NSBC Shares Vital Tips On Boating Safely

The National Safe Boating Council would like to remind you to "Boat Responsibly and Wear It!" "Boat Responsibly" by being alert and careful when taking out your boat, making sure you are prepared and always remember to "Wear It"! Wear your life jacket every time you are on the water. An accident can happen very quickly and unexpectedly so you

must be geared up in order to help yourself and your passengers on board.

Develop The Life Jacket Habit

According to the most recent U.S. Coast Guard statistics, over two-thirds of fatal accident victims drowned. Out of those who drowned, approximately 90 percent were not

wearing a life jacket. There are so many different types of life jackets today that are smaller and more comfortable; it's much easier to "Wear It!" at all times. Life jackets are part of the gear stylish and knowledgeable boaters wear. Be a role model! Develop the

I'm Your Life Jacket, But You Don't Know Me

I'm your life jacket, but you don't know me. I'm here to help you, maybe even safe your life – but only if you're willing to take the help. Maybe National Safe Boating Week (May 17-23) will help remind everyone that I'm here for you?

You Hide Me

You think you may know me, but you really don't. Because the law says you have to keep me aboard your boat, you think you're safe. But, you put me in places so hard to find, under piles of junk or buried in lockers so deep that no one will ever know who I am, especially if something happens to you, or if something bad happens very fast, as most accidents do.

Of all of the fatal boating accident victims who drowned, almost 85 percent weren't wearing a life jacket. I wish I had gotten to know that 85 percent. I'll bet their families do, too.

I'm Still In The Package

You've never taken me out of my new packaging, or let me meet your family or friends. You barely even talk about me. Everyone knows where to find the fishing rods, the cooler full of drinks, or the sunscreen. But me? Hardly anyone knows I exist.



WHY NOT? — Where are your boat's life jackets? Can you get to them quickly? Better still, why don't you just "WEAR IT!"?

About the only time you talk about me is when you take little boating guests aboard. You put my large adult-size on a small child, thinking I'll keep them safe. But sadly, all those little guys have to



SUPERSTITION SEARCH & RESCUE

'Smile, You're On Camera' — Not Candid, But *Eagle* 1

Superstition Search & Rescue (SSAR) uses its remote controlled quad-copter Eagle 1 to search the remote canyons and locate the wreckage. Team members fol-low with blue paint to mark the wreck and establish the GPS coordinates.

Imagine that you have just taken a spill in one of the out-of-the-way canyons in the Superstitions. It wasn't a serious fall, but you have twisted your ankle and it's very painful to walk let alone climb out. Hours have gone by when you hear the insistent sound of a swarm of insects and look up to see a hovering high-tech quad-copter.

Smile! You're on camera, and help is on the way. Superstition Search and Rescue (SSAR), a local volunteer rescue group, has added a new tool to help them in their efforts to locate and rescue lost or injured hikers.

Tremendous Benefit

Eagle 1, SSAR's Matrix quad-copter, is an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) they recently purchased and are now putting through its paces to see how best to use it. It consists of a technologically advanced system that includes a gimbal-mounted video camera on a remote-controlled heli-- along with a control unit and a copter monitor that shows a live feed from the copter.

The UAV has wireless connections to six Global Positioning System (GPS) satellites. The monitor displays a high resolution video feed plus grid coordinates of where it is and where the ground-based pilot wants it to go.

The battery-powered helicopter can be controlled from 200 yards away during a 25-minute flight time. The benefit to both the search team and those who are lost or in trouble is tremendous

time savings. Robert Cooper, director of urban searches at SSAR, said that the system can give accurate directions to help find the person who is lost.

SSAR has had their eye on the system for a long time. "We have been hosting fundraisers and applying for grants because UAV systems used to cost \$20,000, but the technology is going up and the

prices are coming down," Cooper said. We ended up paying just \$5,000 for the best system, with all of the upgrades." Cooper added that it also came with a hat.



EXCERPT FROM EARLY MAY AZGFD'S FISHING REPORT Get Ready For Possible Brown Trout Bonanza

Tip Of The Week

Hello, Anglers:

Top-water lovers should consider setting up a variety of fishing rods with different plugs so that when the action is heated, you'll be better prepared for what they're biting.

Binoculars can be used to spot boils. Boat to the side of a boil and, if possible, cast past a boil and work the lure back through it.

The Reel Deal

Brown TroutThey often flop from the water, or twist and tangle line. Clever and elusive, brown trout are one of the state's top sport fish to target. And, they taste great.

Get ready for a possible brown trout

bonanza at Lynx Lake. For the first since 2012, 742 brown trout were stocked the week of May 5. Get out to the Prescott area and try spinners and flies as well as your trout bait of choice.

Browns rely heavily on insect larvae

and pupae, both nymphs and adults. So fly fishing is a great option. Try a No. 18 or 20 wooly bugger about 4 feet under a float with 4-pound test line.

Another option for brown trout is the Greer lakes. One angler (below) reported catching a few large browns to 6 pounds out of the lakes in late March. We also have stocked Perkins Tank in Flagstaff with browns

Bass

Bass spawning activity varies across the state, although most bass seem to be in post-spawn. At Roosevelt Lake, however, the spawn is in full swing, and many spawning fish can be seen in shallow

Because most bass are in the post spawn now, they'll be feeding aggressively. So top-water action is picking up statewide. When fish are out chasing bait in the morning, anglers can throw topwater baits, swim baits, even your chuggers, poppers and stick baits. At the right place and time, anglers can set personal

Rainbow Trout

Okay, back to rainbow trout real quick. Some excellent news for Arizona anglers who fish the Colorado River in the Willow Beach-Bullhead City area — trout stockings are coming back!

This has been one of the heaviest stocking periods of the year in terms of numbers

Show Low (Pinetop): Fools Hollow Lake, Rainbow Lake, Show Low Lake, Silver Creek

Spring Fishing Is At Its Best

May is here and water temperature is in the 60s which means spring fishing is at its best. Cold fronts will still slow down catching for a day or two but on

most days fishing will be excellent. Here is the room service menu for spring fishing in order of availability.

Striped Bass

Bait fishing along the canyon walls is good in the normal spots. Spots close to the marinas will provide good catches for those looking for a good, close fishing trip. But, the results are sometimes long awaited and time spent at the Dam or on Moki Wall could actually have been more productive in another spot.

My recommendation for better fishing results is to head to the back of the major canyons where water clarity is reduced by runoff and waves. Begin fishing where water color changes from clear to green or murky where bottom depth is 35 feet or less. Troll to locate scattered stripers with crankbaits that run at 12-20 feet. Watch the graph for schools and fish

Hooking a fish is just the beginning of the adventure. The first fish marks a productive location where other stripers can quickly be caught by casting around the boat with crankbaits and by dropping spoons to the bottom. Other stripers fol-low the hooked fish and come in range while the first fish is landed.

After 10 minutes of casting without further results, continue trolling to locate a new aggregation. Stripers are feeding on plankton in the upper 20 feet of the water column and are more than willing to eat a fish (crankbait) that swims into their personal space.

HINT: Striped bass fishing is "on fire" during the first hour of daylight right now! Be out there when the sky lightens in the East and before the sun

Walleye

This is walleye month and they are the second most common fish to catch. Choose muddy to murky water in the backs of canyons where bottom depth is 7-25 feet. Walleye like to hang near structure such as a rocky point or hump where they can wait to ambush a forage fish that swims in range.
Techniques include slow trolling with

flat line, bottom bouncing with live worm or jigging with plastic tubes and grubs. The common theme is to put the lure or bait on bottom and slowly move it along until walleye find it. These light-sensitive fish are best caught in low light early or late in the day

They feed all day long with water temperatures in the 60s so fish on the shady side of a rock or under a mudline caused by wind or wave action.

HINT: Live warms attached to plastic grubs increase catch rate.

Smallmouth Bass

Some bass have spawned once but with this springs' sporadic weather the main spawn will happen this week. Fish clear water to sight fish for bass on nests. It is more difficult to see fish now with water level increasing but bass on beds can be located and caught. If a bedding fish won't bite because the boat got too close the first time, just mark the spot and return an hour later and throw a long cast to complete the task.



AN ADVENTURE — Dan Kennedy, Spanish Fork, Utah, found good crappie fishing near Bullfrog by searching the floating tumbleweeds in the backs of canyons. Brush is out of the water until the lake comes up more so for now look for floating cover to find both crappie and largemouth bass. Finding fish in Lake Powell is always an incredible adventure.

Crappie

Crappie and largemouth bass are searching for cover for spawning and habitation. A bumper crop of tumbleweeds were blown into the lake this spring. Now, with rising water the weeds are submerged and provide the needed

Find the huge floating tumbleweed mats and fish under and along the edges for the brush loving fish. These mats of floating weeds may provide the nasty cover necessary for the 2014 crop of bass

Ponds stocked include Bonsall (Glendale), Discovery and McQueen (Gilbert), Pacana (Maricopa), four Yuma waters (Redondo Lake, Fortuna Lake, West Wetland Pond, and Council Ave. Pond), Roadrunner and Granada (Phoenix), and Eldorado (Scottsdale).

Catfish stockings will continue in all CFP waters through mid-June. Grab your fishing poles and catch a feisty catfish!

Turn In Poachers

We need your help in catching poachers. Fishing without a license and taking too many fish are common violations. This interferes with our ability to manage fishing lakes and reduces your opportunities to catch fish.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department's Operation Game Thief is an antipoaching program that encourages the public to report any suspicious activity or knowledge about a poaching violation.

A toll-free hotline is available 24 hours



a day, seven days a week at 1-800-352-0700. The information also can be reported on the Department's Web site (www.azgfd.gov). Your report can remain confidential upon request, and rewards of up to \$8,000 are available for information leading to an arrest.

Gilbert To Propose Catch-And-Release For Water Ranch

The town of Gilbert is evaluating a proposal to modify Water Ranch Lake at the Riparian Preserve into a Catch-And-Release lake. As part of the town's proposal, new catch-and-keep fishing opportunities are being proposed at Freestone park in addition to the newly added CFP ponds of McQueen and Discovery parks.

Thus far, there have been two public

Thus far, there have been two public meetings convened on March 19th and March 22nd, and many comments have been received on both sides of the issue.

The tentative date for discussion by the Town Council is set for Thursday, May 15 at 50 E Civic Center Dr Gilbert, AZ 85296.

If the proposal is approved by Town Council, new regulations would need to be approved by The Arizona Game and Fish Department Commission at the September 2014 meeting. Public comments will be solicited during that process as well.

Trout Stockings To Resume At Willow Beach Hatchery

The Arizona Game and Fish Department, in cooperation with Mohave County and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), succeeded on April 22 in creating a short-term solution to provide recreational fishing opportunities this fall in the Willow Beach-Bullhead City area.

Arizona Game and Fish will be providing some 21,000 juvenile rainbow trout to be reared and stocked through the Willow Beach National Fish Hatchery, which is located along the Colorado River south of the See TROUT on page 14

hunt permit-tag issued through the drawing process for deer, fall turkey, fall javelina, bighorn sheep, fall buffalo and pheasant. (The drawing process for elk and pronghorn antelope occurred earlier this year.)

At this point, paper applications may be submitted by U.S. mail to Arizona Game and Fish Department, Attn: Drawing Section, P.O. Box 74020, Phoenix, AZ 85087-1052, or hand-delivered to



any Game and Fish office. The online application service for this draw is expected to be available until mid-May.

The deadline to apply is Tuesday, June 10 by 7 p.m. (MST). For those mailing a paper application, remember that applications must be received by the department by the deadline. Postmarks do not count.

The printed 2014-15 Arizona Hunting Regulations booklets are available at department offices and at license dealers statewide.

Please note that the trapping seasons, rules and regulations are no longer a part of the annual Arizona Hunting Regulations booklet. The department will produce a separate Trapping Regulations pamphlet that will be available in the summer of 2014. 

Public Can Provide Input On Grand Canyon Bison Management

The Arizona Game and Fish Department is making constituents aware of the opportunity to provide input regarding bison management at Grand Canyon National Park

The National Park Service (NPS) has initiated a public scoping process for a bison management plan and environmen-tal impact statement (EIS) for Grand Canyon National Park pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act. The NPS is working closely with the U.S. Forest Service and the Arizona Game and Fish Department on this effort. View background information.

Background Information

In 1906, Charles "Buffalo" Jones brought bison to Northern Arizona and bred them with cattle in an attempt to create a superior, more robust breed of live-stock, the "cattalo." While this effort proved unsuccessful, descendants of these bison have been managed since 1950 by the state of Arizona in the House Rock Wildlife Area (HRWA) on the Kaibab National Forest, through an interagency agreement with the U.S. Forest Service (USFS) and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

For the next 40 years, the bison herd remained largely confined to the HRWA. However, during the late 1990s, the bison began "pioneering" up to the top of the Kaibab Plateau and into Grand Canyon National Park (GCNP).



Grand Canyon

Over the last several years, few bison have returned to HRWA, and most now spend a majority of their time inside the park, with many not leaving the park at all.

Guided By Their Mission

Guided by their mission and the Department of the Interior Bison Conservation Initiative (2008), the National Park Service seeks to work with partners to conserve and manage bison as wildlife. Where bison are found on NPS lands, they are managed as needed to ensure other re-

sources and values are protected.

In the case of Grand Canyon National Park, the current movement, distribution, and abundance of bison creates concerns for other park resources such as soils, vegetation, archeological sites, and water resources. Additionally, the current situation precludes the Arizona Game and Fish Department (AGFD) from providing bison hunting opportunities outside the park and meeting the bison management goals of the state and the USFS.

Hence, A Plan

As a result, the National Park Service intends to prepare a bison management plan and environmental impact statement (plan/EIS) for Grand Canyon National Park. The USFS, AGFD, and BLM are all participating as formal cooperating agen-

Ultimately, the action the NPS selects for implementation will provide the basis for Grand Canyon National Park's participation in a long-term, interagency approach to managing bison on NPS and USFS lands that meets the various mandates of each agency.

Public scoping for this plan/EIS in late April has solicited early input from stakeholders. The continuing scoping process will provide the public and other interested parties the opportunity to participate early in identifying the range of issues to be considered when the NPS studies the potential environmental impacts of managing bison in the park; to identify topics and concerns that should be addressed in the EIS, and to bring forward any new information that NPS may not be aware of that would be useful in preparing the plan and EIS.

Fire Restrictions In Effect At Arizona Game and Fish Department Wildlife Areas

The Arizona Game and Fish Department implemented Stage 1 fire restrictions at all department wildlife areas on April 18. The restrictions are part of the restrictions issued by the Arizona State Forestry Division on state-owned and state-man-aged lands outside incorporated municipalities due to the increased risk of wildfire in the state.

Stage 1 restrictions mean that no open fires are allowed — including campfires and wood or charcoal-burning stoves and barbecues. Smoking is prohibited except within an enclosed vehicle or building or developed recreation site. Welding or operating acetylene or other torch devices with open flames is prohibited, as are fire-

"Implementing fire restrictions will reduce the threat of wildfire to communities and to natural re-sources; Arizona residents can do their part in preventing human-caused fires by following the fire restrictions guidelines for state-owned and state-managed lands."



Homolovi State Park Is Temporarily Closed


Homolovi State Park is closed temporarily until May 28 for road construction and improvement work by Arizona State Parks



age Springs Fish Hatchery is a won-derful destination for a day trip that's right, the Fish Hatchery is a destination! For starters, it's free. Kids will love it because there is a trail that meanders along the creek, plus there is a picnic area where you can have some lunch and something cool to drink while the kids look at all the fish in the tanks.

Speaking of kids, be sure to bring some quarters so the kids can feed the big trout in the show pond. It's even fun for grownups - get a quarter's worth of fish chow from the machine and have fun watching the enormous trout come up to grab it. They are definitely not shy.

See How Trout Are Raised

There is ample parking at the Hatchery, and a small exhibit building where you can learn about the area and the hatchery and see replicas of Arizona's state-record fish. Then you're free to wander around in a self-guided tour that allows you access to some of the fish tanks, where you can see how the trout are raised.

The PSH Trail is a gentle loop that winds around the old pond locations and follows the creek for a good little bit. It's a beautiful trail that keeps to the shade for the most part, and it's a famous spot for bird watchers. Bring your camera and your binoculars

Nice Trail At Bubbling Springs Less than half a mile down the road is

Bubbling Ponds Hatchery, and there is a very nice trail there, too. In fact, you can walk from one area to the other - in total, the trails only come to about a mile and half, and all of it is nice and smooth. It's more of a walk than a hike, actually, but still really cool because of the way the trees and shrubs bend over to form a tunnel over parts of the trail.

This is another really good birding area, but neither place is crowded most of the time. When we were there in spring we only saw one other group — a family with small kids who were having a blast playing on the trails and looking at the ducks and fish.

The Hatchery is open 8 a.m.-4 p.m. every day except Christmas and Thanksgiving. There is no camping, but you can find plenty down the road at Dead Horse Ranch State Park (more about that next month!).

To get to the Hatchery, you take Page Springs Road off highway 89A or the Cornville Road. If you're not going to picnic at the hatchery, you've got to try the Manzanita Restaurant in Cornville. They've got the most delicious German food, and they are even vegan-friendly! They are on the list of the 101 greatest places to eat in Arizona, and it's easy to see why. Check them out on themanzanitarestaurant.com.

Colorful Beauty At Red Rock State Park

North of the Hatchery is Red Rock State Park, which also offers many nice hiking trails. There is a visitor center with

a gift shop and a theater where you can see a beautiful film about Arizona.

The turn-off to the park is north of Page Springs Road off 89A. At 10 a.m. each day, there is a guided hike that takes about an hour and a half to two hours, and at 2 p.m. there is an activity with a ranger or a guest speaker that may be inside or outside, and lasts about 45 minutes.

There's a great trail that loops around from the visitor center down to the creek then back again. It's wide and smooth and you'll get to see gorgeous red-rock formations, water, and a couple of cool bridges. Red Rock State Park is open seven days a week from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m., with the last entry at 4:30 p.m.

Get There Early

The Visitor Center is open 9 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. daily. No pets are allowed in the park. Entry fees are \$5 for 14+, \$3 for 7-13, and children 6 and under are free.

Life Jacket habit!

Know the Navigation Rules (Nautical Rules of the Road)

Knowing the nautical rules of the road is important for all boaters. Knowing what to do when meeting, crossing or overtaking another boat can prevent costly damage to your boat, personal injury or even loss of life. Whenever you believe there is a threat of collision you should slow down, stop or steer away from the situation in question. Maintaining a proper lookout and a safe speed are all a part of the navigation rules and should be an important part of boat op-

Stay Sober While Boating

's dangerous to operate a boat when drinking. Operating a boat under the influence of alcohol or drugs is illegal in all states and is a violation of Federal law. An

operator with a blood alcohol content about .08 (equivalent to consuming five beers in one hour for the average 180-lb. male) - is ten times more likely to die in a boating accident than an operator with zero blood-alcohol level.

Be Aware Of Carbon Monoxide

All boat engines produce Carbon Monoxide (CO)—an odorless, colorless, poisonous gas that can kill you in a matter of minutes. Boaters are killed every year because of improper cabin ventilation, poorly maintained equipment, and careless behavior. You do not have to be inside the boat to be at risk. Boaters have died from exposure on the swim platforms of their boats and in other areas where CO exhaust may accumulate or be emitted. Be aware of the early symptoms (irritated eyes, headache, nausea, weakness, and dizziness). Use CO detectors on your boat and stay off the swim platform when the engine (or generators) are running.



TROUT

A Huge Win

"This is a huge win for anglers in Arizona and Mohave County," said Chris Cantrell, fisheries chief for Game and Fish. 'This will have a positive impact on all Arizona anglers, particularly from Willow Beach south to the Bullhead City area."

On Nov. 21, 2013, the hatchery, operated by the USFWS, conducted an emergency stocking of 11,000 rainbow trout when the low water level made it impossible to draw water. The hatchery, however, lost 20,000 fish due to a lack of water movement through the system. Since then, the hatchery has been unable to rear or stock sport fish.

Working Toward Long-Term Solution

Despite the hatchery's pipeline and in-frastructure damages, this solution will allow for short-term angling opportunities. Meanwhile, Game and Fish, USFWS and Mohave County will continue to work toward a long-term solution to supply trout to Arizona waters for recreational fishing opportunities

Added Stewart Jacks, USFWS fisheries and aquatic conservation assistant regional director: "These are challenging times, but this is a great example of people working together to come up with a solution.

That includes those working at the hatchery. They are 'boots on the ground' every day - no matter what's thrown at them, they come back looking for a solution with professionalism and dedication.

AZGFD Remains Opposed

The Arizona Game and Fish Commission remains opposed to a reprioritization of National Fish Hatcheries by USFWS and will continue to work towards ensuring that the USFWS fulfills its commitment to support sportfishing in Arizona and across the






