, Mittry, Patagonia, Kaibab, Riggs and Rose Canyon

 Schoolyard habitat projects have been awarded the "Governor's Pride" and Westmarc's "Best of the West" awards.

• The Arizona Quality Alliance recognized the Urban Fish Stocking program with its Showcase in Excellence award for its efforts to provide urban recreational opportunities to the public.

Heritage Grants

The Heritage grants are supported by revenue from Arizona Lottery sales and are available to projects that focus on wildlife, including wildlife education, schoolyard habitats and wildlife conservation efforts.

In addition, there is a grant category geared towards helping schools fund field trips that take students outside to learn about wildlife and outdoor recreation.

Potential grant recipients must have a project that is either located in Arizona or involves research in which the wildlife or its habitat is located in Arizona.

I remember when my granddaughters were in grade school and I volunteered in the cafeteria. They would give the kids these little plastic sporks to eat with that were basically useless.



· BoatUS is the first organization to fight for legislation on behalf of boaters, shaping national boating policy when Schwartz helps draft the watershed Federal Boat Safety Act of 1971 creating the US Coast Guard Office of Boating Safety. He also secured passage of the Recreational Boating Safety and Facilities Improvement Act of 1979 – also known as the Biaggi Bill - which affirmed that taxes and fees paid by boaters should sup-

port boating programs.
• The BoatUS Marine Insurance program starts in 1967 offering the first recreational boat policy in clear, understandable language rather than the unintelligible, centuries-old lan-

guage from Lloyd's of London.

• BoatUS creates the only Consumer Protection Bureau (1970) for boaters to seek redress with manufacturers, suppliers or businesses as well as a Dispute Mediation Program. BoatUS Reports, the association's early member newsletter, eventually grows to become BoatUS Magazine, the largest boating magazine country with over half a million cir-

After two years of BoatUS lobbying efforts, in 1980 President Carter signs the Recreational Boating Safety and Facilities Improvement Act, authorizing \$60 million in boating fuel taxes to be spent on boating safety programs and boating facilities im-

provements over the next three years.
• In 1982 BoatUS leads the successful fight to repeal the Federal Boat "User Fee" Tax, saving boaters up to \$600 annually.

• As a result of the U.S. Coast

Guard's no longer offering nonemergency assistance to boaters where towboat companies existed, the BoatUS Insurance policy becomes the first in the nation to feature on water towing coverage to its insureds.

• Also in 1983, the first BoatUS

Catastrophe Team is established to assist the Houston Yacht Club following the disastrous landfall of Hurricane Alicia. Comprised of expert marine surveyors, claims adjusters and heavy equipment operators, in subsequent years the team becomes the 'gold standard" for service to insured boaters after storm-related disasters. As a result of what it learns, BoatUS sets course to become the nation's expert at hurricane damage avoidance for boats and marinas, offering free preparation materials for boat and

yacht clubs, marinas and boatyards.

• In 1984, Schwartz is widely credited in leading the passage of the federal Wallop/Breaux Trust Fund Amendment, today part of the Sport Fish Restoration and Boating Trust Fund that now returns over \$600 million annually to federal and state boating and fishing programs.

BoatUS was an early pioneer in discount marine retailing, starting with a single product – a floating flashlight – eventually opening a nationwide chain of 62 BoatUS retail stores and catalog. The retail division was sold to West Marine in 2003.


Few Know About The West At This Time

- · Already a major influence on the national boating-safety stage, in 2000 the BoatUS Foundation and the BoatUS Clean Water Trust merge to become the nonprofit 501(c)(3) BoatUS Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water, which runs innovative programs rang-ing from the only free Online Boating Safety Course and nationwide Life Jacket Loaner Program for Kids to the Help Stop the Drops marina spill-prevention program and EPIRB rental program for offshore passages.
- Long before there was publicly available data on the causes of insurance claims, BoatUS develops the only recreational boat Damage Avoidance Program and publication to help BoatUS members avoid claims and injuries, Seaworthy. BoatUS insurance programs

today total over \$8 billion in hull value.

- · BoatUS acquires Vessel Assist Association of America in 2003, the largest on water towing fleet on the Pacific Coast. 


