

Pre-Departure Checklist

You can help assure a good time while operating your vessel by performing this pre-departure check.

- Check the weather forecast for the area and timeframe during which you will be boating. High winds create hazardous conditions for
- boaters.

 Make sure that the steering and throttle controls operate properly and all lights are working properly.

 Check for any fuel leaks from the tank, fuel lines, and carburetor.

 Check the engine compartment for oil leaks.
- Check hose connections for leaks or cracks, and make sure hose clamps are tight, weather forecast for the area and timeframe during
- which you will be boating.

 Drain all water from the engine compartment, and be sure the bilge plug is

- compartment, and be sure the bilge plug is replaced and secure.

 Check to be sure you have a fully charged engine battery and fire extinguishers.

 If so required, make sure the ignition safety switch and wrist lanyard are in good order.

 Make sure you have the required number of life jackets (personal flotation devices or PFDs), and check that they are in good condition.

Cold Weather Boating Requires Extra Caution, Preparation

While the majority of boaters in colder parts of the country have winterized their boats or put them into storage until spring, many still rely on their vessels for hunting, fishing or necessary transportation in cold weather, substantially increasing their risk of a deadly accident. Extra caution and preparation should be taken before heading out on the water in winter.

And, although Arizona winters are mild in some parts of the state, they can be very cold in other parts.
The U.S Coast Guard Auxiliary says

the importance of wearing a life jacket becomes even more critical when the danger for hypothermia is added to other con-Sudden immersion in cold water can have severe physiological consequences, such as cardiac arrest, fast loss of body heat (the body loses heat 25 times faster in cold water than in cold air) and involuntary inhalation of water (gasping) that results in drowning.

Most Coast Guard-approved life jackets when worn are designed to keep the user's head above water while awaiting rescue.

In addition to wearing a life jacket,



wearing the right clothing also can contribute to a more enjoyable and safer cold weather boating experience. Consider layering clothing, including a wet suit or dry suit, to help ward off the effects of hypothermia.

Following are some additional tips for safe winter boating:

· Assess the risks — envision what can go wrong and be fully equipped and prepared.

• Leave a float plan with a responsible individual who knows your intentions, lobecome very cold, and hypothermia is not unheard of in any boating situation. Extra caution and preparation should be taken before heading out on the water in winter.

Don't Let The 'Mild' Fool You

Arizona winters are mild, and recreational boating is popular yearround, but an unexpected immersion into cold water can cause hypothermia and even lead to a life-threatening situation.

Entering extremely cold water causes an immediate gasp reflex that can fill the lungs with water. After falling overboard or entering the it is important to be wearing your life jacket (PFD). A life jacket keeps your head above water and your body on the surface.

Stay calm and move slowly. Don't try to take off clothing in the water (a common misconception is that heavy clothing or waders weigh down your body when in fact can trap air and help keep your body afloat).

If your boat has capsized, stay with it. More than likely, it will not sink and it can be used as a platform to maneuver, so stay on top of it as much as possible, getting yourself out of the water and maintaining stability.

REMEMBERING STEVE WARD 'Mr. Lake Powell' Will Be Missed By Many

Lake Powell, and the Page, Ariz., community, has lost one of its greatest advocates: Steve Ward died on Monday, Oct. 8. Steve had just started working for the City of Page, for the fitting job title of Tourism Director, when he passed away

Steve's journey at Lake Powell started when his familv moved to Page in 1959, when he was a kid. He was even part of the very first Boy Scout Troop in Page. His love for Lake Powell and the Page community

was ever growing, and he showed it by letting the world know we are here

Some of the long time Lake Powell community may be familiar with the original Lake Powell Map by Stan Jones. Steve was lucky enough to have Stan as his personal mentor. In 1999, Steve took over the publishing of the map. Stan Jones passed away in 2007 and Steve became honored as the new "Mr. Lake Powell." Steve spent much time on Lake Powell and was an avid photographer.

I met Steve in 1993 when he worked for Aramark, one of Lake Powell concessionaires. He was one of the very first people I met when I moved to Page

It was obvious to me that he had a passion for the area and Lake Powell. His face would light up when we would talk about being on the lake. He knew all of the great spots and had stories about the different lo-

Helped With Movies

We all wanted Steve's job. Who wouldn't want to get paid to play on the water? As the Director of Public Relations, for Aramark –Lake Powell Resorts and Marinas, he was the key person who took film/commercial crews out to find the per-fect location sets. He helped with such movies as Ravenhawk, Maverick, Evolution and Planet of the Apes.

Many people may have met Steve dur-ing one of the many boat shows he attended during his time at Aramark. Steve was part of a crew that traveled to multiple states for boat show events. Steve was the perfect "salesman" for getting the general public interested in the House-boating culture. He loved to talk about how wonderful Lake Powell is

Proud Of Page

Steve was proud of Page, Ariz., and believed that it, and Lake Powell, could become a year-round tourism attraction. He was involved with so many different aspects of the community.

Steve was the President of The Friends of Lake Powell, a non-profit group dedicated to the protection of Lake Powell. He had also served as President of the Chamber of Commerce. Steve was a past board member for John Wesley Powell Museum and the Page/Lake Powell Community Foundation.

Steve had followed his father's earlier footsteps and was a board member at the Page Hospital. Steve was also part of the Tourism Advisory Board and he was also was the Page area's Film Commissioner.

He was also on Staff Parish and Trustees for Page Community United Methodist Church.

Through the years, Steve met so many people. He will be missed by many - not only for his community involvement but also because he was just a genuine per-


Answers To What's Cookin' In The Boat 'Kitchen'

When good friends Carolyn Shearlock and Jan Irons began cruising with their husbands, they discovered that boat cooking is different from cooking ashore. The space is smaller, there's no grocery store 5 minutes away, you have fewer prepared foods and electric appliances, and food storage is much different.








LAKE POWELL FISHING REPORT

This is the last 2012 fishing report from Wayne Gustaveson, and we thank him for all the excellent information he has provided us for the past 12 months.

It has been an interesting year with more highs than lows. Bass and walleye fishing in the spring was awesome, followed by a great run of surface fishing for juvenile stripers in summer. Now, going into winter it's a mixed bag with unexpected fishing opportunities occurring each day.

For example, on Saturday we took a side trip into Cathedral in the Desert at the back of Clear Creek Canyon on the Escalante. The lake level now is at the base of the second waterfall with the main cathedral well under water.

We viewed the falls and then retraced our steps. While passing over the first falls (10 feet deep) marking the cathedral, we noticed a school of fish sunning them-selves near the surface of the 50-feet-deep chamber. A Kastmaster spoon tossed to the basking fish proved them to be largemouth

A slab spoon simultaneously dropped to the bottom of the chamber resulted in a 5-pound striper. The next two drops to the 50-foot bottom produced two walleye. Then the fish quit. That is a good summary of fishing this week. There are fish to catch in a wide variety of places but it takes a subtle key to understand when fish are vulnerable.

Shad in the main lake are scattered in small groups of 100 fish, hiding here and there trying to avoid predators. When bass

or stripers find a small school of forage fish, the area lights up with a short feeding frenzy and then quiets to a peaceful calm

Shad are found in the backs of most canyons and coves while the open water is without forage fish. Crayfish are carrying the predatory burden in the open clear water. Fish slowly on the bottom near rocks to take advantage of this clear water crayfish key.

Shad at the inflow areas have been untouched while protected by the colored

water and warm temperatures. That is now changing. Expect fishing to improve dra-matically for bass, stripers, walleye and crappie near Hite and in the upper San

Juan during November.

Some boils are yet to occur in shad dense areas but more fish will be caught trolling shad imitating lures and spooning

along the bottom.

The best key to finding fish lake-wide is to graph from the shallows out to the first drop. Striped bass are most often

URBAN FISHING REPORT

November Welcomes Trout To Urban Lakes

November promises to provide excellent fishing at Urban Fishing Program lakes. The Phoenix and Tucson urban lakes have been loaded with catfish all fall with one last stocking in early November.

Additionally, 15,000 bluegill were stocked. And, good news: The first trout delivery for the winter season began on Nov. 15 (see below for more information on the trout and bluegill stockings).

Top baits for catfish are hot dogs,

shrimp, and stink baits with fish biting throughout the day. Anglers are enjoying a good catfish bite up to 10 days after stockings, with plenty of cats in the 2-pound range. Bluegill are biting well on a variety of baits (mealworms, worms, corn) and are ready to take small nymphs and poppers in the late mornings and afternoon. Using light tackle with small hooks and bobbers will keep you and the kids busy catching bluegill.

From the end of October through the first of November, Green Valley Lakes (Payson) were stocked with rainbow trout. Trout up to 15 inches are biting well on Powerbait, worms and small spinners and jigs.



Trout Stockings Have Begun

The fall catfish stocking season wrapped up the week of Oct. 29 – Nov. 3 with another 13,000 pounds of fish delivered to the 20 Urban Fishing Program waters in the Phoenix and Tucson areas. Now fish stocking trucks switch from delivering catfish to trout. Lake temperatures are cooling down towards the 66-degree target for trout, a cold-water species.

The winter trout-stocking season began Thursday, Nov. 15. Rainbow trout ranging from 10-14 inches will be stocked at twoweek intervals throughout the winter. More than 100,000 trout from Colorado have been ordered for delivery to urban waters during the four-month stocking season that lasts from November to March. Green Valley Lakes, located in

Payson's high mountain country, have already been stocked with trout since mid October. Green Valley's every-other-week trout stockings extend from October to

If you recently found out about the great fishing in the urban lakes and the start of the trout-stocking season, we have a deal for you. The 2012 Class U (Urban Fishing) license is 50 percent off during the last two months of 2012. The Urban License is valid for all fish species, including trout, catfish, bluegill and bass, and is valid through the end of 2012.

Largemouth Bass Virus Detected In Lake Pleasant Fish disease poses no risk for people, pets or water supply.

Arizona Game and Fish Department officials have confirmed the presence of largemouth bass virus in Lake Pleasant.

Lab tests on largemouth bass tissue samples collected during a routine survey in October by Arizona Game and Fish and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service personnel showed presence of the disease in some samples

While the virus can affect largemouth bass, it doesn't pose a risk to people and pets, and the water is safe for drinking water supply and recreation.

"Largemouth bass virus is not known to infect any warm-blooded animals, and any fish that are caught by anglers are safe to eat," said Marc Dahlberg, Game and Fish water quality program manager. "However, we always recommend that people thoroughly cook any fish they intend to eat, and never use fish found dead or dving for food.

Game and Fish has not documented any fish kills at Lake Pleasant associated with largemouth bass virus to date. At this time, fishing is still very productive and there have been no recreational impacts. Lake Pleasant is the top fishing recreation site in Arizona, producing more than 520,000 angler use days.

Dahlberg explained that although the virus can cause mortality in largemouth bass, not all bass become infected, and not every fish becomes sick. For instance, only five lakes in Texas suffered fish kills even though the virus was found in 23 of the state's reservoirs.

The virus has been found in 18 states dating back to 1991. In Arizona, Saguaro Lake, Bartlett Lake, Roosevelt Lake, and now Lake Pleasant have tested positive for the disease. There have been no impacts attributable to largemouth bass virus at

Saguaro, Bartlett or Roosevelt to date.
Although other fish species can carry the virus, it only affects largemouth bass. It is not precisely known what triggers the activation of the virus into a disease outbreak, but it has been associated with stress events, such as high water temperatures. The virus appears to diminish over

The Arizona Game and Fish Department emphasizes that there are precautions the public can take to help stop the spread of the virus, as well as other aquatic invasive species, such as quagga mussels. One preventive measure that is vital is that people absolutely avoid transporting live fish or water from one body of water to an-

Reward Offered In Elk Poaching Case Near Payson

PAYSON Ariz — The Arizona Game and Fish Department and the Arizona Elk Society are seeking the public's help in finding the person(s) responsible for the illegal shooting of four elk in the Payson area in Game Management Unit 22

Game and Fish officers investigating the case said that two young bull elk and one cow elk, all illegally shot and left to waste, were found in close proximity to each other in the Chaparral Pines community and were most likely poached between the evening of Oct. 24 and Oct. 25.

A fourth elk, also illegally shot, was

found Oct. 31 in the same general area. Investigators believe it was poached on Oct.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department's Operation Game Thief Program is offering up to a \$5,000 reward for information leading to an arrest in the case. An additional reward of up to \$5,000 is being offered by the Arizona Elk Society for information leading to a conviction in the

The wasteful poaching of this many elk is a travesty to those of us that work hard to improve the health and habitat of elk in Arizona," said Steve Clark, president of the Arizona Elk Society.

"The public meetings will explain the proposal and offer the opportunity for questions and feedback."

night crawlers. Use lighter tackle, smaller hooks in the size 10-12 range, and small for bluegill and other sunfish are 10 fish

found on the top of a ledge that drops

down to deeper water.

Graph a school of fish, mark the spot with a floating marker and then fish the area with your choice of techniques. The best option is to chum with cut up anchovies to keep the fish in the area and then fish with spoons, bait or deep-trolled lures to catch schooling fish.

Large numbers of stripers are being caught when a school is found but many anglers are missing the subtle keys and going fishless. Pay close attention to the graph and when a school is located, react quickly to get the school excited. Bait fishing is much more effective now that it was in the summer.

There is still one major event to look forward to in November. As the water cools into the 50s, shad will be forced into deeper water to find stable temperatures. At that point, stripers will follow. Both species will become more stationary.

Then fishing will peak as finding one school will result in many more fish being caught from each school encountered.

Thanks for reading my ramblings and for helping to improve fishing for all species at Lake Powell by harvesting striped bass.

Remember to Clean Drain and Dry your boat to stop the spread of invasive species.

At press time, lake elevation was 3,620 and water temperature was 66-70F.



disease or even introducing an unwanted organism, such as quagga mussels, that could substantially affect a fishery or lake ecosystem," said Dahlberg. "Don't transport live fish caught from a lake — period. It's the wrong thing to do and it's unlaw-

It's also important to clean, drain and dry your boat before leaving any lake at any time, and to disinfect your boat or wait at least five days before launching your boat on another water. In fact, at several lakes, including Lake Pleasant, it's now the law that you do so. This is extremely important as the bass virus can live for up to seven days in standing water.

Federal Government Targets Sportsmen's Dollars To Reduce Deficit acts (Dingell-Johnson Act of 1950 and Wallop-Breaux Act of 1984) were enacted to expand the excise tax to include

Conservation of wildlife resources and the public's outdoor recreation heritage is at risk.

The Arizona Game and Fish Commission is making the public aware of a looming threat to crucial conservation funding by the federal government's proposed sequestration of conservation trust funds, an action that could reduce Arizona's wildlife conservation funding by several million dollars

"The Greatest Story Never Told" is the mantra extolled by the nation's wildlife conservation community in the 75th anwildlife conservation.

Funds Are Backbone

The program was so successful that subsequent amendments and additional

niversary of the Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration (WSFR) programs being celebrated this year. Far-sighted, forwardlooking sportsmen worked with Congress in 1937 to pass the Pittman-Robertson Act, whereby excise taxes on certain hunting equipment are collected by the Internal Revenue Service in a trust fund and apportioned by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service to state fish and wildlife agencies for

wildlife conservation. Success of the program has been monumental, achieving restoration of elk, bighorn sheep and other wildlife populations, constructing and operating shooting ranges and boat ramps, providing hunter education to hundreds of thousands of youngsters, developing a modern fish hatchery program, conserving of our wildlife heritage, while contributing more than \$2 billion dollars annually to the economy (more than ei-

ther golf or professional sports) in Ari-

Each state and territory made binding commitments through assent legislation that these trust funds (and license fees) would be used only for wildlife conservation or outdoor recreation benefit. The federal government only administers these funds in trust, passing them through to the state wildlife agencies.

Sets The Stage

Under previous administrations, the WSFR funds and boating safety funds were exempt from sequestration in the Graham-Rudman-Hollings Act [Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985]. The Act specifically provided that "payments to trust funds from excise taxes or other receipts properly creditable to such trust funds" are "exempt from reduction.

Ironically, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has now ruled that a portion of these funds must be sequestered (or withheld) under provisions of the Budget Control Act of 2011. While this action only sequesters funds from being apportioned to state wildlife agencies, and does not, in and of itself, divert the funds, it does set the stage for a future congressional "sweep" of these funds from the trust accounts into the federal treasury.

The fact that this diversion could

occur is the ultimate irony and a breach of trust - federal agencies charged with the fiduciary protection of these trust funds could become the architects of the only successful diversion in the fund's history

Under OMB's decision, excise taxes would still be collected from manufacturers of hunting and fishing equipment. Excise taxes would still be paid by hunters, anglers, archers, boaters and shooters. Interest would still accrue in the various ac-

A Critical Concern

However, the proposed action denies the full apportionment of funds to states for fish and wildlife conservation and boating safety beginning Jan. 2, 2013. Sequestration is a critical concern to all sportsmen and conservationists Every state could see severe reductions in administration, boating safety, and WSFR, directly affecting programs, permanent agency jobs, agency resources, and agencies' ability to provide public access for hunting, fishing, boating and shooting. "Conservation of wildlife, public safety

and our outdoor recreation heritage are at risk," said Larry Voyles, director of the Arizona Game and Fish Department. "In Arizona, the impact could be as much as several million dollars annually, with cuts to wildlife restoration, sport fish restora-tion, boating safety, and other important

State wildlife agencies are working diligently with the federal administration to remove state Trust Funds from sequestration, currently to no avail. "This is an important issue that has received little publicity to date," said Director Voyles. "All who cherish their wildlife heritage and are concerned with the future of wildlife management must be made aware of these issues. No alternative federal or private funding is available to fill this gap.

Editor's Note: E.M. Brookes of Queen Creek, Ariz., received the following reply to his note that WSFR funds are needed in Arizona to continue conservation efforts.

Mr. Brookes,

Thank you for your concern about the potential impacts of the sequestration process on the Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration Fund — and on wildlife conservation across the nation. The Fish and Wildlife Service shares those concerns, but Congress has ultimate authority to determine what impact sequestration will have on these funds in the event an agreement cannot be reached in time.

Congress has not included the Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration Fund among the list of programs it exempted from sequestration. In fact, Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration funds were affected by previous sequestrations in 1985 and 1989, although in both instances Congress restored lost funding once budget agree-ments were reached. We recognize the unique history of WSFR and the essential role it plays in state management hunting opportunities and for fish and wildlife, and with the Department of the Interior have unsuccessfully requested discretion to protect WSFR from sequestration.

Our hope is that an agreement can be

to our residents and visitors," Taylor said. "This is a great low-cost option for our communities to get outside and enjoy our County and its many parks."



lands that are "land-locked" by private lands. It provides a wealth of other information as well.

Want to see the boundaries of the Game Management Unit you're in or where water catchments are located? Are you interested in what wildlife species are in a particular area? All the information is available with the click of a mouse anywhere on the map. The more places you click, the more information you can find.

To help get you started, just click on the "How to Use the Map" link in the upper right-hand corner of the page after you've logged on.

Even more exciting is that you can create your own map using this tool with a topographic map, aerial images, or street maps as the background. Just export the map you make and print it out on your home printer, or take it in to a printing service to print a large map.

Development and maintenance of this tool were made possible through a grant that Game and Fish received from the Voluntary Public Access and Habitat Incentive Program, which is a federal program authorized in the 2012 Farm Bill.

The department plans to add information that is useful to hunters and other outdoor recreationists over time, so users are encouraged to use the "Send Comments" link in the upper right-hand portion of the web page to e-mail comments for consideration.




