Designate A Sober Mate Or Captain

A boat operator with a blood alcohol concentration above .10 percent is estimated to be more than 10 times as likely to die in a boating accident than an operator with zero blood alcohol concentration.

It is illegal to operate a boat while under the influence of alcohol

BUI laws pertain to ALL boats from canoes and rowboats to the largest ships.

Alcohol can impair a boater's judgment, balance, vision, and reaction time. It can increase fatigue and susceptibility to the effects of cold-water immersion.

Sun, wind, noise, vibration, and motion -"stressors" common to the boating environment — intensify the side effects of alcohol, drugs, and some medications.

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. - The Northern Arizona women's swimming and diving team will participated in "Relay For Life of NAU" early last month in the Walkup Skydome.

The event is an initiative by the American Cancer Society to aid in cancer research, education, advocacy, and service. Swimming and diving is one of 75 teams that stayed overnight in the Skydome in an effort to contribute to the cause.

The American Cancer Society Relay For

Life is an event that gives community members across the globe a chance to celebrate the lives of people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and fight back against the disease.

At Relay For Life, teams "camped out" at the Skydome and took turns walking or running around the track, with each team asked to have a representative on the track at all times. Relay For Life is a 24-hour event that aids in the fights against cancer and shows a continued commitment to battling the disease "because cancer never sleeps."

"Relay for Life is a good opportunity to give back because many of our lives in some way have been touched by cancer," said jun-ior swimmer Meredith Egloria. Superstition Search & Rescue (SSAR) is a private volunteer service organization dedicated to wilderness and urban search and rescue in Arizona. This non-profit rescue team was originally formed in 1981 as Apache Junction Search and Rescue. In 1994, we incorporated and changed our name to Superstition Wilderness Rescue, Inc. and later changed the name again to Superstition Search & Rescue.

The primary purpose of this volunteer organization is to assist individuals who may experience wilderness-related problems. These range from incidents such as falls or medical emergencies, lost or overdue hikers, heat or cold exposure, and more. Our group is highly skilled in wilderness first-aid, technical rescue, orienteering and tracking. These skills enable Superstition Search & Rescue members to safely and

efficiently move patients from the field to appropriate medical service in the event of injury, or to their families, in the case of a lost or overdue hiker. We currently have approximately 25 volunteers who sacrifice their time and personal resources to assist those in need. We are always looking for more people.

Superstition Search & Rescue derived its name from the beautiful Superstition Mountains and Wilderness Area located in northwestern Pinal County, and the far northeast portion of Maricopa County. The mountains con-

sist of over 160,000 acres of rough and beautiful terrain and are separated from the Mazatzal Mountains to the north by the Salt River and its numerous lakes.

Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas that is very toxic even in small quantities. It is produced when a carbon-based fuel. such as a gasoline or diesel, is burned. Cooking ranges, heaters, and charcoal grills produce carbon monoxide also.

Carbon Monoxide Kills!

- Carbon monoxide disperses feely through the air and will travel readily throughout a boat.
- Carbon monoxide discharged as engine, generator, or appliance exhaust may re-enter your boat through any opening.
- ◆ By keeping a steady flow of fresh air moving through your boat, you will eliminate much, if not all, of the hazard. The danger comes when there are pockets of stagnant air loaded with carbon monoxide that are not flushed from your boat.
- ◆ When operating any type of watercraft, be careful running downwind because exhaust gases may blow back on board.
- ◆ The best prevention for carbon monoxide poisoning is knowing that carbon monoxide exists
- Everyone should know the symptoms and treatments of carbon monoxide poisoning.
- ◆ A marine-type carbon monoxide detector will sound an alarm when the gases reach an unacceptable level.

Symptoms of Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

One or more of the following symptoms may signal the adverse effects of carbon monoxide accumulations:


- Throbbing temples
- ◆ Inattentiveness or lack of concentration
- ◆ Inability to think coherently
- Ringing in the ears
- Tightness across the chest
- Headache, drowsiness, nausea, dizziness, fatigue, vomiting, collapse, and convulsions

- Impairment can be even more dangerous for boaters than for drivers, since most boaters have less experience and confidence operating a boat than they do driving a car. Boaters average only about 110 hours of boating per year.
- Alcohol is dangerous for passengers, too. Intoxication can cause slips, falls overboard, and other dangerous accidents.

More Answers, More Questions

Last month we asked the following

1. What is the most common cause of accidental deaths of fishermen? Drowning.

Turns out that most fishermen are involved in the sport of fishing and they do not have on a life jacket, are in a boat that has low freeboard and are in areas that do not have a lot of boat traffic. In many cases, the senses are very low to the dan-gers of falling in. Then it happens and without either a life jacket or help, the victim is usually in trouble

2. What is a float plan? A vital safety document.

A float plan is a document that should be given to a responsible person. It needs to provide the information that a search party should need to go looking for you. This is your ticket that will start a search for you immediately.

Next Questions

So you plan to go out in a small boat or do some rafting. First, remember that these are small boats but are governed by all of the national and local laws pertaining to your size of watercraft. These craft are normally not under mechanical power so

- 1. What are some of the basic safety items that you need to carry?
- 2. Which basic safety items do you need to carry on board?
- 3. What should you be on the lookout

Small craft boating and rafting are fun and may be enjoyed to the fullest; however, they are not exempt from safety sensibility. At the end of the day we would like you to come home safe and sound to go again another day.

There are two major events on May 22 this year that stress safety on the water: the seventh annual Arizona Safe Boating Celebration Saturday, May 22, 8 a.m.-12 p.m. at Lake Pleasant Regional Park and Colorado River's Tri-State (Arizona, California, and Nevada) Boating Safety Fair, also on Saturday, May 22, 10 a.m.-2 p.m. at London Bridge Beach, Lake Havasu City. Arizona Boating & Watersports/Western Outdoor Times news magazine urges all who recreate on/in/near the water to wear their life jackets all year long.

Tri-Boating Safety Fair: It's All About Life Jackets!

Officials to emphasize wearing life jackets at safety fair May 22.

LAS VEGAS - Wearing a life jacket is the overriding message of this year's Colorado River Tri-State Boating Safety Fair. Families will be given the opportunity to bring in their outgrown or unssafe life jacket to trade in for a brand new one (while supplies last).

"The stats are clear that four out of five people who die on boats would probably live if they just wore a life jacket. That sta-tistic is both depressing and unaccept-able," said David Pfiffner, Nevada's boating law administrator. "The four fatal accidents we worked in Nevada section of the Colorado River last year could have all been prevented by the use of life jackets, and we're committed to moving the needle on this grim statistic.

The sixth annual event will be held May 22 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at London Bridge Beach Park, McCulloch Road, Lake Havasu City, Ariz. In addition to the life jacket trade-in, courtesy vessel safety checks will be offered to make sure that boats are ready for the 2010 boating season, boating safety bags full of safe boat-ing information will be distributed at twenty-seven launch ramps along the river, and boating professionals will be on hand to answer any questions boaters may have.

The Tri-State Boating Safety Fair is a one-day event, but the campaign will continue distributing boating safety messages to boaters through an online awareness campaign throughout the summer until Labor Day weekend via the campaign Web

site www.BoatColoradoRiver.com.
"More boating accidents occur on this river than any single waterway in the U.S. and more than the total accidents for most states," said California Department of Boating and Waterway's Acting Director Lucia Becerra. "Boating on the Colorado River can be a fun, safe and enjoyable activity, but boaters need to remember to wear a life jacket."

Some of the reasons people claim for not wearing life jackets include

- · It's too hot!
- · It doesn't look cool.
- I know how to swim. • Nothing is going to happen to me. The fact is that knowing how to swim

doesn't make anyone "drown proof." A number of fatalities on the Colorado River have included boaters who knew how to swim, were not wearing a life jacket, were under the influence of alcohol, went over-

Warming Water Will Urge Bass, Crappie Back On Nests

By Wayne Gustaveson

Cold, windy weather stalled much of the expected spawning activity at the beginning of May. Runoff slowed, allowing the lake to rise only one foot in a week. Surface water temperature has been in the mid 50s most mornings. But, that is now history and a new warming trend is developing.

The modest rise in lake elevation means that clear water still exists in the main and southern lake. Backs of canyons and coves still offer the opportunity to sight fish for spawning bass and crappie.

At the inflow areas, the mudline extends from Hite to Good Hope Bay. In the San Juan and Escalante, cloudy muddy water is only a moderate threat in the last few miles nearest running water.

One Last Spawning

New warming will increase water temperature back into the 60s and make it unlikely that a return to the 50s will happen. That will allow bass and crappie to move back on nests for one final spawning event.

Nests will be found at depths of 5 to 8 feet, making them visible in many locations. Lures and techniques that have been working for the past month will still be very effective.

Smallmouth bass like plastic grubs and tubes fished on rocky points. Largemouth and crappie will be in the tree line and susceptible to slow-sinking, weedless-rigged plastic double-tail grubs and senkos.

Spinner baits work well for both species. Bass like the big flashy blades while crappie are suckers for little spinners like Roadrunners. The old standard char-

treuse marabou crappie jig is still a winner. Enjoy bass and crappie fishing a little longer before the runoff heats up and the nests get lost in rising water.

nests get lost in rising water.
Walleye fishing is nearing its peak.
Don't expect to catch daily limits of the
tasty food fish but a few can now be
caught while fishing for bass. It is possible
to troll crank baits or drag worm harnesses
along the bottom for walleye.

Use afternoon wind-induced mudlines as one key to find productive spots. Main channel points, plunging into deep water, are a good place to start.

Striped bass are forming large schools in almost every canyon as they prepare to spawn. The spawning trigger is a rapid rise in lake temperature. Unfortunately, the prespawn period is about the only time that stripers are off feed and difficult to catch.

React To The Event

Big schools have been seen cruising the shallows but attempts to catch them have been ignored. There are isolated events like windy feeding opportunities or fleeing shad schools that will ignite the large schools into a feeding frenzy. Be aware of

Spring Fishing Looks Good

The giant Saguaros are blooming – it's post-spawn topwater time in the desert lakes, plus most mountain lakes are open.

And, if the weather reports are right, we'll have some warmer days without the wind blowing. We'll see.

There should be a large contingent of post-spawn largemouth bass aggressively feeding, even though there are some bass still on beds.

At many desert lakes threadfin shad are spawning. This is a good time to downsize your shad-like baits. Fly anglers may want to keep this in mind and use smaller min-now-like flies for sport-fish such as largemouth bass and stripers.

Small drop shots right now can be deadly at times. Small shad-colored jigs might work as well - think morning dawn color for both.

The wind has made fishing challenging at times. Let's hope the blustery part of



Nights Are Warming

There are warmer temperatures now at night. This makes it a superb time to fish at night under submersible lights for crappie, bass, and channel catfish. Try live shad, live minnows, jigs, spoons and crankbaits. Even spinner baits can work at

It's also a good time to fish from shore at night for bottom feeders. Chum liberally with corn for catfish and carp.

Striper fishing at night can also work well, especially using frozen anchovies, sardines and squid as bait. Be sure to chum. Also try mixing in some corn with your chum — anytime you create a feeding frenzy, stripers and other large aquatic predators can be attracted.

In The High Country
In the high country, all but three lakes
— Lee Valley, Bear Canyon and Knoll are now accessible. That's the good news. Riggs Flat in the Pinaleno Mountains is not open yet either. That's to be expected.

The stores and boat rentals at both Big Lake and Woods Canyon are open. That's also good news.

The bad news is that it appears Carnero Crescent and Lee Valley suffered fish kills; price to pay for such excellent snow pack. We'll get them stocked soon.

All the creeks along the Mogollon Rim are receiving weekly stockings. Christopher, Haigler, Canyon, Tonto and East Verde creek are all worth a visit. West Clear Creek and Wet Beaver Creek should be stocked this week. Oak Creek is being stocked weekly

White Mountain Creeks Still High

In the White Mountains, runoff is still making the creeks run a little high, but both the East and West Forks of Black River should be worth a visit for some larger holdover trout, especially browns.

Lower Lake Mary keeps getting





stocked with more and more trout. This lake is so loaded with foodstuffs that it can be difficult to catch rainbows on live bait, such as night crawlers, or prepared bait such as Power Bait. Try reaction baits, such as in-line spinners. The upside is these trout are going to grow fast and there is enough water to last through next spring and possibly beyond.



Take Home The Pike

We have also received recent reports of huge northern pike being caught at Ashurst. During our spring survey of Ashurst, we only netted on rainbow trout, but did get a lot of pike — with the dominant age class over 10 pounds.


Some anglers have complained about this fishing report being misleading – because they got skunked. I'll put it plainly
– don't expect high catch rates. In fact,
don't even expect to catch a single fish at Ashurst. You do stand a good chance of getting skunked. But, for those looking for a huge fish to possibly catch, you might get lucky here.


And yes, if you catch one, take it home with you. We'd like anglers to catch and keep all the pike they can at Ashurst to help this struggling trout fishery. Try spoons, spinners and trout-like swim baits.

AZGFD's Shooting-Range Program Aims To Meet Growing Demand

Public shooting ranges provide safe shooting environment, positive impact on local economies, and major funding source for wildlife conservation.

The demand for public shooting ranges in Arizona continues to increase at a pace to match recreational shooting demand and gun ownership, based on a March poll and recent report issued by the National Shooting Sports Foundation

The report identifies that in 2009, Arizona businesses related to the firearms and ammunition industry provided 5,234 jobs, up 25 percent from 2008; paid \$51 million in state taxes, up 221 percent, and contributed more than \$738 million into the state's economy, up 59 percent.

A March 2010 NSSF/Harris poll further supports the need for shooting ranges, identifying that 2.5 million more Americans nationally are target shooting

now than were six months earlier.

Additionally, 43 percent polled (representing nearly 98 million people) had some interest in trying shooting sports or

hunting.
"When the firearm industry and firearm ownership grows, so does the demand for a place to shoot, and that's where we come in," said Jay Cook, shooting ranges branch chief of the Arizona Game and Fish Department. "Our shooting range program is committed to assuring that the public has a safe, controlled, and convenient place to shoot their

Public shooting ranges provide more than a safe place to shoot; many of them are destinations and economic contributors to local communities.

"Recreational shooting has a positive impact on local communities in our state.



In addition to buying firearms and ammunition, shooters spend their hard-earned dollars at local businesses buying gas, food, refreshments, shooting supplies, lodging, dining and much more," added Cook. "Recreational shooting is good for business in Arizona.'

Shooters Fund Wildlife, **Shooting Programs**

The report also points out the industry paid \$450 million in federal excise taxes through the Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act, compared to \$327 million in 2008. These dollars collected through the purchases of certain equip-ment by sportsmen and women are appropriated back to state wildlife agencies for wildlife conservation, hunter education, and shooting programs

In 2009, the Arizona Game and Fish

Department's apportionment of these federal dollars was \$11 million.

Cook continued, "As an agency that doesn't receive any funding from the state's general tax fund, but rather operates on a user-pay, user-benefit business model, our primary sources of revenue are from license and tag sales, some range fees, and these federal appropriations."

In keeping with that entrepreneurial model, those revenues and others are used to continue to grow the department's cus-tomer base by offering expanded pro-grams and services — including shooting range development and outreach recruitment programs

In addition to providing a place to shoot, the Arizona Game and Fish Department knows education is key and offers an extensive line up of programs for beginning shooters as well as those looking to become more proficient, including:

Hunter education and firearm safety training — For more than 50 years the department has been teaching how to be safe with firearms, hunting and the outdoors.

Shooting range development - The Arizona Game and Fish Commission owns six shooting ranges and continues to identify areas that need a local range. **Grants to local ranges** — Grants are

made available to not-for-profit, public ranges for improvements, expansions, and developments.

Introductory shooting programs -Many shooting programs are available for air guns, archery, pistol, rifle and shotgun. There are programs for kids, women and families.

Team-sport-based programs Scholastic Clay Target Program (SCTP) and Archery in the Schools (AIS) are both national programs that have a strong presence in Arizona.

Shooting leagues and clinics -There are a number of shooting leagues to help shooters to hone their skills and move to the next level of competitive shooting.

Olympic training — The Arizona Game and Fish Department's Ben Avery Shooting Facility has hosted the USA Archery Olympic Team Trials, and the fa-cility's Clay Target Center is a certified USA Shooting Regional Training Center for Olympic shotgun shooting.

"However, as our state grows, and new developments encroach further into our public lands, it is paramount that we protect, preserve, and expand public shooting ranges and shooting programs for Arizona's citizens who enjoy this recreational activity," Cook concluded.

AZGFD Announces Report Re: Wildlife Ingestion Of Lead

The Arizona Game and Fish Department in February held focus groups on the effects of ingested lead from spent ammunition on wildlife. The report is available at www.azgfd.gov/lead.

To further communicate the department's existing voluntary lead-reduction program, the focus groups were held by D.J. Case and Associates, known for their expertise in communicating natural resources conservation, to access the knowledge, concern and opinions of five groups.

The department solicited 39 participants, including active hunters and other wildlife conservationists for the study. The focus groups were held in Phoenix, Payson and Tucson. Although anecdotal by nature, the report offers input and guidance on how the department will continue to communicate and engage the public on its existing voluntary program about lead and wildlife.

Program Began In 2003

The voluntary program began in 2003 to help in the recovery of the endangered California condor. In 2009, approximately 85 percent of the hunters in the condor region took voluntary lead reduction actions by ei-ther using non-lead ammunition or removing the carcass and entrails of harvested game from the field to prevent scavenging

game from the field to prevent scavenging by condors.

"The Arizona Game and Fish Department has no intentions to ban or regulate lead for hunting or angling use," said Director Larry Voyles. "However, this subject continues to gain increased attention by wildlife professionals, industry, academia, and citizens nationwide. As the state's wildlife agency and through the direction of the Commission, we have a responsibility to stay informed on this issue and commu-nicate accurate and factual information with

Effectively gathering the viewpoints and opinions from our constituents was important to help inform future planning needs for potential communications, educational outreach programs, or needs for further assessment

Voyles added, "One of the first steps in this long-term process is asking our cus-tomers what they think."

The Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies and the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies have identified "ingested lead and wildlife" as an important issue in wildlife management. As the state's wildlife management agency, Arizona Game and Fish has a responsibility to provide education on this issue and share this knowledge with our constituents.

The Next Step

The next step is to engage the public in a dialogue regarding ingested lead and wildlife, gather feedback from the public, and present the results to the Commission in late summer or early fall, 2010.

Fort Tuthill Military Museum Plans **New Displays**

FLAGSTAFF Ariz. — The 2nd annual Fort Tuthill Days will highlight the opening of the Fort Tuthill Military Museum's season

In addition to several new museum displays, visitors may view military reenactor units working and training in a replica WW II encampment. Units representing the US 501st Parachute Inf. Regt., British 30 Assault, German Leibstandarte Division Recon., U.S. 408th Bomb Group ground crew, and 426 Airborne Quartermaster Company, will provide visitors a look at weapons, equipment and vehicles used by their respective units during WW

The quartermaster company will operate a replica field kitchen preparing authentic Army meals for the re-enactor units.

The museum offers a wealth of information on the military history of Arizona's famous 158th Infantry Regiment, including Fort Tuthill's history as the regiment's training site prior to and after WW II. A scale model of the original facility depicting Fort Tuthill as it looked in the 1930s - complete with troops and vehicles — serves as the centerpiece of museum exhibits.

Displays trace the distinguished history of the 158th Infantry Regiment from its organization in 1865 as the 1st Regiment Arizona Volunteers to present day service of the 1st Battalion 158th Infantry. The story of this proud unit is illustrated with pictures, documents, three-dimensional displays and weapons.

Due to its outstanding combat record during World War II, the 158th Regimental Combat Team (Bushmasters) was selected to spearhead the invasion of Japan. An exhibit provides detailed information on the unit's proposed vital role in that invasion as well as Japanese plans for defense of their homeland.

Addressing the unit's combat record, General Douglas McArthur stated, "No greater fighting combat team has ever deployed for battle.'

Although the 158th Infantry was deactivated in 1967, its traditions and heritage are carried on by the 1st Battalion 158th Infantry. Activated in 2005, the battalion returned from a year-long Afghanistan deployment in March 2008.

Smaller units of Battalion volunteers have since served in Afghanistan and will continue to deploy in support of that effort. Displays and artifacts illustrate the battalion's service and combat experiences.

Special events planed for the summer will again feature the 108th Army Band in concert on Monday, July 5. Military reenactors will return on the weekend of Sept. 18 and 19.

The museum is located within the Fort Tuthill County Park. Take Exit 337, 3 miles south of Flagstaff, and follow the signs. Museum hours are Saturdays and Sundays, 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Depending on staff availability, the museum may also be open Thursdays and Fridays, noon to 4:00 p.m. Group Tours may be scheduled by appointment.

Admission is \$3 for adults, and free for children 12 and under, active military, National Guard, and active reserve personnel.







HOOVER DAM BRIDGE

An Amazing Feat Of Engineering Begun In 2005

Creeping closer inch by inch, 900 feet above the mighty Colorado River, the two sides of a \$160 million bridge at the Hoover Dam slowly take shape. bridge will carry a new section of US Route 93 past the bottleneck of the old road, which can be seen twisting and winding around and across the dam itself.

When complete, it will provide a new link between the states of Nevada and Arizona. In an incredible feat of engineering, the road will be supported on the two massive concrete arches that jut out of the rock

The arches are made up of 53 individual sections, each 24 feet long, which have been cast on-site and are being lifted into place using an improvised high-wire crane strung between temporary steel pylons.

The arches will eventually measure more than 1,000 feet across. Recently, the structure has looked like a traditional suspension bridge. But, once the arches are complete, the suspending cables on each side will be removed.

Extra vertical columns will then be in-

stalled on the arches to carry the road. The bridge has become known as the Hoover Dam bypass, although it is officially called the Mike O'Callaghan-Pat Tillman Memorial Bridge, after a former governor of Nevada and an American Football player from Arizona who joined the U.S. Army and was killed in Afghanistan.

Work on the bridge started in 2005 and should finish next year. An estimated 17,000 cars and trucks will cross it every

The dam was started in 1931 and used enough concrete to build a road from New York to San Francisco. The stretch of water it created, Lake Mead, is 110 miles long and took six years to fill. The original road was opened at the same time as the

famous dam in 1936.

An extra note: The top of the white band of rock in Lake Mead is the old waterline prior to the drought and development in the Las Vegas area. It is over 100 feet above the current water level.

The captain will soon give the command to get underway and begin the voyage north towards Catalina Island. The early afternoon departure will allow you to set the sails and harness any available wind to round Point Loma.

Transiting north and west means sailing against the prevailing wind and current, so motoring will become the primary mode of propulsion as you venture toward the waters around Catalina Island.

Day two will include a mixed bag of sail training, sailing, relaxation, and possible shore time concluding at anchor for a hearty sailor's dinner and time to relive

the day's activities.

Early on day three, the morning watch and museum sail crew will get the ship underway for the voyage south and east, allowing all to hone the skills acquired during their sailing adventure and an early evening arrival back in San Diego.

June 21-July 1

Channel Islands National Park

11 days, 10 nights

This voyage on the tall ship Californian attempts to retrace the 1542 voyage of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo in his flagship San Salvador as he explored what was then the furthest reaches of the world known to Europeans.

Situated just a few miles off the California coastline, the California Channel Islands are nonetheless considered among the most naturally pristine islands any where, in many ways unchanged since the time they were first sighted by European sailors from Cabrillo's ships four-and-ahalf centuries ago.

They are also among the oldest known

portions of North America to be inhabited, possibly beginning with prehistoric seafarers crossing by water from Asia or Ocea-nia long before the Aleutian land bridge created during the last ice age made possible a land crossing from Asia.

Built At Spanish Landing

Californian was built at Spanish Landing in San Diego Bay in 1984. She was launched with great fanfare for the Summer Olympic Games in Los Angeles

Since her launching, the ship has played host to thousands of school children on seagoing educational programs up and down the West Coast. She has also made voyages to Hawaii, Mexico and the East Coast of the United States.

Californian is a replica of the 1847 Revenue Cutter, C.W. Lawrence, a stately vessel that patrolled the coast of California, keeping law and order. The Revenue Service was a precursor to today's Coast Guard.

The museum's collection also includes the 1898 steam ferry Berkeley, the 1904 steam yacht Medea, Surprise from Russell Crowe's movie Master & Commander and the 1914 Pilot.

The Museum displays permanent and temporary exhibits, hosts educational and public programs for all ages, stages cultural events, and publishes a newsletter and peer-reviewed journal, all with a mar-itime theme relating to the museum's mis-

The Department will expand our dialogue with the public regarding wildlife mortality due to ingested lead and possible voluntary strategies to minimize that mortality over the next 10-15 years.

"The Commission understands that any meaningful progress on this issue will only occur with full public participation and cooperation, and successful voluntary or incentive-based programs developed in cooperation with the conservation commu-nity, the sporting goods industry and state wildlife agencies.

The director's goals and objectives are set annually during regularly scheduled public commission meetings. The Game and Fish Commission, established in 1929, is comprised of five members (serving staggered five-year terms) appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.

No more than one commissioner may be from any one county. No more than three may be from the same political party.

Alcohol consumption can result in inner ear disturbance, which can make it impossible for a person suddenly immersed in water to distinguish up from down.

Impairment can be even more dangerous for boaters than for drivers, since most boaters have less experience and confidence operating a boat than they do driving a car. Boaters average only about 110 hours of boating per year.

Boating Under the Influence puts a boater at risk. The vessel's voyage may be terminated, the boat may be impounded and the operator may be arrested.

Penalties vary by state, but can include fines, jail, and loss of boating or even driving privileges.

board and were knocked unconscious.

There is no excuse not to wear a life jacket. Newer styles of life jackets are lighter, less obtrusive and more attractive than ever before. The new inflatable life jackets allow the mobility and flexibility for activities like boating, fishing, paddling, hunting or just sunbathing, and are much cooler in the warmer weather.

Even though life jacket wear is the focus of the fair, boating professionals will also be educating boaters on the serious issues of boating under the influence or "drunk boating" that costs many lives along the Colorado River.

"Drunk boating is the other 900-pound gorilla on the boat," said Kevin Bergersen, Arizona's boating law administrator. "If we could get people to leave the booze at home and wear life jackets, we could prevent around three quarters of fatal accidents on the river, and we want to get the word out to our boaters."

In 2009, 207 accidents, 137 injuries and 11 fatalities occured on the Colorado River in Arizona, California and Nevada. The state lines intersect in/along the Colorado River. While many laws are congruent, a few laws differ and can be confusing to boaters. Providing a forum to the million Colorado River boaters, to learn about the boating laws, is crucial in reducing the number of accidents, injuries and fatalities that take place every year.



ommon Poorwills Take Winter Naps

Margie Allen suggested that we highlight some unusual birds, especially in the western United States. The Common Poorwill is her first choice, and we invite others to send theirs for future issues — to edi-

The Common Poorwill, Phalaenoptilus nuttallii, is a nocturnal bird of the family Caprimulgidae, the nightjars. It is found from British Columbia and southeastern <u>Alberta</u>, through the western <u>United States</u> to northern <u>Mexico</u>. The bird's habitat is dry, open areas with grasses or shrubs, and even stony desert slopes with very little vegetation.

Many northern birds migrate to winter within the breeding range in central and western Mexico, though some remain farther north. Remarkably, the Common Poorwill is the only bird known to go into torpor for extended periods (weeks to months).[2]

This happens on the southern edge of its range in the United States, where it spends much of the winter inactive, concealed in piles of rocks. This behavior has been reported in California and New Mexico. Such an extended period of torpor is close to a state of hibernation, not known among other birds. It was described definitively by Dr. Edmund Jaeger in 1948 based on a Poorwill he discovered hibernating in the <u>Chuckwalla Mountains</u> of <u>California</u> in 1946.

Common Poorwill

Jaeger's observations may have been influenced by earlier observations of torpor in the White-throated Swift made by his acquaintance Wilson Hanna, a resident of the Riverside, Calif., area and noted zoologist.

In 1804, Meriwether Lewis observed hibernating Common Poorwills in North Dakota during the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Though these observations were recorded carefully in Lewis's journal, their significance was not understood. This was at least in part because the Common Poorwill was not then recognized as a species distinct from the Whip-poor-will of eastern North America.

Native Americans of the <u>Hopi</u> tribe were likely aware of the Poorwill's behavior even earlier - the Hopi word for the bird means "The Sleeping One,"
This is the smallest North American

nightjar, about 18 cm (seven inches) in length, with a wingspan of approximately 30 cm (12 inches). It weighs 36-58 g. The sexes are similar, both gray and black patterned above. The outer tail-feathers are tipped with white, the markings slightly more prominent in the male.

The Common Poorwill is told from

similar nightjars by its small size, short bill, rounded wings with tips that reach the end of the short tail at rest, and pale gray coloration. Like many other <u>nightjars</u>, the common name derives from its call, a mo-

notonous poor-will given from dusk to dawn. At close range, a third syllable of the call may be heard, resulting in a *poor*will-low. It also gives a chuck note in flight.
Up to five subspecies are described, al-

though these are all quite similar, and some may be of dubious validity.

P. n. nutalli breeds over most of the

North American range.

P. n. californicus, Dusky Poorwill, is darker and browner than the nominate race. It occurs in western California.

P. n. hueyi, Desert Poorwill, is paler than the nominate race. It occurs in southern California.

P. n. dickeyi, San Ignacio Poorwill, is smaller and less heavily marked than *californicus*. It is resident in <u>Baja California</u>.

P. n. adustus, Sonoran Poorwill, is paler and browner than the nominate race. It occurs from extreme southern Arizona to central Sonora.

As other members of this family it feeds on nocturnal insects such as moths, beetles, and grasshoppers. It ejects pellets of the indigestible parts, in the manner of an owl. The Common Poorwill frequently takes prey off the ground or by leaping into the air from the ground. It is reported to drink on the wing

From Nest To Flight Time
The nest of the Common Poorwill is a shallow scrape on the ground, often at the base of a hill and frequently shaded partly by a bush or clump of grass. The clutch size is typically two, and the eggs are white to creamy, or pale pink, sometimes with darker mottling.

Both sexes incubate for 20-21 days to hatching, with another 20-23 days to fledging. There is usually one brood per

year, but females may sometimes lay and incubate a second clutch within 100 m of the first nest while the male feeds young at the first site.

The young are <u>semiprecocial</u>. An adult disturbed on the nest tumbles and opens its mouth, hissing, apparently imitating a

Breeding is from March to August in the south of the range, and late May to September further north


